After leaving school, he became a ticket agent at Kahului Railroad Company's Old Wailuku depot, then manager of the two stations, superintendent of the Wailuku waterworks, and subland agent.

He served in the House of Representatives, 1916 session, and as a member of the County board of supervisors, 1933-36. In addition, he was at one time a substitute district magistrate for Wailuku and a former member of the board of appraisal, and at the time of his death, was on the board of registration for the County of Maui and the tax review board.

In 1934, he opened the Garcia Collection Agency on the corner of Main and Market streets in Wailuku. He later moved his office to Fifth street, where he also carried out the duties of marriage license agent, until his death.

Mr. Garcia was also well-known in local baseball circles. He was an outstanding shortstop with the Morning Stars of the pre-World War I period and later served as umpire for the senior and A-JA leagues.

He was a member of the St. Louis College Alumni Association and of the Hui O Alohia Hemelele, an organization for Catholics in Wailuku.

Mr. Garcia is survived by the widow, Mrs. Emily Bal Garcia; three sons, Walter, with the department of health, and William and Anthony, department of public works; a daughter, Mrs. Martin (Oliver) Aliu and Mrs. Gusie Suter, both of Honolulu; his mother, Mrs. Maria G. Rodriguez, of Wailuku, and eight grandchildren, all in Wailuku.

Also surviving are two brothers, Edward Rodriguez and Herbert Rodriguez, both of California; three sisters, Mrs. Charles P. (Rose) Bento, Sr., of Wailuku, Mrs. Margaret Englin of Seattle, Washington, and Mrs. Eva Celly of Los Angeles, California; and several aunts and nephews.

75 Attend School Of Politics

Enthusiastic attendance marked the three nights of the Maui Women's Republican Club sponsored "SCHOOL OF POLITICS" at the Puuene Club, Monday through Wednesday, May 5-7.

Leaders, both local and from Honolulu, took an active part in the instruction.

According to Mrs. L. J. Vorhies, chairman in charge, the Maui school was the largest of the many similar three-day meetings which have been held throughout the Islands. Over 75 students were registered.

The object of the school of politics, "to awaken the citizen, every citizen, and make him realize that if our way of life is to continue to live, he must take an active interest in politics and the affairs of government."

Robert Craig, Honolulu public relations man, spoke on the importance of a well-organized two-party system.

"Only a strong two-party system, one in power and one in opposition, can safeguard our democracy from the dangers which threaten it today more than at any other time in our history. The party must keep that system alive," he said.

Riley Allen, editor of the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, outlined the history of the Republican Party. He covered the organization's growth from its beginning in 1854 to the present. He pointed out that the Republican Party's service to the people as a whole down through the years has been the outstanding source of our country's greatness.

Selling Republicanism was discussed by Edwin Whitlow of the Honolulu Business College. He said, "Good Republicanism must rest on the good features of the party and show how they will benefit citizens. Talk about the party's glorious past, its present and future plans. If you believe in the party, sell it to the people."

Samuel King, Jr., Honolulu attorney, spoke on registration and getting people to register to vote. "Hawaii ranks high in the percentage of registered voters who vote, but it ranks low in the percentage of eligible voters who register. Every precinct club of both parties should concentrate on getting eligible voters to register and vote."

"Jazz" Belknap of The Maui News stated that the paper he represents is available to both parties for news coverage of their functions and activities. He said that the paper would print only the truth and would report on both sides of any issue impartially in the interest of the community as a whole.

Opinions are voiced only in the editorial columns of the paper, he said.

Senator Toshi Arai of Maui presented a chart talk detailing the procedure of enacting laws by the national and territorial government.

Robert Lee, executive secretary of the Maui Republican Party, talked about the service available at Republican headquarters in Wailuku. Toshi Enomoto, County clerk, discussed the various sections of the registration and voting law.

Wednesday night, the school paused in silent tribute to two well-beloved Republicans who passed away this week—Antonio Garcia and Emil Muller.

Scouts In Campfire Program

An impressive campfire program has been scheduled by 700 boy scouts of Maui and Lanai tonight (Saturday) as part of the two-day camporee and rally being held at the Kahului Fairgrounds under the auspices of the Maui County Boy Scout Council.

The National Colors will be paraded past the scouts, who will assemble in semi-circle formation, according to Eagle Scout Anthony Alfonso of Wailuku, who will be the campfire chief. The flood lights will go on immediately following the hula calls by Mische Tanaka of Post 145, Paia, and the scouts will march in formation to the music of "Stars and Stripes Forever."

The campfire, Alfonso said, will be lighted by the Great Spirit himself and no human hands will touch the firewood or be near the flame. After the presentation of National Colors, the assembly will re-dedicate themselves to the Scout Oath and Council President Frank Churchill will deliver the opening address. This will be followed by songs to be rendered by the Kahului boy scouts under the direction of Kiyoshi Yabui.

The first event of the evening will be the boy scout and explorer individual fire-by-friction contest, followed by the boy scout fire-by-friction and steel event. Cub Scouts will put on a show for the first time during the celebration.

The third event will be the boy scout individual knot tying contest with 20 contestants. They will tie the square knot, the bowline sheepshead, fisherman's knot, sheet bend, clove hitch, timber hitch, two half hitches and the girth hitch. The time limit has been set at 60 seconds. Band music by scouts of Troup 45 and Post 145 of Paia will entertain the crowd while the judges inspect the knots.

Twenty-four explorers will then compete in the "throwing the diamond hitch" contest. The qualifying time has been set at 30 seconds. The Kahului boy scouts ensemble will render scout songs under Yabui, while the diamond hitch is being inspected by special judges John Saka of Wahee, chairman; Dyke Yamada and Harold Hironaka.

The closing ceremony will be handled by Big Chief White Eagle, an Eagle scout from Wailuku who will wear the regular Indian costume with an eagle headdress, breast plates, etc. This ceremony will take place at 9:30 p.m.

After the campfire, the adult scouts will meet at the camp directors' tent for a general meeting covering Sunday's scheduled events, church assignment and presentation of awards, including the "Pop" Hutton and

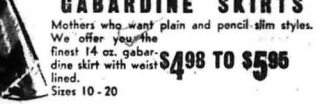

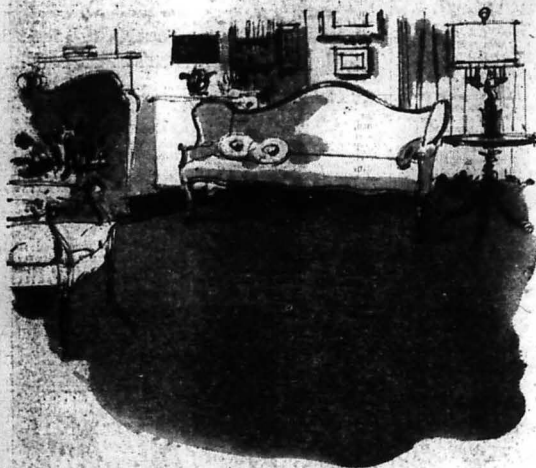

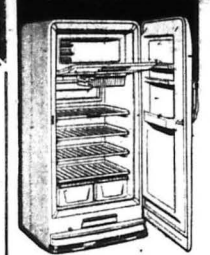
