Since the proposed merger of Puunene hospital with Central Maui Memorial has been in the news lately, the Royin Reporter, somewhat fearfully accompanied by photographer Ted Yoshizawa, took off at the "high post" for Puunene. There, at the Post Office, we asked this question:

"Do you favor the merger of Puunene hospital with Central Maui Memorial?"

These are some of the answers we got.

Alvin Amaral, a senior clerk in the HC&S main office, who lives in Puunene, said: "I don't think anyone would like to see the same service we now are getting. It seems to me that in a bigger hospital, patients would not get the same personal attention they would in a smaller, community-type hospital, such as we now have at Puunene."

Raymond R. Bradley, an assistant superintendent at HC&S, said: "I don't feel that HC&S people would be able to get the same service they are now getting. It seems to me that in a bigger hospital, patients would not get the same personal attention they would in a smaller, community-type hospital, such as we now have at Puunene."

Thomas Takaki, of Puunene, said: "Personally, I think it would be a good idea. For example, we could have a better hospital. I think that a merger of the two hospital units would provide better service to all concerned."

Larry Ikeda, a cane hauler operator at HC&S, said: "As far as we are concerned, it's much better for our own hospital. But, considering the position of Central Maui at present, a merger would be all-right, providing we could get the service after a merger that we now get, and providing the dispensary at Puunene would remain open on the other factor. If there is a merger, I feel that the entire staff at Puunene should be absorbed by Central Maui."

Clarence Inaba, a senior clerk at HC&S, said: "I am not in favor of the merger. For one thing, it will be inconvenient for the people in this area who are now accustomed to using the Puunene Hospital. One big question in my mind is if the board of supervisors is to have control of the combined hospital, then I am in total opposition to a merger of the two units."

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\$1,000 Reward Offered For Capture Of

Cold Trail Holds Down Search Pace

No Let Up In Police Efforts To Track Down Hooded Robber

The manhunt for the bold but nervous bank bandit received a stimulating boost Saturday morning when the Bank of Hawaii, through its vice president in charge of Maui branches, William H. Balthus, announced a reward of \$1,000 to persons furnishing information that would lead to the capture of the hooded robber.

However, police reported Tuesday that the trail was still cool, although they had followed several warm leads during the week.

This is an unusual case and a cold trail, but the same police work is demanded here as in cases where the criminal is quickly apprehended.

Deputy Chief Andrew Freitas, who is in personal command of the manhunt, remarked that the case was discouraging on the surface, "but there will come a break in the trail, and we're ready for it when it comes."

Meanwhile the mysterious holdup man and the \$2,500 bounty he scooped up at the Paia Branch of Bank of Hawaii, BOH branch, remained on the "missing" list, and very much wanted.

The offer of reward by the Bank of Hawaii follows in full payment of a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who robbed the Paia Branch of Bank of Hawaii on Wednesday, September 7, 1965.

Demos Plan Series Of Radio Talks

'Reports To People' Start Thursday On KMVI

It was apparent to be a bold move to present its case to the people of the County, the Democratic Party of Maui, under the chairmanship of Representative Elmer F. Cravall, this week will inaugurate a series of 10-minute radio broadcasts on KMVI, to present the issues to the voting public well before the start of the 1966 political campaign.

With the first broadcast slated for Thursday evening at 7:00 p.m. and continuing thereafter each Thursday evening at the same time, the four-hour series will be presenting a review of the recent Legislative session as well as a discussion of the local County problems, with various elected officials presenting much of the background of the various laws enacted by the recent Legislature.

The Maui County Committee of the Democratic Party feels that there has been presented only one side of the picture to the voting public.

Mr. Cravall said, "While the Democrats at the Legislature did make mistakes, there has been a substantial amount of progressive and far-reaching legislation enacted," he continued, "it will be our desire to make a complete review of all of the pieces of legislation enacted, including those which have been killed by the veto, and to present to the public, a true picture of what this Legislature would have done."

The contract has not been awarded yet and the announcement of the starting date of construction is not expected to be made for another two or three weeks. Anthony Garcia, office manager of the Territorial highway department, said that the specifications of the bid must be checked on to see that they conform to Territorial standards.

The present plans call for widening of the beach road to a uniform 24-foot roadbed. The Kaahumanu Main Street junction will be widened to four lanes with additional sidewalks.

Five Maui elected officials had paid advertisements in the Honolulu Record, branded as Communist-party-line news, paper by Congressional anti-subversive investigating committee.

Supervisors Feel More Study Needed On DP Construction Problems

The repeated requests of Shizuki Mizuho for additional funds for the Wailuku Elementary school has focused attention on the overall problem of school construction and classroom shortages.

Although most Supervisors expressed sympathy with the Maui DPI Commissioners demands, all indicated they thought the problem needed a great deal of study.

The DPI problem will be discussed by the finance committee at Friday evening meeting. This meeting will be rescheduled later in the day and resumed after the school board meeting scheduled for Monday, September 19.

It is Mr. Mizuho's contention that the Wailuku Elementary should be allotted an additional appropriation of \$150,000 because it needs 22 classrooms, plus a gymnasium, instead of the present 16-room plan. He also pointed out that the County is building Wailuku Elementary as a "class A" project. The great majority of schools in Honolulu are Class "B" construction, and he said that if the same type of buildings were used here, it would save money.

Here are some comments by members of the Board of Supervisors The Maui News was able to contact:

George Fukunaka: "I receive a clear mandate from the citizens of Maui that they want to go to high school to more schools and more school facilities, then I would consider voting approval. However, unless I receive such a mandate, I must vote against incurring further bonded indebtedness. As for the Wailuku Elementary school project, it's part of the whole picture."

Shigeru Miura: "I am waiting for a letter from Mr. Mizuho regarding the financing of the Wailuku Elementary School. In my opinion, there is no question but that there is definite need for a 22-room school, providing that a workable plan can be evolved." (Continued on Page 3)

Rice, vice president; Mrs. Elizabeth R. Rice, wife of H. F. Rice, treasurer; Richard H. Baldwin, director and William H. Balthus, director."

Mr. and Mrs. Harold W. Rice will depart from Honolulu on the October 19 sailing of the Lurline for a leisurely vacation trip that will take them to the Coast. Mrs. Rice's former home in Denver, Chicago, where they will visit with Mr. Rice's daughter, Mrs. Garfield (Mary Rice) King in Lake Forest, and Mr. Rice's grandchildren, and eventually to Europe and South America, the Caribbean and Puerto Rico where Mr. Rice will see how that Commonwealth is progressing. Mr. Rice is Hawaii's most ardent supporters of Commonwealth government instead of Statehood.

Don't Waste Water

Manuel Tavares, at last Thursday's meeting of the finance committee, Mr. Mizuha asked approval of \$150,000 to complete the Wailuku Elementary School project. Mr. Mizuha also said he would be happy to see all the projects outlined under Territorial Legislative Act 280 completed.

Mr. Tavares told The Maui News that in his opinion, the "hot" is willing to go ahead with the program as outlined under Act 280, as long as "we can see our way clear to meet the principle and interest payments, which, if the County floats bonds of some \$2,000,000, would amount to more than \$100,000 a year."

He also said he feels the County would be justified in spending money on more and better schools, because such money is well spent, but wants complete facts and figures to prove that such school construction as outlined is actually needed. Also, if the County obligates itself to spend money for schools, then, as the lone Republican put it, "the County will not be able to mispend that money for something less important."

Manuel Molina said: "Not one of the three school projects authorized under Act 280 had enough money allotted them, and if we are going to borrow enough money to complete the Wailuku Elementary School as Mr. Mizuha wants, then we should borrow enough to fully complete Lanai and Kam III. The whole project requires a great deal more study, with the emphasis on the most important projects."

Projects authorized in 1955 under Act 280 were: Lanai School, \$250,000; Wailuku Elementary School, \$250,000; and Kamehameha III School, \$320,000.

Projects "not yet authorized" under Act 280 are: New Papohaku School, \$240,000; New Kahului School, \$220,000; Maui High Cafeteria, \$90,000; Waihee School, \$120,000; Kahului School Cafeteria, \$55,000; Kanihau-Koolea School (combined), \$325,000; Iao School Cafeteria, \$55,000; Hamakua School, \$45,000; Kahakula School, \$20,000; and Kaunua School, \$150,000.

Ernest Louis, manager of the Maui County office of the Department of Labor, warned Friday that someone is in possession of a highly dangerous explosive.

"Anyone having knowledge of the whereabouts of 24 half-pound blocks of TNT that were stolen last August from a powder storage shed on Haleakala Ranch property should notify this office at once," said Mr. Louis. He explained that on August 31, John Fernandez, the overseer, found that someone had broken into the powder storage building and an inventory revealed that 24 half-pound blocks of TNT had been stolen, along with about 50 blasting caps.

"Because of the fact that TNT is at least 10 years old, and was not originally designed for commercial purposes, it is extremely dangerous," he said. "I cannot emphasize too strongly the need for extreme

HAL To Convert DC-3s To New 'Viewmasters'

Hawaiian Airlines began last week to convert its fleet of Douglas DC-3 aircraft into a radically modified version called the "Viewmaster." Arthur D. Lewis, president of the airline, told the American Society of Travel Agents at their regional convention in Las Vegas, Nevada, Saturday.

The completely redesigned aircraft will feature four giant "panoramic windows" with total window space of over 4,000 square inches instead of the customary 2,600 inches. The Air Research Aviation Service Co., Los Angeles, California, has been appointed by the airline to handle the redesigning of the aircraft, with extra comfort, convenience and safety being the three major factors.

Approved by Civil Aeronautics Administration, the first plane will be completed late in November, according to Mr. Lewis.

Mr. Lewis and Jack O'Brien, manager of AirResearch, said jointly that the four enormous windows will be an aviation industry "first." The new panoramic windows will enable air travelers in Hawaii to get an unexcelled view of island scenery and, for the first time, to get really top-grade photos from a DC-3. Mr. Lewis added.

In the past all DC-3's have had fourteen 12"x18" windows. The new Viewmasters will feature eight 17"x17" "Con-

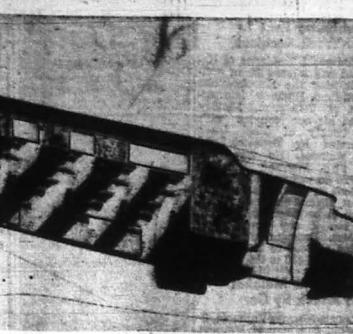

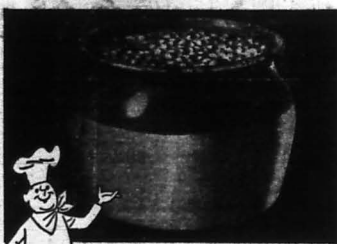

School Polio Vaccine Program Discussed

Conference Here Lays Plans For Resumption

Plans for broadening the polio prevention program and assuring aid to all polio patients who need help from the Maui County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis were discussed last week by Carolyn Patterson, Territorial representative of the National Foundation, and Ezra J. Crane, chapter chairman. They also made preliminary plans for the 1966 March of Dimes next January. Mrs. Patterson also met with school and health officials on plans to resume the vaccine program in school clinics.

Mrs. Patterson pointed out that funds will be "sorely" needed to fight polio for some time to come. "Vaccine, distributed to state health officers as rapidly as it is released by the government, will bring the Mrs. Patterson benefit of protection to only a limited number of children this year," she explained. "Polio is still with us and probably will be for a long time."

The new vaccine can't be expected to prevent all paralytic polio in one, two or even five years, she added. Therefore, while we keep one eye on the incidence thermometer, we should remember the National Foundation's simple precau-

tions to help avoid the disease. She listed these as: "don't get over-tired or chilled; don't mix with new crowds when polio is around, but do keep clean." Treatment of patients, Mr. Crane said, all of whom contracted the disease before 1955, is taxing the resources of the Maui County Chapter, which has spent \$2,500 to aid patients so far this year.

"March of Dimes aid is available to polio patients who need financial help along the road to maximum recovery," Mr. Crane said. "At the same time, March of Dimes research will continue to seek ways in which the vaccine can be made even more effective."

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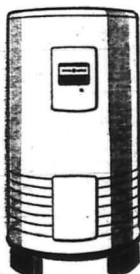

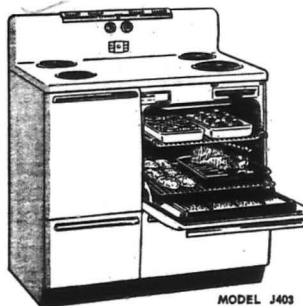

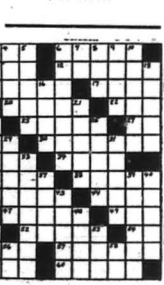

NEW MARK OF PROGRESS APPROACHING

Trans-ocean radio telephone service has been developed to a state where intelligible conversation is commonplace, but it is still not consistently clear to the point where uninterrupted service can be guaranteed on a round-the-clock basis.

Characteristic of its present day policy of continued progress in meeting new demands upon its service, Hawaiian Telephone Company is in the midst of planning for a future in which the old radio circuit will be abandoned and an under water cable will carry Hawaii's personal and business conversations to California and thence to all parts of the world. The directors at their Maui meeting were not quite ready to take the final step, that of voting to authorize commencement of construction, but their discussions are in an advanced stage and it will not be long before an announcement will be forthcoming from the company which will launch the huge project. This prediction is given strong substantiation by the granting of a construction permit to Hawaiian Tel by the FCC last week.

When one looks back upon the postwar period, the vast program of improvement to its facilities and expansion of its services by Hawaiian Tel is no less than appalling.

Even though separated by water, it can be truthfully said that Hawaii's islands enjoy better telephone service than the great majority of communities in the United States, many of which still must depend upon the old, out-moded magneto phones and third class lines of communication.

The under water cable to California is only another exemplification of progressive management of a vital utility.

THE FACTS DO NOT AGREE WITH MRS. KAISER
 Recently published comments by Mrs. Henry J. Kaiser, who is alleged to have been in Hawaii in connection with the alleged battle in keeping with the facts as anyone living in Hawaii knows them.

Mrs. Kaiser allegedly said, among other things: "There is a crying need for medical attention in the islands."

"I have learned first hand there is a serious shortage of doctors and medical facilities in the islands."

"There are not enough doctors in the islands to meet one-half the demand."

"Some doctors are so weary from overwork they almost need hospitalization themselves."

If the newspaper account quoted Mrs. Kaiser correctly and if, as published, she "learned at first hand," she surely must have been talking about the deep South Pacific, certainly not Hawaii, where there has always prevailed the highest medical standards in the professions as well as in the community.

As for a shortage of physicians, this might be considered a matter of opinion but to say that there is an insufficient supply of doctors to "meet one-half the demand" is a gross exaggeration.

Mrs. Kaiser envisioned a medical school in the islands as a means of alleviating the situation. The Territorial Medical Society rightfully disapproved the proposal on the sound reasoning that it would be impossible to provide the same high calibre medical instruction in a small school in Hawaii as that offered by the great medical centers of education that exist on the Mainland. An analysis of the educational background of Hawaii's medical profession will reveal that the vast majority of our physicians and surgeons, specialists and technical authorities received their schooling at the best institutions in the nation... many of them having also studied abroad at the largest and oldest schools of medicine in the world.

That should be sufficient answer to any general criticism of the islands' medical services.

MILESTONE OF MAUI MORMONISM

Again, Maui is to the front in news of the day with an announcement by President Arthur H. Fraycock of the Hawaiian Mission of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints that the Maui district of the Church has been granted self government, and one of Maui's most prominent young Hawaiians, Rogers E. Akiu, Sr. has been sustained as president and leader of the Mormons in this district composed of Maui and Lanai.

It was in Pulehu, now marked with a plaque, in Kula on the slopes of Haleakala, that George Q. Cannon, former Mormon missionary, baptised 105 years ago this first member of the Church in all Hawaii. This spot has always been a shrine to visiting Mormons, and it is owing to the fact that the cornerstone of Mormonism was laid on Maui, that the Valley Island was given the honor of being the first island away from Church headquarters in Honolulu to become self governing.

The LDS Church has indeed honored Maui, and we think that Maui has honored itself by having the responsibility for the presidency a fine, upstanding young citizen of the capabilities and Christian background of Rogers Akiu.

UNEMPLOYMENT BOON

Tri-Isle unemployment received a liberal shot in the arm at the outset of September when the demand for labor at Hawaiian Pineapple Company's Lanai Plantation literally depleted the list of eligible male unemployed.

True, this is only a temporary lift, expected to last about six weeks, but it serves to lighten the financial load for Welfare and Labor Departments and brings into circulation a new payroll that will help to bolster the tri-Isle economy.

It is of significance that a heavy mahalo from the people of Maui, Molokai and Lanai that Hawaiian Pine came to these Isles for its labor recruitment rather than to ship the workers into the Pine Isle from Honolulu where the labor market is also seriously in over supply.

Democrats Hold Lead In Congress Election

PRINCETON, New Jersey—Results of the latest nationwide "trial heat" of voter preference for Congress (House of Representatives) by Princeton Research Service's United States Poll show Democratic candidates for the House of Representatives running ahead of Republican candidates by a margin of 6 per cent.

The poll's results are of special significance because they provide an excellent indication of the basic strengths of the two major political parties in the nation some 13½ months before the all-important Presidential and Congressional Elections.

Here are the figures that show present day Democratic-Republican strength across the U. S. A.

"If you were voting for Congressmen TODAY, would you be most likely to vote for the Republican, the Democratic, or the candidate of some other party?"

 Democratic... 53% Republican... 47%
 Three months ago, the vote on a similar question was Democrats, 52.5%; Republicans, 47.5%.
 In last November's nationwide Congressional Elections, the Democrats won control of Congress (House of Representatives) by a margin of 5.16%.
 The official vote shows that the Democrats took 52.58% of the major party vote; the Republicans, 47.42%. (The United States Poll predicted the vote within three-fourths of one per cent—seventy-two hundredths of one per cent to be exact.)
 When today's results are compared with the national Congressional vote in the 1948, 1948, 1950, 1952, and 1954 Elections, the trend looks like this:

 Last November, the Democrats won control of the House of Representatives by a margin of 29 seats. The Democrats won 232 seats; the Republicans, 203. (218 are needed for control of the 435 member House.)

Today's results would indicate that if the elections were held today, the Democrats would hold on to their control of Congress with approximately the same margin that they received in the 1954 Congressional Elections.

It must be understood that today's findings reflect sentiment for the nation as a whole. They cannot be applied to any single Congressional District.

It should also be kept in mind that today's findings reflect sentiment nearly 14 months in advance of the elections, and that much can happen between now and November, 1956. This is one of a series of United States Poll measurements of Congressional strength that will be reported between now and November, 1956.

Credit To Hannibal Tavares
 From the time that Hannibal Tavares campaigned for election to public office, I have kept track of his doings with great interest. He is one of the most honest, hard-working, and capable officials we have in this county. From the very outset of his taking office in January, he has shown his ability and determination to run the affairs of this county in a business-like manner. It is unfortunate that he doesn't receive better support from some of the members of the Board.

Largely through his efforts and those of George Fukuoka and Manuel Molina, the Board of Supervisors has become cost-conscious and is thinking twice before spending county funds. The majority of the Board has not always gone along with these three, but as a whole the entire Board has been going long with spending.

I recall Mr. Tavares' warning early in the year against deficit spending. His advice was sound against floating more bonds before a careful study of the overall county financial picture was made and was finally heeded after he fought tooth-and-nail to convince some of the others.

His most recent investigation into the loyalty of county employees in 1954 showed that he is not afraid to tackle single-handedly a hot issue for the sake of the workingman. I was surprised that his action at the September 3 meeting of the Board on this matter was not even mentioned in your paper.

In his report to the Board, Hannibal showed past administrations had not played fair with the laid off county employees. Although there was a re-employment list which was supposed to remain in effect for two years, many oldtimers on that list were overlooked while others outside of the county were given county jobs during that same period.

As a result of Supervisor Tavares' investigation, the Board went on record to reactivate the re-employment list and give preference to those loyal county employees who were laid off in 1950 through no fault of their's.

More power to supervisors like Hannibal Tavares who is doing his best to serve all the people of our county.

How Will The \$2 Million Be Spent?
 How many people on the Board of Supervisors is considering floating a two million dollar loan for our schools? But there are strings attached.

In the first place Mr. Mizuha has promised the board to save 80% of his present maintenance fund to aid in paying for the bonds.

However the projects for 12 schools listed in aid 280 and for which this money must be spent are mostly additions to old buildings, or new buildings not replacing old buildings. Therefore it seems to me impossible to keep up the old buildings plus the new ones for the next twenty years with an 80% deduction in maintenance.

The sums listed in 280 must be spent on the schools mentioned and in the way specified and there can be no transferring of funds. This would be fine except in part it lists schools such as Kanaoia getting \$150,000 which it doesn't need and only \$200,000 is available to build a new school at Kahului.

I think every P.T.A. should have a representative at every board of supervisor meeting. So when something of vital importance to the schools comes before the board with no previous notice and is enacted before the people most concerned are aware of it.

Librarian's Notebook

"Work without hope draws nectar in a sieve, And hope without an object cannot live." It is from this passage by Coleridge that Kamala Markandaya has taken the title for her first novel, a realistic story of peasant life in India.

The central characters in NECTAR IN A SIEVE are a gentle, sensitive woman, Rati, who struggles bravely to make ends meet, but is defeated almost from the beginning. But even at the end of a tragically destitute life Nathan asks Rukmani: "Have we not been happy together?" and she answers: "Always, always."

Kamala Markandaya and Rukmani tell the story in her own words in a way that is touching and intimate: she was the fourth daughter of the headman of a village in southern India, and there she lived after three older sisters had been married, and Rukmani, she says, was plain. At twelve, then, she was married to Nathan, a tenant-farmer poor in everything but love. She describes her early years of happiness in the thatched mud hut, the coming of her children; the cheerful lot in rice paddy and vegetable plot.

Then strangers erected a tannery in the village, and as Rukmani feared its poison seeped into their lives. At first it meant more rupees than they had ever seen before; later it meant hunger and the spitting up of the family. There follows storm, drought, and the famine that sent Rukmani's pretty daughter to walk the midnight ways near the tannery to earn enough money to feed the baby. The little family knew fear and disease and hunger and violence—but it also knew hope. And Rukmani's gentle, uncomplaining courage brought her a sort of tranquility at last.

NECTAR IN A SIEVE bears the reader through many moods, but even in moments of anguish the prevailing note is that of serene beauty. It does not deal with the shell of books on history and economics to explain the people of India.
