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Decrease In Unemployed

Number of Jobs In June Estimated At 926 On Maui

Total employment on Maui rose by more than 300 over June as a result of peak seasonal activity in the pineapple industry, the Territorial Department of Labor and Industrial Relations announced this week in its "Hawaii Labor Market" new figures.

The report said that the number of unemployed on the island of Maui is currently estimated at 926, or 5.5 percent of the labor force. There were 1,358 unemployed persons, representing 8.3 percent of labor force, in June, and the decrease was attributed to seasonal hiring in the pineapple industry.

"Employment in the construction industry," the report stated, "has leveled off off additional hiring may be limited due to material shortage."

Job placements made through the Wailuku office of the Territorial Employment Service totaled 33. The majority were in pineapple canneries, construction firms, and wholesale and retail establishments.

Total employment in the Territory is now over the 188,000 mark, according to the report. This is well above the 182,000 figure of a year ago. Unemployment dropped from 12,789 in June to 9,998 in July. Approximately 18,500 individuals were without jobs a year ago.

There was no change in the figures for Lanai and Molokai. Sixteen persons, representing 2 percent of the labor force, are unemployed on the two islands.

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Makawao Wins 50-50 Title; Brown Mainstay

Coch Hinano Kulan's Hawaii of Makawao added another championship to the up-country district's quest for a better baseball season when they defeated the George Cembra-coached Keahua nine, 6-5, in the finals of the 50-50 League playoffs last Sunday at the Kahului Athletic Club diamond.

The winning blow was delivered in the eighth inning by third sacker, Walter Freitas, who lined a single to rightfield after going through hitless in four previous times at bat to score outfielder Nelson Kekili with what proved to be the deciding tally. Kekili opened the inning with a walk and was sacrificed to second base by pitcher Henry Brown.

Mainstay of the Hawaiians, nine throughout the entire season was Brown, the team's only pitcher, who went the route in all of the Makawao nine's 11 games this year, eight during the regular district league. His only loss was in the first game of the season, when he bowed 2-1 to the Maui Albatross.

The 23-year-old southpaw held Keahua to only two singles for the first five innings last Sunday but was blasted for three runs in the sixth frame when the losers bunched six successive safeties, and homer by Bert Kayona and three singles in the eighth canto accounted for their only other runs.

The Hawaiians, who defeated the Waialua nine, 19-2, the previous week, blasted Elio Viveiros for 17 hits, although scoring in only three innings. Keahua, George Freitas, Henry Freitas, Brown, and John Kahua played major roles in the second and fourth innings when the winners scored two and three runs, respectively.

Kuhua and G. Freitas paced the Hawaiians with three hits apiece while John Puna, Abel Abreu, Franco, and Brown paired safeties. Jon Oshiro had three hits for Keahua with Kayona, Tom Shimabukuro, and Viveiros getting two apiece.

The championship was the first in the 50-50 league for Makawao, which has been campaigning since 1948. A championship trophy is being donated by Salvatore Molina for the team and community backers are planning a party on Saturday night at the Makawao Community Center.

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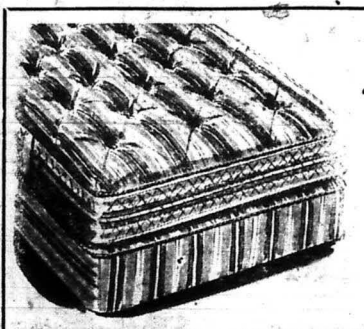

Coast-To-Coast Coach Service Planned By UAL

Plans for a coast-to-coast air coach service to supplement its standard transcontinental flight were announced recently by United Air Lines.

According to W. A. Patterson, president of United, the company will file with the Civil Aeronautics board to inaugurate coach service between San Francisco, Chicago and New York on September 30. He said that 60-passenger, four-engine DC-4 Mainliners will be used on one daily coast-to-coast flight in each direction. Close connections from United's Honolulu

San Francisco flights will be available.

The fares will be based on 45 cents a mile as against the standard rate of 8 cents a mile. Thus the New York-Chicago fare will be \$35; San Francisco-Chicago, \$45; and San Francisco-New York, \$115, exclusive of federal transportation tax. The service will be identical with that provided in air coach flights which United has been operating on the Pacific Coast since 1950, with one stewardess per plane based on meal service.

Tentative plans call for United's air coach flight to leave San Francisco at 1:00 p.m. with arrival in Chicago at 1:20 a.m. and in New York at 4:45 a.m. Westbound, the flight will leave New York at 5:00 p.m. and Chicago at 6:20 p.m. with arrival in San Francisco at 4:10 a.m.

My Religion and My Country

(Ed. Note: This is the script of the prize-winning talk given by Helen Fujita of the Lahaina Junior Y.M.C.A. at the Territorial Y.M.C.A. Convention, held at the Baldwin Auditorium on August 17. The title of her talk was "My Religion and My Country.")

A few Sundays ago, a strange thing happened to me. I was standing in the yard of the church, waiting for the song of the bell to announce the fall to worship, when suddenly, I began to think. I was asking myself questions about which I had never thought much before. My thoughts ran like this: Why am I going to this Hongwanji, and not to a Baptist, Episcopal, or any other Christian church? Why am I, a Buddhist, in our community? It is because my grandparents and also my parents are Buddhists? Is that why, when even as a young child, I came to church with my mother, I was so anxious to drop the nickel into the box, and then, in my mind, one question followed another so rapidly that I soon found myself challenged with these puzzling thoughts: Here I am, an American and a Buddhist. I know that America was founded by people of the Christian faith. However, many cultures and many religions have greatly influenced the growth and development of our country since its inception. What has my religion, Buddhism, to offer? I knew then, why I had such faith in Buddhism, and I knew that that faith would help to make me a better American, because I think a good Buddhist is a good American.

First of all, the fundamental principle of Buddhism and Americanism is the same. Is not freedom in America for all, regardless of race, color, or creed? Was not the task of our Lord Buddha to found a "world religion which might be embraced by all men, irrespective of caste or color?"

Therefore, is it not evident to all that belief in the principle of Buddhism serves to strengthen faith in the ideals of our nation? This is true, and is a great contribution of Buddhism to democracy.

Again, in our confused and bewildered world of today, our country needs good leaders and sensible followers: citizens who are capable of making wise and just decisions; men and women who are willing to sacrifice, who are charitable and who are confident. Was not the teaching of Buddha, Who greater self discipline can be found than that which is earned by the one who endeavors to follow the noble Eightfold Path of my religion? Was the aim of Buddhism to teach the disciple the path to "right wisdom through right conduct"? What greater contribution can any country ask of a religion than that it help to deliver its citizens out of "passion, desire, Karma, and pain" to the end that these same citizens may help to build a better nation and a better world.

And so, let us who are here to day dedicate ourselves to the perpetuation of Buddhism in Hawaii. Let us attend church regularly, actively participate in Y.M.C.A. work, and willingly co-operate in order to complete each task which we may be called upon to perform. Let us make Buddhism live in Hawaii! Let us gain renewed courage in this effort by the example of the valor of the noble sons of Hawaii who have died on the battlefields of their country—unafraid—because clutched in their weak and trembling hands were their rosaries and on their dying lips were the sacred words "Namu Amida Butsu." They had faith in their country and in their religion.

Yes, on that morning, a few Sun days ago, as I walked up the steps of the church and down the aisle to my seat, I knew why I was at that church that Hongwanji, not a church of any other religion. I know now that there is a definite

Hawaii Park Is Now 35 Years Old

Became National Park By Congressional Act In 1916

Hawaii National Park, which is divided into two sections—Kilauea, on the Big Island, and Haleakala, on Maui—was 35 years old on Saturday, August 25.

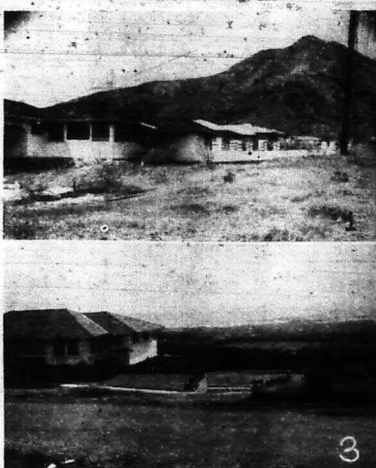
The park includes the world's most active volcanic area. Its two volcanoes, Kilauea and Mauna Loa, have been more consistently active than any other similar phenomena.

Haleakala Crater, home of the unique silverwood plant, is one of the world's largest volcanic craters.

The movement to set aside the land of Pele as a National Park was sparked by the late Lorin P. Thurston. Aiding him in promoting the establishment of the park were Prince Kuhio, then delegate to Congress from Hawaii; Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, noted volcanologist; and others.

Prince Kuhio and Dr. Jaggar appeared before Congressional committees in Washington to testify in support of the legislation creating the park.

In noting the park's anniversary, Superintendent Frank R. Oberhansley said, "In the 35 years since its establishment, the significance of the Park to the Territory and the Nation has increased manifold. Like all of the areas of the National Park System, this Park belongs to all Americans, regardless of race, creed or national origin. These of us in the National

1952 March of Dimes To Begin On January 2

NEW YORK, Aug. 27—The 1952 March of Dimes campaign will start two weeks earlier than usual, it was announced today by Basil O'Connor, president of the National

Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to allow for a more ambitious drive because "the March of Dimes has not kept pace with the march of polio."

In a letter to the National Foundation, 2,845 "local" chapters throughout the United States and its territories, O'Connor said the 1952 campaign for polio fighting funds would begin on Jan. 2, instead of Jan. 15, and extend through Jan. 31st.

"It already is apparent," O'Connor said, "that the money raised in the last March of Dimes will not be sufficient to take care of the 1951 polio situation. The National Foundation probably will end the year about \$5,000,000 in debt for patient care expenditures."

Aside from new cases, our chapters in 1951 are helping an estimated 45,000 old cases. Because of this, we find we must start the 1952 March of Dimes earlier than

usual and make it a more ambitious drive than ever before."

O'Connor called upon all chapters to assure the success of the enlarged drive by pleading earlier enlistment of volunteers in large numbers, taking on new fund-raising projects and acquainting the public with the organization's serious financial situation.

22,000 Used Airports In Tri Islands

HAC Gives Summary Of Activities In June

Maui County airports handled 11,352 outgoing and 11,841 incoming passengers during the month of June, according to the Hawaii Aeronautics Commission's inter-island revenue passengers and cargo summary.

The report, released in mid-August, revealed that Maui airport at Punene ranked second in the Territory in outgoing passengers, 7,557, and incoming passengers, 7,686. Honolulu airport led in both divisions with totals of 22,431 and 22,340, respectively. Kilauea airport on Hawaii was third and Lihue held on Kauai was fourth.

Maui airport and Kahului field ranked second and fourth, respectively, in outgoing freight with 226,563 pounds and 231,519 pounds, respectively. Kahului was fourth with 151,978 pounds and Maui sixth with 110,861 in incoming pounds.

Maui airport was third in both outgoing and incoming pounds of express. There were 17,241 outgoing pounds and 27,497 incoming. It was also third in outgoing airmail, 5,199 pounds, and in incoming airmail, 4,842.

The following is the breakdown on the total for Maui County airports:

Outgoing passengers (11,352) — Maui, 7,557; Hana, 311; Molokai, 2,162; Kalaupapa, 140; and Lanai, 912.

Incoming passengers (11,841) — Maui, 7,686; Kahului, 13; Hana, 560; Molokai, 2,522; Kalaupapa, 148; and Lanai, 741.

Outgoing freight (626,918 pounds) — Maui, 226,563; Kahului, 231,519; Hana, 4,227; Molokai, 3,916; Kalaupapa, 6,134; and Lanai, 23,429.

Incoming freight (282,796

pounds) — Maui, 110,861; Kahului, 151,978; Hana, 6,194; Molokai, 72,365; Kalaupapa, 27,064; and Lanai, 112,531.

Outgoing express (21,265 pounds) — Maui, 17,241; Hana, 274; Molokai, 1,369; and Lanai, 2,509.

Incoming express (29,983 pounds) — Maui, 27,497; Hana, 453; Molokai, 8,039; and Lanai, 4,021.

Outgoing airmail (47,051 pounds) most.

—Punene, 5,199; Hana, 141; Molokai, 722; Kalaupapa, 474; and Lanai, 504.

WE ANTICIPATE THE WATER NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE OF MAUI COUNTY

Recently the Maui County Waterboard received a petition signed by 100 residents of Kaunakakai requesting that immediate attention be given to their plight of a water lack due to the extreme draught conditions during the past few months. The Board is happy to state that it had taken the initial steps to solve these problems at Kaunakakai 18 months previous to the receipt of this petition. We have every hope that this remedy will be in effect on the Friendly Isle in a very short time. And here is how we anticipated Molokai's needs



HERE'S A TOAST TO WATER, NATURE'S GREATEST BOON TO MAN

The Island of Molokai has six water systems operated by the Maui County Waterworks Board. These systems are: (1) Makalele-Kaunakakai; (2) Kawela-Kaunakakai; (3) Kamalo; (4) Ualapue; (5) Halawa; (6) Waihalala-Kala.

As of June 30, 1951, there were 430 consumers in all the systems. A complete financial report for July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951 shows a total revenue of \$12,923.00 and a total operating expense of \$55,511.00, or an operating loss of \$42,588.00. Since its inception, the Maui County Waterworks Board has been cognizant of this very poor return for the entire island, and therefore, have made plans to eliminate much of the operating expenses of several of the systems by the installation of electrical pumps.

In October of 1949 the consulting services of H. A. R. Austin was obtained and immediately started to make a study for a long-range improvement program.

In the interim, the Waterworks Board paid the Molokai Electric Company about \$5,000.00 in the way of rights-of-way clearing,

digging of holes, etc., for the extension of electrical service to Kawela. This project was completed some time in February of 1950, and the Maui County Waterworks Board immediately installed an electrical pump at Kawela to deliver with the present 4" pipe about 100,000 gallons a day to augment the gravity supply from Makalele. Normally, the gravity supply amounts to about 100,000 gallons per day; however, during the recent dry spell, the average for the month of June was 5,000 gallons per day. Consequently, the pump system at Kawela was severely taxed.

In line with Mr. Austin's recommendations, contracts were let on November 14th to American Factors, Limited for 7,200 feet of 8" pipe and 13,200 feet of 6" Century cement-asbestos pipe. The

pipe delivered for \$35,674.80 is now on site and final details on plans and specifications are being drawn up to let the contract for installation of this section out to bids.

On December 8, 1950, contracts were let for \$18,365.00 for two 100,000 gallon steel tanks, one to be erected at Kanoa and the other to be erected in the back of Kaunakakai.

The Board has purchased a new motor for the Kawela pump which will be installed as soon as the larger line has been completed and the tanks have been erected. The Waterboard has also purchased a new pump and electric motor for Ualapue. The Board has paid to the Molokai Electric Co. \$10,000.00 in advance for electrification of the line out to Ualapue.

This expenditure will be reimbursed to the Maui County Waterworks Board from consumption revenues paid to the Molokai Electric Co. on the part of electric consumers in the area covered by the electrification extension.

Installation of the pump at Ualapue will be carried out in the very immediate future as notice has been received from Molokai Electric that power lines will be at Ualapue this month. Electrification of this system will eventually mean the elimination of the Kamalo System. Part of the 4" line now going into Kaunakakai will be salvaged and laid from the new electric pump at Ualapue to Kamalo. Full electrification of Kawela and Ualapue will result in tremendous savings in that both systems will be operated automatically, and will be checked by the overseer or his assistant for routine maintenance. It is anticipated that the system into Kaunakakai will be completed in from 90-120 days, depending upon the final receipt of steel sheets for the tank and certain special pipe fittings and appurtenances which are extremely difficult to procure at this time.

100 Acres Added To Hawaii Pine Planting Project

Kohala Sugar Co.'s pineapple planting experiment is being enlarged by about 100 acres, according to a recent announcement by Manager Harry J. W. Taylor of the big island plantation.

New seed-bearing pineapple crowns for the additional plantings are being grown by the Baldwin Packers' pineapple plantation at Lahaina, Maui. For last year's plantings, nearly 2 1/2 million pineapple seed crowns were delivered to the plant.

Additional plantings will bring Kohala's total pineapple plantings to about 250 acres. No additional pineapple plantings were made about the middle of last year. It was the first commercial pineapple planting to be made on the island of Hawaii in 25 years.

Success of last year's plantings will not be measured until the crop is harvested next year, Manager Taylor said. However, he added, growth to date has been encouraging enough to warrant planting an additional 100 acres.

New York Spot Raw Sugar Price Up By \$2.40

Showing signs of some regained strength, the New York spot raw sugar price last week advanced a total of \$2.40 to stand at week's end at \$129 a ton.

At its present level, the spot raw price is back to where it was at the outset of this month, before the declines of recent weeks began.

According to information received by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, changes in the spot raw price came as follows: Wednesday, August 22, up 40 cents to \$118 a ton; Thursday, up 22 to \$120.

The rising spot raw price, however, had no immediate effect on refined sugar prices both locally and on the mainland. Mainland cane refiners are still quoting 5.50 cents a pound generally. The local cane sugar price at the Ales refinery remains 8.35 cents, the usual 15 points below the Pacific coast quotation.

Doctors To Hold Confab In Honolulu

Between five and seven hundred doctors, representing the nations bordering on the Pacific, are expected to attend the fifth Congress of the Pan-Pacific Surgical Association in Honolulu, November 7 to 19.

Dr. F. J. Pinkerton, President of the Association, who has been appointed travel agent for those coming to the meeting, said that hotel and carrier reservations are pouring in every day.

Between 250 and 450 doctors will be coming from the mainland, the doctor said. Medical men from South American nations, Australia, New Zealand, China, Japan, the Philippines, Alaska and Canada, will also attend.

The first such Congress was held here in Hawaii in 1929. At that time, it was planned to hold succeeding meetings every three years. World events, however, have permitted but four conferences since that time, the last in 1948.

Object of the Pan-Pacific Surgical Association, according to Dr. Pinkerton, is to bring together surgeons from countries bordering the Pacific Ocean to permit the exchange of surgical ideas and methods.

This session, scientific meetings are planned from November 12 to 16, leaving the remaining week for social events and inter-island travel. Tours to all the neighbor islands are now being arranged for many of the visiting doctors and their families.

Besides nearly all of Hawaii's resident surgeons, many world famous doctors are expected to attend the Congress. One such physician, who has already written of his plans to attend is Dr. John W. Cline of San Francisco, the President of the American Medical Association.

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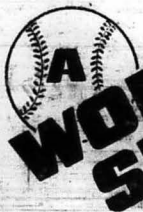

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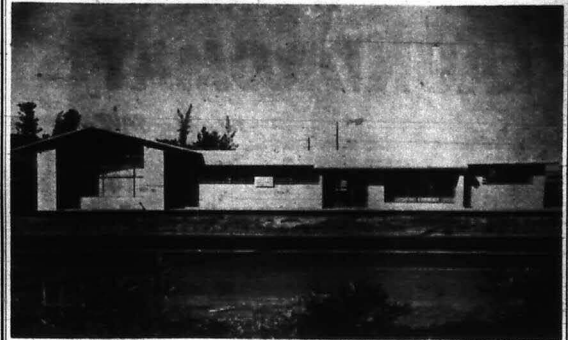
