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Sugar Issues to Arbitration

Arbitration of three points still unsettled in contract negotiations between the sugar plantation companies and the ILWU will begin Wednesday, July 24.

Agreement was reached on most items in the talks last April 16. Since then agreement has been reached on a dental plan and on changes in the grievance procedure.

Items which will be arbitrated include:

1. Classification increases-how to distribute two cents of the 10-cents-an-hour increase effective next February.

2. Medical plan - definition of "emergency", the matter of an industry-wide medical committee and the question of off-island medical care.

3. Pension plan - involving benefits, vesting and disability terminations.

Ewa's Oldtimers



The "oldtimer" of the week is H. CHADSEY PENHALLOW. He has to his credit a total of 32 years and 1 month of service at Ewa.

Born in Wailuku, Maui, he attended schools on that island and graduated from Maui High in 1927. He furthered his education at the University of Hawaii, graduating in 1931 with a Bachelor of Science degree.

Starting as a Statistics Clerk in the accounting department he was promoted three years later to Irrigation Section Overseer. Following completion of a short course in agriculture at the HSPA Experiment Station in 1938 he was promoted to the position of Research Agriculturist. He was named the Company's Operations Analyst in 1941.

Entering the military service in December, 1941, he served in the Central Pacific area. At the time of separation from the Army in 1945, he held the rank of Lt. Colonel. At present he is a Lt. Colonel in the Army reserve.

Following his military service, Chad returned to Ewa and in addition to his duties as Operations Analyst, Ewa's safety program came under his direction.

Mr. Penhallow is an outstanding civic leader with a wide range of interests. He has been very active in various organizations and was the past president of Kiwanis Club of Honolulu, Ewa Recreation Association and Ewa Orchid Society.
