New Kahului For Kahului First On Priority List

A new Kahului School, to be constructed in the "Dream City" area, tops the list of school construction projects the Board of Supervisors expects to undertake with funds from a \$970,000 bond issue.

The Board, meeting as the committee of the whole, reached its decision on December 12. The priority list, however, was not made public until Thursday afternoon.

While debating on the amount available for school construction, the Board took into consideration the sum of \$200,000 which is estimated to be the market value of the present Kahului School site.

This gave the Board a total of \$1,070,000 which was distributed as follows (in priority order):

- 1—New Kahului School (31 classrooms, administrative building, cafeteria, and purchase of new site), \$700,000.
- 2—Maui High Cafeteria (additional needed to supplement funds granted by Act 280, S.L.H. 1953, as amended), \$30,000.
- 3—New Iao School Cafeteria, \$85,000.
- 4—New Molokai High School Cafeteria, \$125,000.
- 5—Maui High Vocational-Art Building (deleted from Master Plan; detail drawings completed), \$17,000.
- 6—Maui High Cafeteria (enlarge cafeteria and provide overhead cover for walkways), \$25,000.
- 7—Reserve fund to be held for future school construction. (Continued on Page 8)

Crane And Fujita To Be Ordained

Priesthood Ceremonies Scheduled Monday In Honolulu

The Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy, Bishop of Honolulu, will ordain the Rev. Charles H. Crane and the Rev. Masao Fujita to the priesthood on Monday, December 22, at 10 a.m. at St. Andrew's Cathedral.

Mr. Crane will be presented by the Very Rev. James S. Cordean of the Cathedral; and Mr. Fujita will be presented by the Rev. Claude F. Du Tell, Archdeacon of Maui and Molokai.

The Rev. Charles H. Crane will preach the ordination sermon. Other officiating ministers will be the Rev. Canon Francis H. O'Neil, who will read the Gospel, Master of Ceremonies; and the Rev. Samuel Van Culin Jr., Canon Precentor of the Cathedral.

Mr. Crane was born in Honolulu, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Crane, and grandson of Charles S. Crane, former Mayor of Honolulu.

Fujita, vice president and general manager of The Maui Publishing Company, Ltd., was born in Japan.

Mr. Crane attended Punahoa School, and was graduated from Maui High School in 1941. He was graduated from the University of Iowa in engineering in 1951, and from the University of Hawaii in 1953. (Continued on Page 3)

Commissioners To Select 450 For Jury Duty

Names of 50 grand and 400 trial jurors are expected to be drawn at 10 a.m. on December 31, according to an announcement made by the jury commissioners of the Second Circuit Court.

The commissioners planned to submit their report to Circuit Judge Cable A. Wirtz yesterday (Friday).

The list had been working on the jury list since November 18, when they began going over the roster of voters registered for the 1956 general election. This was followed by the mailing of questionnaires to the prospective jurors.

At 18 of the 1957 Territorial Legislature provides for the selection of 400 Maui County citizens subject to duty as trial jurors. Prior to the enactment of the 1957 law, the jury commissioners for the Second Circuit Court selected only 100 citizens for jury duty.

Jury commissioners for Maui are: Eugene Bal, J. V. Cockett, clerk of the Second Circuit Court; Arthur B. Fernandez; Isamu Ogasawara, and William O. Smith.

The movie was titled "Rodney" and featured the story of an athlete who contracted tuberculosis.

Maalaea Is Given 'Top Priority'

Harbor Commissioners Place Boat Harbor In 'First Place'

The Board of Supervisors was informed yesterday (Friday) that the improvement of the Maalaea Small Boat Harbor has been given "top priority" by the Territorial Board of Harbor Commissioners.

James O. Yapp, manager-chief engineer of the Harbor Board, informed Supervisors in a letter that "The Harbor Commissioners, in its own established priority list of projects authorized under Act 150, has placed the Maalaea Small Boat Harbor project in first place."

Mr. Yapp further informed Supervisors that the commission has requested an "advance" of \$5,000 for "study and drawing up of plans and specifications" for the project.

The money, he said, has not yet been authorized.

The Harbor Commissioners apparently took the matter up at a meeting held in Honolulu this week. Pushing the project was David K. Ezomoto, Maui member of the Harbor Board.

On the same subject, Colin C. Cameron, County Committee Chairman of the Republican Party, called on the Governor to discuss the mooring facility problem on Maui's South Shore.

Support was also given by Supervisors, who passed a resolution at their last meeting supporting improvement to the Maalaea Small Boat Harbor.

The necessity for proper mooring facilities in the Maalaea area was highlighted as the result of damage done to the harbor.

Hale Makua, UPW Reach Agreement

A new one-year contract, effective January 1, has been agreed upon Wednesday between Hale Makua and the United Public Workers, it was revealed last Thursday.

The new contract, yet to be signed by either party, grants pay raises and other fringe benefits to bargaining unit employees of Hale Makua.

The UPW represents the employees.

Salary benefits in the contract include three incremental steps for employees in each of the four pay grades. The increments come after six months, 18 months and 30 months.

More specifically, they are as follows (with base pay and cost of living):

Change Made In County Refuse Collection Days

A revised refuse collection schedule, which will be in effect from January 3 only, has been announced by John K. Leong, coordinator of services for the County Department of Public Works.

The new schedule will be as follows:

- 1—All business establishments will receive regular collection service except on Christmas and New Year's Day.
- 2—All homes that receive regular collection service on Mondays and Tuesdays will be served on Mondays and Fridays instead.
- 3—Homes enjoying collection service on Wednesdays and Fridays will have their refuse picked up on Thursdays only, December 28 and January 2.
- 4—"Wednesdays only" points will be serviced on Tuesdays, December 24 and 31.
- 5—Mr. Leong said the temporary schedule is being put into effect so that employees of the refuse collection department will be able to enjoy the half-day granted by Chairman Eddie F. Lam on December 24 and 31.

Dr. Joseph E. Ferkany, resident physician at Kala Sanatorium and General Hospital, is the new president of the Maui County Medical Society.

Dr. Ferkany was elected as successor to Dr. Mamoru Tokujima of Wailuku at the meeting held Tuesday night at the Maui Memorial Hospital.

Dr. Ferkany was elected as treasurer. Dr. Kashiwa is presently serving as vice president.

The society is composed of 28 physicians residing on Maui, Molokai, and Lanai.

Trial Date Set For Men Charged With Gross Cheat

MEDA Proposal Well Received At EPCA Meet

HONOLULU, Dec. 20 (Via Radiophone)—Maui Economic Development Association's five-year "Maui Plan" received a favorable and warm reception at the morning session of the Economic Planning and Coordination Authority today.

Rep. E. C. Cravallio, one of seven Maui legislators attending the EPCA meeting, said that EPCA action on the MEDA proposal will be "helped up for an evaluation in terms of ideas expressed by Governor William F. Quinn . . . who is 100 percent back of the Maui plan."

Governor Quinn has indicated that he will appoint "post haste" a neighbor island development council, whose members will determine what can be done on the Territorial level to help meet the problems of all counties. The Governor said he believes in the elimination of duplication of efforts towards economic development.

The council is to be submitted to the Legislature by January 10.

Ready To Grant Wage Boost But 25c 'Impossible'

The President of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association said Friday the sugar industry is "prepared to take a strike and we will do so" unless the ILWU reduces its wage demand to a "reasonable area far below 25 cents."

Boyd MacNaughton emphasized: "We are not refusing a wage increase. We told the union at the first negotiation meeting that we are prepared to negotiate a wage increase in an amount consistent with the financial situation and prospects of the industry."

Hawaii's sugar companies have strong purpose not to bow to the union's demands which would add another \$125 million a year to the industry's wage costs, he said. The industry is ready to take a strike, if necessary, he said.

Mr. MacNaughton, C. Brewer & Co. president who was elected head of the HSPA early this month, spoke to a special meeting of the boards of directors of the Hawaiian Chamber of Commerce and the Retail Board.

His talk, outlining the industry position, followed by only two days a complete rejection of all the union's demands by the sugar companies negotiating committee.

Mr. MacNaughton also said management believes the ILWU has no intention of reaching a reasonable settlement in less than four weeks and determined months ago to have a sugar-strike. He said management has reached this conclusion because the union has not modified its "25 cents or strike" position despite the fact that the union has observed the industry's demand is completely unrealistic.

Industry representatives "mean to us that the union has explained management's problems with 'great patience and in great detail' but the union has 'pushed all this aside as being of no consequence whatsoever.'"

"This kind of refusal to face economic facts which must be faced," said Mr. MacNaughton, "means to us that the union has no intention of reaching a reasonable settlement in the near future, but is bent on a strike program which could have serious results for the sugar industry and for the economy of the islands."

"In short, we believe that the union has taken a position which is not in its own best interest because it determined months ago that there would be a strike in the sugar industry in Hawaii."

"Because the union's demand is so far beyond anything that is going to be considered, either by the union or by the industry, we will be forced to prepare ourselves for whatever comes from this situation."

Mr. MacNaughton said that "any industry which knuckles under to demands it cannot live with, cannot hope to survive."

"To take a strike on these terms" he said, "requires strong purpose on the part of the entire industry. We possess it. I want to assure you that the sugar industry is not going to come winking and bowing by slow strangulation of the kind the union is suggesting by its \$125 million demand, or by any quicker method."

"We always hope for peaceful settlement in any negotiations, but we cannot make concessions beyond what prudent business judgement dictates."

Mr. MacNaughton stressed that if the Hawaiian sugar industry is to continue to be an important factor in the economy of the islands it must be able to operate "in a reasonable profitable area."

A 10-man, two-woman jury was expected to start deliberating late yesterday (Friday) as the Circuit court trial of P. O. Muna of Puuene, charged with a morals offense, neared its end.

Muna is charged with an offense against a 13-year-old girl, who was under 12 years old when the alleged act took place.

Trial began on Tuesday afternoon with Muna being represented by Attorney Nadao Yoshinaga. First Deputy County Attorney Meyer Uekoa was the prosecutor.

Matson Files Freight Rate Boost Of 9%

New tariffs reflecting a nine per cent increase in ocean freight rates between the Pacific coast and Hawaii were filed with the Federal Maritime Board by Matson Navigation Company today.

The new rates, applying equally to all types of commodities "across the board" are to become effective January 20, 1968, on thirty day statutory notice. Randolph Terry, Matson president, said the rate adjustment is required because "Matson's costs of providing freighter service have increased at the rate of \$4,500,000 in the current year. This is the highest rate of cost advance in the company's history."

Most of the \$4,500,000 increase in the cost of doing business went to shore and seafaring labor in wages and for fuel oil, repairs and maintenance to the freighter fleet, he added. Also bearing on the cost of increase, Seiden pointed out, is the fact that Matson derived only partial benefit during 1967 from the rate increase averaging 9.4 per cent filed in December, 1966.

The MEDA plan will come up for final action at the January 24 meeting of EPCA, according to Mr. Allen.

The EPCA Chairman telephoned The Maui News during a break in what was termed "an all-day session."

Helping to push the MEDA proposal were Maui's Senators and Representatives, who went to Honolulu to present Maui's case before EPCA.

In Honolulu were Senators John C. Duane and S. George Kukui, and Representatives Elmer F. Cravalho, Marquis F. Calmes, Ray F. Adams, Percy Lydgate, and Barney Tokunaga.

Rep. Nadeo Yoshinaga, who supported the program, was unable to attend the meeting since he is representing a client in a Circuit Court jury case before EPCA.

Maui legislators met at noon Wednesday at the Wailuku Hotel to discuss the subject. They met again that evening to complete their plans.

Rep. Cravalho was designated chairman by the legislators.

MEDA's economic development program is designed to induce new industries, the tourism, and tourists to come to Maui.

Chairman of MEDA is R. R. Doel Lyons, manager of the Maui Electric Company.

The MEDA program was endorsed last weekend by the Democratic Territorial Central Committee in Honolulu.

According to word received by Supervisor Tom Tagawa, one of four Maui County members of the committee, endorsement of the program was requested by Rep. Tagawa, who acted on behalf of the Maui County Democratic Party.

The executive committee of the Maui County Democratic Party of the Republican Party met on Wednesday and adopted a 10-point resolution supporting MEDA's "Maui Plan."

Chairman Colin Cameron said the resolution was sent to EPCA for consideration, with a request for "your financial kokua for MEDA and the Maui Plan."

The resolution asks EPCA to "contribute the sum of \$81,000 to MEDA for the support of the Maui Plan in 1968-69 on condition that these funds be matched by local contributions from Maui." It points out that "immediate action is of great importance . . . in that our community is currently aroused, sympathetic, and enthusiastic . . . and can and will implement the Maui Plan if it is started now."

Additional support for the MEDA plan came from Edward Bryan, chairman of the Republican Party of Hawaii, who Friday morning sent a letter to EPCA and Governor Quinn which stated that "the proposal made by MEDA certainly points to a means of involving talent and hours which might not be available to EPCA otherwise."

Mr. Bryan's letter said, in part: "The Republican Party of Hawaii favors the orderly development of economic resources of each county and recognizes the value of financial support and active interest which residents and businesses of the various counties can contribute to the solution of their own problems."

Mr. Bryan's letter requested EPCA work with MEDA in developing the Maui Plan and also encourage other counties to "participate similarly in the study and development of their particular resources."

'Demands' Rejected

Hawaii's sugar companies told the ILWU Wednesday that we will be forced to take a strike over the wage issue and we do so "if the union sticks to its demand for a 25¢ an hour hike and did not modify it to a reasonable area far below it."

The HSPA news release on Wednesday's negotiations session—the fifth since the opening of contract talks on December 8—reported that the industry also flatly rejected all of the ILWU's other demands.

The meeting was held in the offices of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association and lasted 30 minutes.

Management called the meeting to make its position "clear" to the union because "it appears that we will have a recess until after the holidays and we do not want you to have any misapprehension as to our position during this period."

Harry Bridges, ILWU international president, said he was not from the current talks for the first time. However, Louis G. Goldblatt, international secretary-treasurer, Jack Hall, regional director, and the usual committee were present.

Philip P. Maxwell, chairman of the sugar companies' negotiating committee, went down the list of ILWU demands and unequivocally rejected them one by one.

On wages, Mr. Maxwell said the union demand for a 25¢ an hour hike, "is not consistent with the financial situation of the industry and therefore will be rejected."

On the ILWU's automatic progression (promotion) demands, Maxwell said: "They are rejected."

He said the "magnitude" of the increases involved is "fantastic." He added that "your proposals would destroy established job relationships, would destroy the classification system, and would result in chaos in wage administration (and) we cannot consider them."

Mr. Maxwell also rejected the union proposal to eliminate all exempt wages.

Union spokesmen did not make any comments on the industry's rejection of their demands, according to the HSPA news release.

Grade I (yardman) — \$175, \$180, \$185 and \$190.
Grade II (kitchen helper and ward side) — \$190, \$195, \$198, and \$199.
Grade III (assistant cook and nurse) — \$198, \$199, \$199, and \$203.

Grade IV (cook and practical nurse) — \$200, \$205, \$210, and \$215.

Under the old contract, the pay grades were as follows: Grade I, \$155; Grade II, \$160; Grade III, \$168; Grade IV, \$180. Other changes in the contract include:

1 — Provision for maternity leave benefits for women employees.
2 — The inclusion of part-time workers and practical nurses within the contract coverage. Part-time employees will be paid on an hourly scale as computed for the various wage grades, plus 10 cents an hour in lieu of fringe benefits.

3 — Three weeks vacation per year after three years of service.

4 — Raise maximum amount of monthly dues deductible from \$3 to \$11.
5 — A 40-hour work-week for all regular employees beginning July 1, 1958. Employees are now on alternating weeks of 40 and 44 hours.

Quinn Lists Ag Needs On Molokai

KAUNAKAKAI, Molokai, Dec. 20 — Four things necessary "for the full agricultural development of Molokai" were outlined by Governor William F. Quinn in a talk delivered at the League of Republican Women-sponsored dinner at the Community Center last night.

The needs were listed as:

1 — Water development, which has been initiated, with the launching of the multi-million dollar, five-year, irrigation project which calls for the boring of a tunnel, construction of reservoirs and a distribution system.

2 — "Low-cost, high-speed" surface transportation to neighbor islands. The governor said the pessimistic attitude of some people is "not justified" because these opinions are based on present freight and passenger loads.

3 — Kaunakakai Harbor improvements.

4 — The need for unity and cooperation in the marketing of produce to neighbor islands and the mainland.

The governor said "Molokai could become the breadbasket of the islands" because it has a "real future in diversified farming program."

Although he confined his remarks to agricultural problems, the governor noted that he is not discounting other types of economic development.

More than 175 persons attended the dinner arranged by the League of Republican Women committee headed by Mrs. Edith Kamakana. It was a non-partisan affair as the crowd included Democrats and Republicans and a cross-section of the community.

Mrs. Dorothea Cobb-Adams was mistress of ceremonies. The program included entertainment by the "Pick of the Isle" ladies, a men's group, and Governor Quinn and Mrs. Perreira, who sang the popular duet number, "Ke Kahi Nei Au," with Ernest Uye providing ukulele accompaniment.

The governor departed from Molokai at 8:55 a.m. today for Honolulu.

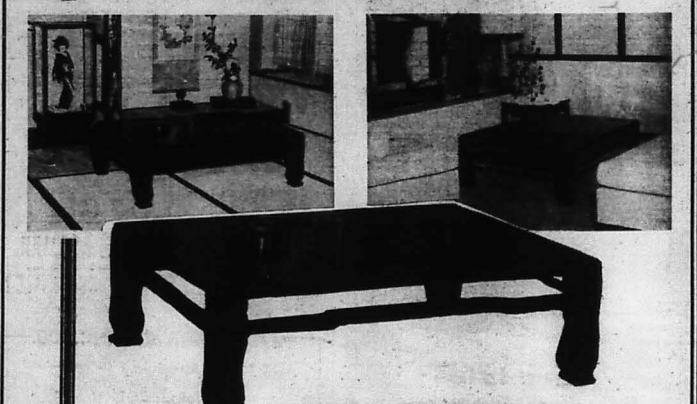

Pop Warner Football Scores Hit

Many of the 1,000 spectators were watching Pop Warner Midget League football for the first time, and what they saw, they liked.

While the game itself was a runaway with Kaimuki displaying too much all-around strength to swamp Kailua, 52-20, the exhibition staged by the youngsters from Oahu served its purpose of "selling" Pop Warner football to those who attended the game last Sunday.

Now, the question is: Are we having Pop Warner football on Maui next year?

Alfred O. Souza, president of the Makawao Recreation Council who spearheaded this introductory movement, had this to say:

"Of course, the main problem is to find sponsors for the teams. If we can get this support, the Makawao Council would welcome the thought of sponsoring the league."

"Oahu is just as anxious as we are to start such a competition for the kids here, with the former coach of Jim Thorpe's Philadelphia birthplace of this national equivalent of Little League Baseball."

The cost of equipping a full team runs about \$750, according to Souza. Hawaii Pan Pacific Company in Honolulu is the territorial agent for the National Pop Warner Conference, which supplies any affiliate member, upon request, all the equipment and needs for a start, with three years to make good on the "loan."

Why Midget Football? The following excerpts from one of the many handbooks distributed by the Conference explain this:

"With the approach of autumn, many Little Leaguers put aside their baseball shoes and ask their dads—and moms, too—for permission to play midget league football. Parental consent is one of the rigid requirements of the Pop Warner Conference. Philadelphia birthplace of this national equivalent of Little League Baseball."

"Started in 1930 by Philadelphia Joe Tomlin, the Conference adopted the name of one of the best-loved figures, the late Glenn S. (Pop) Warner, the former coach of Jim Thorpe of Carlisle Indian School, then of Cornell, Pitt and Stanford."

"With the approach of four clubs the program grew in size and quality to as many as 150 teams in a single season in Philadelphia. Today the Conference boasts 50,000 alumni. For 13 years and 100 pounds tops as far as fathers and mothers are concerned is the amazing lack of injuries. Grid kids are better trained to fall, block and ward off a bump than those in any other team sport. And, they are far better protected with safety equipment."

Deputy commissioners are scattered in every State and they include many of the nation's leading college football coaches and athletic directors.

Tommy Kaulukukui is the Pacific Area commissioner in Hawaii. The board of directors of the Honolulu Pop Warner League is made up of Mayor Neil Blaisdell, Chief of Police Dan Liu, Alvin Chang of the DPT, and Ted Nohrigan and Henry Yamasaki of the Honolulu City and County recreation board.

Racoma-Led Vocats Pull 47-45 Upset Over Lunas

Maui Tech, beaten once before by Lahainaluna, and also by Maui High and St. Anthony, was determined to "save some face" on its home court last Tuesday and did just that by scoring the season's first major basketball upset at the Pals gym.

No one among the small handful of fans would have dared to predict the Vocats would even come close to threatening the defending champion Lunas, who scored a

The final score was 47-45 and the individual glory went to Racoma, a 5'6" former Baldwin High cager who couldn't win a berth on the Bears' varsity starting lineup.

Racoma was springs in his sneakers, or so it seemed, as he time and again outjumped his much taller opponents to snag the rebound, but more so it was his consistent shooting which perked up his teammates early in the game. He was held to three points in the second half, but his lone field goal in the fourth quarter forced the Vocats into a 44-40 lead with 80 seconds remaining and virtually wiped out the Lunas' hopes.

POST OFFICES CLOSE HALF DAY ON CHRISTMAS EVE: Because the postoffices throughout the Islands will close a half day on Christmas Eve every effort should be made to get your last items out by Monday, the 22nd for the outside Islands. Of course, all offices will be closed on Christmas Day.

SPECIAL DELIVERY AIRMAIL: To insure delivery of last minute gift parcels you should send them special delivery. Mail sent by special delivery ON THE MORNING OF THE 24th will be delivered that day in the City of Honolulu only. NO BARGE ON WEDNESDAY: There will be no outgoing barge on Wednesday, Christmas Day.

SERVICE ON CHRISTMAS EVE: Although Post Offices have been authorized to close at Noon on Christmas Eve, regular mail schedules will remain in effect and will be dispatched at the regular times for each office. Mail deposited at mail-slots up to the regular time for last dispatch will make airmail connections. Carriers and delivery services at Wailuku and Kahului will operate on regular schedules on Christmas Eve, so will the rural routes at Lahaina, Hilo and Waialae. At offices where there is no delivery service we suggest that the patrons call for their mail early to insure receipt of last incoming parcels. In many instances it is strictly the television station that is having difficulties, he said.

As usual before the Christmas holidays, a few words on how to keep those holidays safe are important. Keeping everybody free from serious

Injury when a home is full of visitors, when youngsters are joyfully excited and when much more cooking than usual is being done in the kitchen is a real accomplishment.

Here are a few hints on how to enjoy Christmas without casualties.

Show the children out of the kitchen when dinner preparations are at their height. Appoint a grown-up guest or two to keep the younger ones busy outdoors or in the living room. This is the only way to make sure children aren't going to be burned, scalded or otherwise hurt when the kitchen is a scene of bustling activity.

If you have any doubts about the condition of Christmas tree lights, buy a new set. Choose fairly small tree. Put it up just before Christmas and take it down soon, before it dries

out. Don't connect Junior's toy train and set it up around the tree. The reason for this is that some distance should be kept between any electrical toys—or any appliances—and the tree. Even if the tree is chemically treated to be fire resistant, the packages around it and perhaps the decorations are not. Do not put the tree where it blocks an exit or near draperies or curtains.

Have a large metal wastebasket and large, deep, metal glass ash trays on hand for the gift-opening. Put gift paper in the wastebasket right away and give those who smoke the substantial ash trays and you will eliminate the "clutter" of holiday fires.

Don't use lighted candles on the "children's table," in curtain windows or any place where they may be knocked over or where the breeze can

blow draperies or decorations in the flame.

If babies of the "creeping age" are in the family, be sure you pick up bits of broken tree ornaments, beads or any small objects that may be dropped on the floor. Remember, young children live on a "hand to mouth" basis; one second the little hand grabs a small object—the next it's in the baby's mouth!

Don't put dishes of small nuts, hard candies or popcorn out where toddlers can reach them and choke on them. Serve such appetizers after the small children are in bed and sweep or vacuum the floor before the youngsters are up and around. Try to keep the ash trays emptied frequently and away from low tables. Young children who chew on cigarette butts can have a bad case of nicotine poisoning.

All this advice does not mean you must spoil your holidays by saying nervously "be careful!" all the time. Actually, sensible safety over a rushed holiday season is accomplished as possible for the hospitable,

by careful planning ahead of time so the causes of common holiday accidents are eliminated or controlled. When a home is made as accident proof as possible for the hospitable, busy Christmas season then this actually removes the necessity to say "be careful!" and lets children and adults alike enjoy the holiday much more.

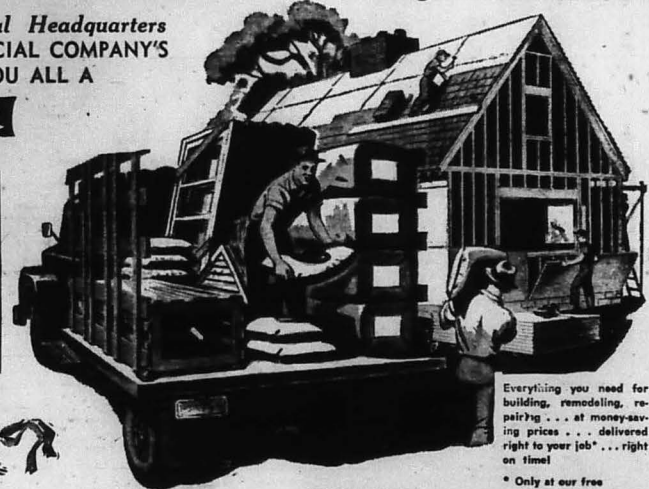

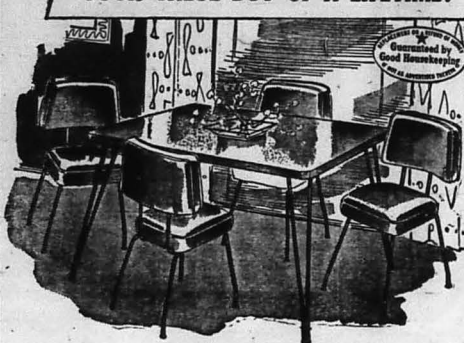

Saturday Sermonette

"LET HIM BE BORN AGAIN"

BETHLEHEM WAS LIKE WAILUKU or Kahului or any other of the towns familiar to us here in the Islands. It was not too cold. There was none of the "white" of which Mainland people dream at Christmas. And the town was bustling with busy tourists. Caesar had spoken and men were thereby made to move . . . to be counted, for Caesar's pleasure, each in his own home town.

In the midst of this worldly bustle Christ was born . . . but no more than a handful knew of it. Even these were only ragged shepherds or camel-riding intellectuals from foreign places, hardly the kind of people that Bethlehem knew and was used to.

There are only "three shopping days left" as you read this. Be sure in the business of the season that you do not make the same mistake that was made by most of Bethlehem that night; namely, that you and us celebrating everything except the only thing that Christmas was really meant to celebrate.

Jesus Christ is really nothing if you think of him only as another hero "out there." Can you imagine such a whiff as this? No, Jesus Christ is really nothing unless you see him as something utterly revolutionary, deep in one's heart. Let him be born again in your heart at Christmas and he will remain Christmas and your whole life for you. The little sadness of the Christmas whiff will become almost bearable. And the aching weariness of carol-sung-to-often will not seem so bad or even manipulative.

But most important of all, the peace God promised at the first Christmas will be yours even as it has been given to twelve-born people in each succeeding generation.
