University of Hawai'i Regents' Medal in Teaching Excellence: Dr. Kamuela Yong

Dr. Kamuela Yong is an Associate Professor in the Mathematics, Natural and Health Sciences Division. He joined the institution in 2015 after becoming the first Native Hawaiian to earn a Ph.D. in Applied Mathematics. Dr. Yong humbly acknowledges that "teaching is a learning experience" and he strives to improve by constantly learning from his students.

 unnecessary duplication, economically combining operations, procedures, reports and/or forms, or eliminating water,
 fire health or accident hazards.

UH West O'ahu's Dr. Miles on "Food Talk" podcast

Dr. Albie Miles, UH West O'ahu Assistant Professor of Sustainable Community Food Systems, is featured on the podcast, "Food Talk with Dani Nierenberg."

In the hour-long episode, "Nate Kleinman and Albie Miles on Community Food Sovereignty During COVID-19," which was released on April 27, Nierenberg talks to Miles and Kleinman, an activist and farmer who co-founded the Experimental Farming Network (EFN), about what community food systems look like during COVID-19.

Miles explains how COVID-19 is worsening the existing vulnerabilities in Hawai'i's food system, and calls for greater support for sustainable family farms, well-paying agricultural jobs, and indigenous traditions.

Campus fire alarm inspection and testing May 4, 7, and 8

UH West O'ahu Environmental Health and Safety Office (EHSO) and contractor Johnson Control will conduct testing of the university's fire protection systems.

The FM200 fire suppression systems in the Library and Maintenance buildings will be inspected and tested May 4 starting at 8 a.m. The audible alarms, visual alarms, and smoke detectors on the first floors of all buildings will be inspected and tested May 7 and 8 starting at 8 a.m.

During the fire alarm testing, the audible alarms will sound (very loudly) and the visual alarms will strobe intermittently. The audible and visual testing will be conducted one building at a time and should be completed within the above posted time frame; should there be any changes or any delays, an email update will be sent.

The Johnson Control service technicians will be wearing their company uniforms and will be escorted by UH West O'ahu EHSO throughout the buildings.
