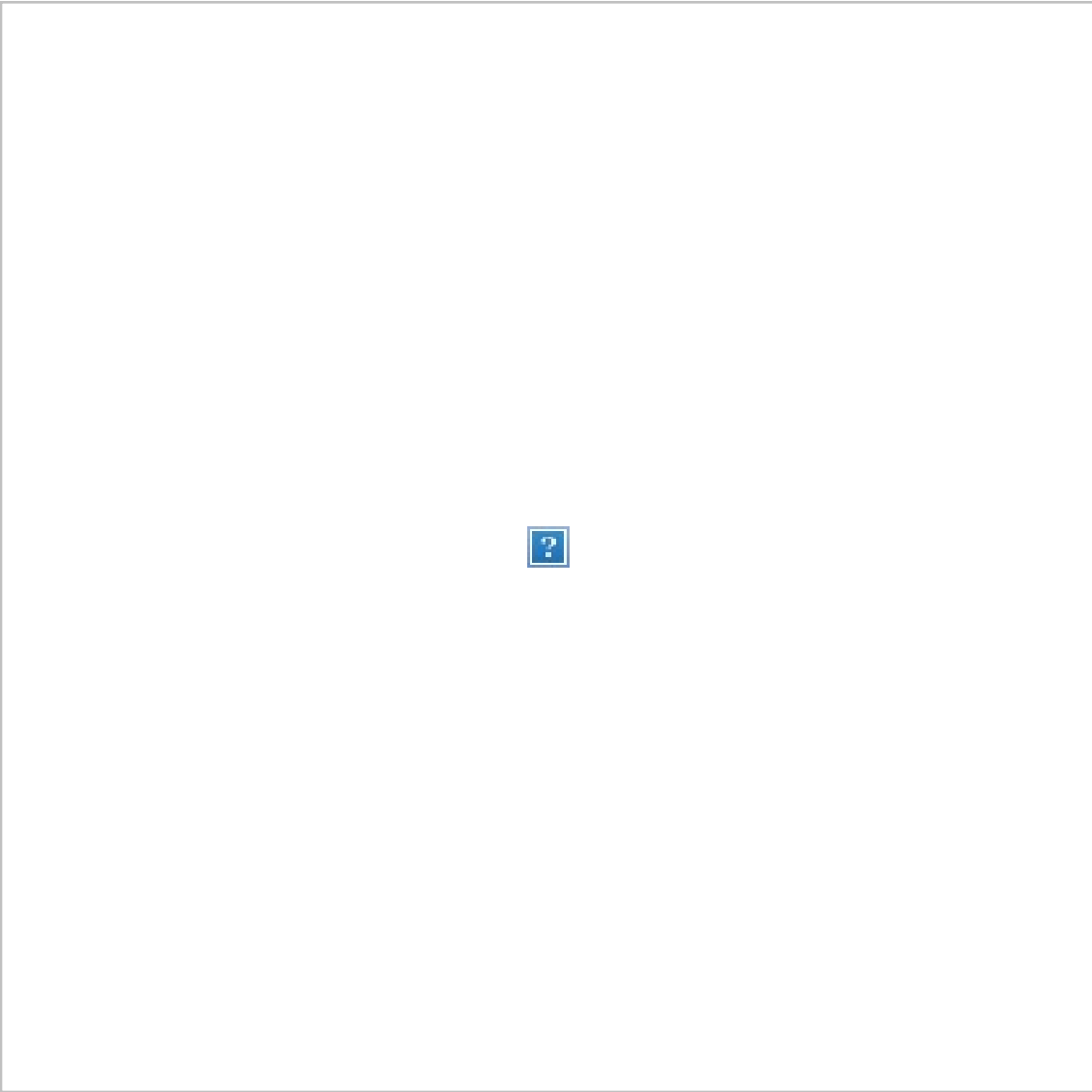

Reorganization of Student Affairs academic advisors along division lines

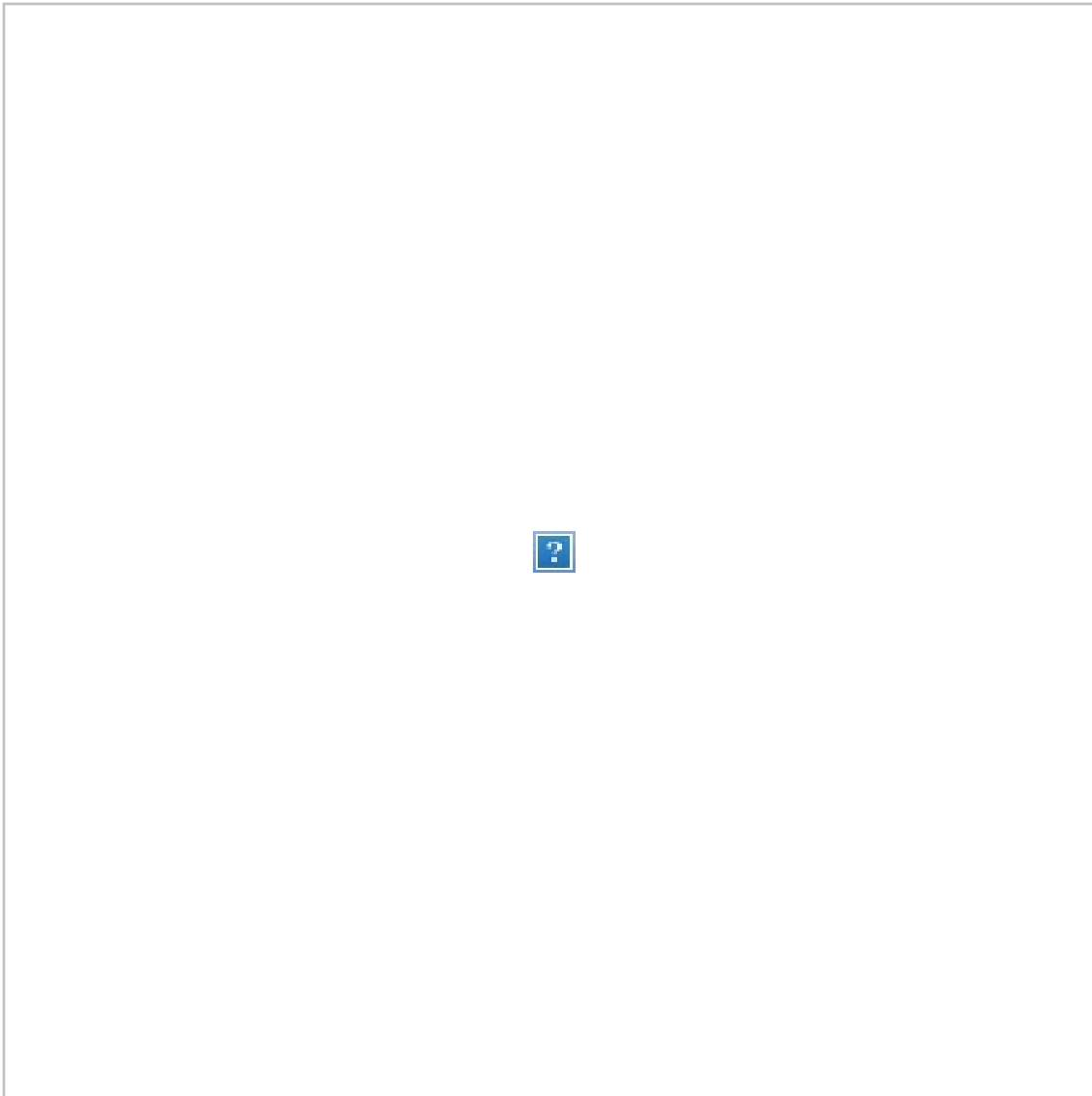
Beginning this fall, the Advising Services team and the Division of Student Affairs are introducing a new initiative which partners an advisor in Student Affairs with faculty in each of the divisions. This means two Student Affairs advisors will be connected to students by division in order to provide more purposeful support during their college journey here at UH West O'ahu. This initiative creates an opportunity for the advisors and division faculty to partner together around division outcomes, concentration nuances, and specific program concerns.

The Library's has a new scanner that's fast and has multiple features. It's free to use.



The James & Abigail Campbell Library has installed a [Knowledge Imaging Center](#) that promises to make studying easier for students while producing crisp scans of documents placed either on its flatbed or through its document feeder. The scanner is located on the library's first floor across from the IT Help Desk and can be used with an app called MyDocs that allows users to send documents to a smartphone or tablet where they can be read with an audio tool, quickly skimmed, or used to produce study flashcards. The scanner is operated via a touch-screen and can produce documents that are searchable. It's available for use by students, faculty and

staff for free.

Title III Evaluation presentation set for this Wednesday afternoon

A presentation on Charting a Native Hawaiian Postsecondary Journey: Findings from the UH Comprehensive Title III Evaluation is scheduled from 2 to 4 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 5 in E109.

The U.S. federal Title III program provides financial support to minority-serving institutions to strengthen their capacities to promote success among minority students. For over 20 years, the 10-campus University of Hawai'i (UH) system has leveraged Title III funding to improve Native Hawaiian representation on campuses, persistence, and successful achievement of desired goals. In 2015, the UH system was awarded a supplemental grant under Title III to conduct a system-wide evaluation of Title III programs. In this presentation, the evaluation team highlights findings and "Aha!" moments from comprehensive review, which includes reviews of program reports, focus groups, and interviews with stakeholders on each campus, student and faculty/staff survey, and analyses of student administrative and academic records.
