4 Hurt In Mishap At Ulupalakua

Christopher Bal of Paohakalo, operator of the vehicle which ran off the Ulupalakua road last Saturday night is currently confined at the Mahanui hospital, where he is receiving treatment for a spine injury.

Bal was transferred to Mahanui from the Kula General hospital, where he was taken after the mishap. The vehicle, which was driving in reverse, was hit by a seven-foot high embankment after colliding into a stone wall.

Three of the six passengers in the car were reported to have been injured. They were: Elmo Kahakua, who received bruises on the face; Frank Bal, external injuries; and Henry Kanahele, Frank Medeiros, and Lancelo Akuna were also in the car but were not injured.

The accident took place at about 10:37 Saturday night, on a slight bend on the Ulupalakua road, where Bal is believed to have lost control after traveling over a slight dip. Police were unable to obtain further information from the six other occupants of the car as all said last they had been sleeping.

The vehicle was a total loss with damages estimated at \$1,000.

Eligibility for free medical care under the bill is literally "wide open" to all residents of the islands. Section 7 of Act 158 merely states: "All persons classified as indigent or persons receiving assistance from the department of public welfare shall be eligible for all types of medical care." The department of public welfare shall maintain current eligible lists of such persons.

"The counties are authorized to determine medically indigent status through employment of competent, qualified personnel," and may receive assistance and advice from the department of public welfare and county advisory group."

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Cyclist In Crash With Milk Truck

Hidetoshi Honda, 17-year-old Kula motorcyclist, is confined at the Kula General hospital with a fractured skull after colliding into a parked milk truck on the Kula highway last Friday morning. The youth also suffered a broken upper jaw and numerous lacerations.

Honda is said to have driven his motorcycle into the opposite lane in passing two pedestrians. However, he failed to bring the vehicle back on its course in time to avoid the collision. He was found unconscious after the crash by Walter Sakamoto, operator of the parked milk truck, and transported to the hospital by a passing motorist.

More than \$1,000 worth of damages were reported in eight other traffic accidents on Maui and Molokai over the past weekend.

Juan Ruiz of Kanaakakai, Molokai, was uninjured but damages to his car were estimated at \$700 after he had driven off the Airport Road and overturned in a pineapple field last Sunday morning.

Narrario Abella, of Kamalo, whose car turned over on the Kam V Highway on Molokai, 14-year-old Rosalinda Del Castillo, who crossed the path of a car on a bicycle on Kaniela street in Wailuku, and three-year-old Valerie Ross, passenger of a car which was involved in a collision near the Maui Country Club, were reported as slightly injured.

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Rhoads Highlights VSBE T's; Ducks Awarded in

"Forfeit" Ruled By Ump Goshi

Third Loss For Cubs; MPCA Down Cards, 3-2, In Ninth Inning

A rhishank one of the strongest in the 14-year history of the Maui Senior League, resulted in the awarding of a forfeit, decided by Kahului Railroad Co. by Umpire Harry Goshi, as the Puenene Cubs suffered their third crucial loss which put them a full two games behind of the league leading Maui Pine nine last Sunday at the Kahului Fairgrounds.

The Puenene, who had their eight-game victory streak snapped by the Ducks only last week, continued to set a heavy pace by edging out the Wailuku Sugar Co. Cardinals, 2-1, only after two games behind in the last half of the ninth inning while Kula trounced the offensively weakened East Maui Pirates, 5-0, in the feature game.

Kahului's forfeit will continue the Cubs practically clinched the championship for the Puenene, who copied their ninth triumph against only one loss. The pace-setters will play EMCA, Hana, Kula, and Puenene in the order listed in their four remaining games.

MPCA 3, WSCo. 2—Castro Lugo, WSCo.'s line drive single which third baseman "Stu" Murakami was unable to hold scored both Gills. Goula, pitcher, hit David Oya as the Puenene wiped out a one-run deficit to down the Cards, 3-2, after two batters had been retired in the last half of the ninth inning.

The timely hit preserved south-paw Larry (Joe) Takahashi's perfect mound record and the victory was his sixth straight for the season against no losses. The defeat, on the other hand, was a heart-breaker for veteran Johnny Murray, who went the route for the Puenene, who were the first to trip into the first frame when he momentarily lost control, walking two successive batters to fill the bases after a double play, which would have ended the game, had failed.

The Puenene held a one-run lead for five innings after Stanley Honda, who tripped, scored on an infield ground-out in the second inning. Two wild throw errors in the 6th inning by shortstop Jerome Rocha and third sacker Mitsuo Yoshida gave life to two Cardinals batters, after two outs and John Farias pulled through with a hit after Murray had been intentionally walked to drive in both Hideo Murakami and Walter Correa. 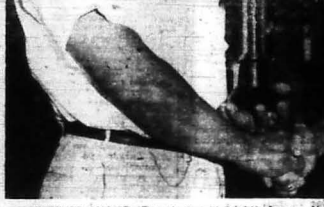

400 Took Exams For Collegians

Over 400 students took the College Qualification Test at the University of Hawaii on June 26, according to Lt. Colonel William A. Boyett, territorial director of Selective Service. Tests were held at 1,035 centers throughout the United States and territories with approximately 81,000 students taking them.

"Those who missed taking the test on the date assigned, because of circumstances beyond their control, should write to the Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 536, Princeton, New Jersey, and explain the reason for their failure to take the test on the assigned date," Colonel Boyett said. "The unused admission card for the assigned test should be enclosed with the letter. Every effort will be made to allow these students to take the test at a later date."

The first test on May 26 was taken by 163,000 eligible college students. The second test, June 16, was taken by 108,782 eligible students. Several shipments of test materials to the mainland have not yet been received at Princeton for scoring. When they are received, it is expected that the total examined on the second test will be approximately 107,000. Students who failed to make application for the test prior to the May 25th midnight deadline will not be permitted to take the test. The test scores or class standing in college or university are to be used by local board in determining the eligibility of registrants to be considered for occupational deferment as students by their local boards. Students are urged to have Form 109 filled with their local boards. This is a Selective Service form filled in by the college or university and will show students' academic standing.

Most colleges and universities have these forms on hand and will complete and mail them direct to the draft boards on the request of the students. Thus the local board will have both the results of the College Qualification Test and the students' collective standing for their consideration of deferment. Induction of college students has been postponed pending receipt of test scores, but in no case later than August 26.

John Duarte Is 55; Lifetime Spent On Maui

John Gomes Duarte, of Wailuku, veteran printer and Maui County senator since 1948, was 55 years old on Tuesday, July 10.

Duarte was born in Spreckelsville in 1886, the son of Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Duarte. His father is still living and has a home of his own in Iao, near the Keananui property of his son, who is also owner of the Haleakala Hotel. A lifetime resident of Maui, Duarte has spent 41 years in the printing business, including four on his own. He has been employed at Maui Publishing Company since 1933 and is presently the plant foreman for The Maui News. His interest in politics dates back to 1920.

Duarte is married and has a daughter, Mrs. Ray (Adele) Adams. He is looking forward to being a grandfather for the first time next month.

Two Years Needed To Reach OPS Requirements—Davis

An estimate of two years time will be required to get civilian and military production up to requirements, and prices within a fair production and consumer level, Stanley Davis, territorial price executive for the Hawaii Office of Price Stabilization, told a large gathering of members of the Retail Board at a luncheon meeting Friday at the Maui Grand Hotel.

In his estimate of what lies ahead in the field of Federal price control, Davis said, "As the end of two years I hope we can all go back to our respective businesses."

The price administrator pointed out that Hawaii is fortunate in that only local people have been employed in the territorial OPS setup so far. He pointed out that they are lucky because you have the only administrator of OPS on the other islands in Wilson P. Canton.

"If we can get you people to learn and understand our regulations with the help of Mr. Canton, we have part of our battle licked," Davis told his audience. He said that the big bulk of business people in Hawaii come under OPS 9 (Controlling Price Regulation) which applies to dollars and cents regulations on wholesale and retail trade.

He predicted, when asked by Victor Schaefer, Jr., what chance there was of changing the dollars and cents markup to a percentage markup as it was under the old OPA, that the merchants would be offered relief on that score within a short time.

He said he had been told that here on Maui a lot of people who do not pay any attention to OPS are, although Congress has not passed any enforcement regulations as yet, "We are here to try and keep you out of trouble," Davis remarked.

In discussing the present status of price control in Hawaii, Davis said the people were not prepared for it. It took time to develop an organization, and that it took him self three months to begin to understand his own job.

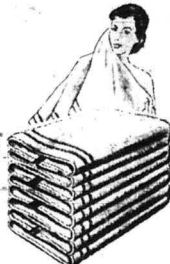

HONOLULU, July 10 — The Phillips Commercial School and the Galusha School of Business Training will move to new locations, effective August 15.

The Phillips Commercial School which is presently located at 1625 South King street will move to the quarters now occupied by the Galusha School at 74 South King street. The school is moving to its new location so that its students may have the benefit of receiving their training in a down town business environment, where they will later be employed.

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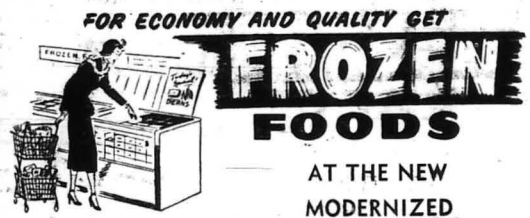

9,483 Own Sugar Stock In Hawaii

Hawaii's sugar industry is today owned by some 13,614 individual stockholders, about 70 per cent of whom live in Hawaii.

This information is shown in a survey just completed by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association. The survey covers all 28 Hawaiian sugar plantation companies and the six sugar agencies.

In addition to the total individual stockholder information, the survey discloses that: Some 9,483 stockholders, or 69.7 per cent of the total number, are residents of Hawaii; 4,026 stockholders, or 29.6 per cent, are residents of the U. S. mainland; and 105 stockholders, or 0.7 per cent, are residents of foreign countries.

The stockholder survey was initiated by the HSPA's public relations committee, of which John E. Russell, president, Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., is chairman.

Tabulation work was organized and supervised by T. M. Brown, HSPA treasurer. This task required almost two months to complete. Before actual counting could begin, the project required the elimination of all duplicate names among the stockholders of the 24 companies surveyed.

The week's spot price developments were the first signs of strength following last week's total decline of \$8 a ton, from the year's high of \$136 down to \$128 a ton.

While the spot price was showing this strength, mainland and local refined sugar prices continued to remain unchanged.

Estimates of Army purchases of local produce during November, 1951, show increased demand for some agricultural products over the September total, according to the University of Hawaii agricultural extension service. There will be a slight lowering in Army requirements for land products and vegetables. Estimated quantities during November will be: 40,000 pounds, 1,100 pounds, most of which is 17,000 pounds, green onions, 6,000 pounds, 6,000 pounds, green onions, 2,500 green peppers, 4,400, parsley, 2,000 and radishes, 2,400; tomatoes, 1,000; pumpkins, 1,700; watermelons, 400 and papaya, 3,200.

Molokai Teens In "Icebreaker" Hop

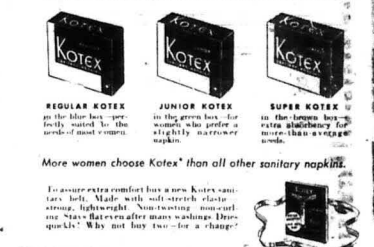

that would be added to Pioneer's cost if the union demands are met.

The story of Pioneer in varying degrees, is the story of every sugar plantation in Hawaii. Even the most profitable producers would be unable to meet the current demands and remain in business for long.

It is high time that the leadership of the ILWU, which we hope is genuinely and sincerely interested in maintaining a sound economy in Hawaii, come down to earth and asserted itself in a realistic manner.

Certainly demands that would impose an aggregate added burden of nearly fifty million dollars are not realistic.

They are aimed straight at the bull's eye of industrial bankruptcy.

It might be well for the rank and file union members to ponder this very real possibility.

If sugar should "go bust," or if the industry should cut back its operations to a scant minimum with only the most highly productive plantations remaining in business, what would happen to the 20,000 or more field and mill workers, the men and women who pay ILWU dues?

What would happen to their children?

What would happen to Hawaii, the territorial and county governments, the public schools, the highway systems, the health and sanitation programs, and everything else in the Islands?

The answers are all too obvious.

If sugar should "go bust," so would the people who work the industry and so would every governmental subdivision throughout the Territory.

So would everybody else!

The high degree of living in Hawaii, the excellence of the educational system, the fine network of highways, the miraculous development of health and sanitation throughout the Islands, the rank and file prosperity which permits day laborers to own their own homes, drive new automobiles, and send their children to college, would all disappear with the deterioration of Hawaii's sound economy, an economy dependent upon sugar for its survival!

The ILWU, unmindful of these plain and obvious facts, has handled the sugar industry bankruptcy demands.

By this act, the union leadership has demonstrated a wanton disregard for the welfare of its members as well as the future security of every living person in Hawaii.

It has proposed that we return to the dark ages!

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"Why Go To College"

EDITOR'S NOTE: Alfred P. Haake, Ph.D., Mayor of Park Ridge, Ill., is a noted Economist, Business Consultant, Lecturer and Author. There was a time when the practical value of a college education was not so much in "finishing schools," unless it was in preparation for some profession like teaching or the ministry. But now the poorest of parents give their children the advantages we missed in our youth, and among these looms the college.

While college may prove to be not much more than a "winter rest" for many, it may be a most important step toward success. We see the college now, many of us, as the avenue through which even the day laborer's son may become a lawyer, a doctor, a dentist, or even a great business man, and make more money than his hard-working father ever dreamed of making.

So we troop to college. And so do the people who want to train youth to think as they would for youth think. Here is a wonderful opportunity to see and eager young minds into channels they would otherwise escape in practical occupations. So many colleges are said to have become hotbeds of radicalism, superficial cynicism and even atheism. Behind the glamour and idealism of high-down theories and phrases, boys and girls have been taught to believe much that is not true, but which is calculated to turn them against the very system which made college possible for them.

So it is that parents who send their children away to school often have serious misgivings as to what college is going to do to their offspring. The head of an eastern school for girls, for example, frankly admitted teaching both ideal and practical questions, and says that the girls can get those things at home. So she sees it that they get only the radical side, and grinds out dainty little essays on the nonsense on which we build this country.

There is room for a college where everyone in the institution is dedicated to teaching. It would be a real school, with understanding of and love for the virtues and sturdy self-reliance that built private enterprise and prosperity in our country. It would be a college teaching the old-fashioned honesty that impels men to pay their debts as a matter of honor, to work for what they want and ask no more security than they are willing and able to provide for themselves.

Would you, gentle reader, like to know that there is such a school somewhere in these United States? Would you want a child there, and to think straight, to deal honestly with facts, and to rely on his own strength and initiative as the passport to opportunity? Then you would welcome the challenge of a college which taught genuine Americanism, respect for our forefathers and what they stood for, and which deliberately trained boys and girls to become men and women who would be actually concerned over the radical and deteriorating teaching which is the standard of the present-day college.

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
