

Gov. Ige's State of the State address today at 10 a.m.

The Governor's 2018 State of the State Address on January 22 will be broadcast live at 10 a.m. on 'Ōlelo channel 49 (channel 77 on the Mānoa cable network), to the Neighbor Islands via HITS, and <u>streamed online</u>. UH West O'ahu would receive 14 more full-time positions under <u>Hawai'i Gov. David Ige's Fiscal Year 2019</u> supplemental budget request being submitted to the Legislature for consideration. The proposed supplemental budget for UH West O'ahu would add \$900,000 to UHWO's operating budget for 2018-2019.

UH System, campuses (including UH West O'ahu) to encourage former students to return to school

The University of Hawai'i has begun planning for a statewide campaign to help former UH students return and earn their degree. A two-day planning session kicked off the planning last week, with UH West O'ahu providing the venue for participants on the second day. UH West O'ahu administrators, faculty, and staff also participated in the sessions.

UH is planning to target 34,000 former students who attended classes during the past five years but did not complete their degree or certificate. UH President David Lassner noted the effort will help the state to meet its "55 by 25" target, a program that endeavors to ensure the state's economic competitiveness by having 55 percent of working-age adults obtain a 2- or 4-year degree by 2025. Lassner noted that Hawai'i's employers will need more workers with postsecondary credentials.


Attendees of the planning session heard about returning adult programs operated by Indiana and Tennessee. The event sponsors included the Lumina Foundation, the Harold K.L. Castle Foundation, the UH Office of the President, the UH Office of the Vice President for Community Colleges, and the Hawai'i Business Roundtable.

Happening now at UH: attackers are using "spear phishing" techniques to try to convince the recipients of malware-infected emails to open attachments or click on embedded links to infect the victim's computer. These spear phishing emails can be uniquely tailored to YOU - the intended victim - and can be sent from compromised UH email accounts or a compromised email account of a trusted colleague.

UHWO partners with EIKEN Foundation of Japan; EIKEN tests now accepted

The <u>University of Hawai'i–West O'ahu</u> has partnered with the <u>EIKEN Foundation of Japan</u> and will now accept EIKEN results as evidence of English proficiency. This partnership will allow all <u>University of Hawai'i</u> campuses to now accept the EIKEN test for admission purposes, making it the first statewide system of higher education in the nation to use the EIKEN test systemwide.

"Our use of the EIKEN test and present and future cooperative partnerships with the EIKEN Foundation of Japan will benefit UH West O'ahu's efforts at internationalizing the campus and connecting our Hawai'istudents to the world," UH West O'ahu Chancellor <u>Maenette Benham</u> said.

The University of Hawai'i has long been a major destination for Japanese students: UH Mānoa has more graduate students from Japan than any other university in the U.S., and Kapi'olani Community College has more undergraduate students from Japan than any institution in the nation. EIKEN tests are administered at more than 17,000 sites across Japan and are also administered in London, New York, Los Angeles and Honolulu. These tests are recognized by more than 400 institutions of higher education in the United States, Australia and Canada.

Expecting FedEX, UPS or U.S. Postal Service deliveries? Notify Security Department



Notification can be accomplished by emailing the details of delivery to uhwosec@hawaii.edu.

The following is the content of a letter was sent out to the following vendors: US Postal, FedEx, UPS:

As University of UH West O'ahu continues to grow, we are revising our delivery procedures. Effective Feb. 26, 2018, It shall be the policy of the UHWO campus to only allow authorized vehicles access to use the service road to the back of the current UHWO campus.

All Authorized Vehicles must check in:

- Any vendor or service vehicle arriving on campus for official business must stop at the security checkpoint for check in purposes.
- All vendor and delivery vehicle drivers must show photo identification.
- Security will verify the vendor/delivery schedule.
- Security will notate the vendor or delivery vehicle's arrival/departure on log sheet.
- Security will conduct a pre-cursory check of the vehicle requesting access to the service road.
- Security will only allow authorized vehicles to pass through the security checkpoint.
- Unauthorized deliveries/vehicles or unidentifiable personnel will be turned away.
- Deliveries will be accepted Monday through Friday between the hours of 7 a.m. 2 p.m.


