Kapio funding in jeopardy

The ASKCC Student Senate has asked the college's Instructional Services Department to partially pay for Kapio. The newspaper could fold if they

According to ASKCC President Hank Rosario, the Senate has been paying Kapio's printing costs since the paper first came out. "We've been doing this traditionally and automatically for years and never before asked why?"

But Rosario said his Finance Committee, which formulates

the Senate's budget, recently students' activity fees, must now asked the Department why Kapio was being funded with student activity fees?

"We found out that the paper was part of instructional courses Journalism 205-207," he said. "But when we asked them why the Department wasn't partially funding Kapio, they said it was our paper and that we should

Rosario assured Kapio that the Senate is not against the paper and wants to see it continue. "But we, as guardians of the ask ourselves why we should fund the paper?'

Rosario said the Senate has already set aside funds to keep Kapio operating during the 1979-80 academic year. "We made some concessions with Instructional Services that I can't comment on at this time."

But Rosario indicated that next year's Senate may stop funding Kapio if I.S. doesn't chip in. "All we're doing is asking questions right now. I don't know what'll happen in the future."

ASKCC approves '79-'80 budget

The ASKCC Senate has approved a \$44,000 operating budget for the 1979-80 academic year. (Funds for the budget come from activity fees, student services and money not spent last year.)

The senate has appropriated \$7,000 to pay for student help. This includes \$3,000 for the Senate's clerical and research staff, \$1,000 for a student activities programmer, \$1,500 for a yet-to-be-hired athletics coordinator and \$1,500 for Kapio's typists and publications assistants.

The Senate also appropriated \$8,500 for KCC's Fall and Spring semester activity days. It also set aside \$1,250 for new programs, \$8,725 for athletics and \$2,500 to operate ASKCC next summer.

The most controversial item found in the budget is a \$2,000 appropriation for stipends. Each ASKCC senator will get \$10 in stipends for each Senate meetining they attend.

But the Senate turned down funding requests from the KCC Art Club and Diamond Head singers. Each group got only \$100 of the funds they had requested.

The Art club had requested \$595 to pay for five panel boards, and artists film series, a Spring Art show, a figure drawing session and annual membership fees to the college art program. The singers wanted \$1,300 for uniforms and travel expenses to perform in Samoa.

But Senate Vice-President


Jerome Ciupak said most of these projects were disapproved by the Senate because they wouldn't have benefitted KCC as a whole.

The Senate also refused to pay all of Kapio's printing costs. The newspaper had asked for \$5,760 but got only \$4,880.

ASKCC also refused to pay \$300 for Kapio's transportation expense.

Financial aid

Attending college is expensive, and KCC may be able to solve some of those bills. For financial assistance, see Cynthia Kimura in the Student Services Center at Pensacola. There are several financial plans available, such as, the BEOG (Basic Education Opportunity Grant), for those who are in financial need, the NDSL (National Direct Student Loan), a government loan that charges 3 percent interest one year after the student graduates, and the CWSP (College Work Study Program), a program that allows the student to work while attending school.



Sometime during the last week in September, Student Services in building 929 will move to the newly renovated building, 926. At this time, Student Government will set up a place in building 929 which will be used as a Student Center. This center will primarily serve as a lounging area for the students of KCC.

Furniture, a ping-pong table, a pool table and the concession will be located at the Student Center. According to Jerome Ciupak, Student Body Vice-President, a full-time student government personnel will be available to those students who seek help. Student government personnel will include elected officers and senators.

This study-lobby area, which will be located upstairs of the Kapio office, will be a satellite office for student government. "It should provide the students with at least a place to study and

hang-around in," says Ciupak. Since building 929 is old and surely destined to be condemned, no renovations will be made to the building. The last building to be renovated until the new "master plan" can be put into effect will be the Student Services building, 926.

This office will continue to serve the students the same as the Pensacola office, only on a smaller scale.

Counselor Ike Matsumura is permanently stationed at the Diamond Head campus. The processing of all forms, including class scheduling, parking citations, application for degree and change of major can be done here. The job placement center is also locatd in the student services office.

Can teachers be fired?

Q. What is tenure and can teachers who have it be fired?

A. A teacher, who achieves tenure, is permitted to conduct her course as she sees fit. Nontenured teachers are governed however by the edicts of their employers.

A teacher is usually tenured when she completes five years of continuous academic service. But she must first receive favorable recommendations from her students, other teachers and the college's administrative officials.

But KCC Provost Joyce Tsunoda said tenured teachers can be dismissed. "According to our collective bargaining agreement, a college administrator can suspend or fire a tenured teacher if he feels that person has failed to fulfill her professional obligation."

"The administrator however must give the teahcer (and her union) a written statement explaining his decision," she said. "The teacher could subsequently challenge it in court."

But Tsunoda said KCC carefully studies each case before such disciplinary action is considered.

Q. If a student wants to file a complaint against a KCC teacher, how should he go about

A. Tsunoda said the complaint should be written out and submitted to her or one of KCC's deans. "we'd first try to resolve the problem by talking to both the teacher and student.'

"But if we follow up and find that such action is warranted," she added "then firm action will be taken against the teacher."

Tsunoda said she's willing to take firm action "if the reasons are adequate enough."

Registration goes well



But they subsequently found out that they really didn't have to!


Believe it or not, registration went smoothly for just about everyone. The majority of the comments received from students were favorable. They ranged from steady moving lines to a wide variety of classes.
