John Duarte Announces For Board

Former Senator To Run In 1960 On Demo Ticket

Former Territorial Senator John Gomes Duarte announced to The Maui News Thursday that he will be a candidate for the Board of Supervisors on the Democratic ticket in the 1960 primary election.

Mr. Duarte was an unsuccessful candidate for the first State Senate after having served in the Territorial Senate.

On the political side, he was a Republican candidate for the Board in which he was defeated in 1944. In 1948 he sought a Senate seat as a Democrat and was defeated by Reuben Goodman who had served from Republican to Democrat.

In 1948 Mr. Duarte was successful for the Senate and was re-elected in 1952 and 1956.

He has served as chairman of accounts and a member of the education committee, health committee and Maui Select committee.

Mr. Duarte is one of Hawaii's oldest printers and will mark 50 years in the business in 1960. He operated his own print shop for many years and for the past 16 years since July 1952, he has served as a supervisor in the Maui Publishing Company plant.

Hukilau To Open March 15: Kimi

Hotel Construction 30 Days Ahead Of Schedule

Opening date for the new 44-room Hukilau Hotel in Kahului has been set for March 15, 1960, according to Richard Kimi, general manager of the hotel-apartment activities to Kahului, The Maui News learned Thursday.

Herbert C. Jackson, manager of KDCO, confirmed that representatives of the two companies had approached him and he had informed them that land was available on either side of the Palms-Hukilau area as well as on Puunene Avenue in the Harold Kushi medical building area which he will abandon when the new clinic is opened.

"They have inquired and I have told them land is available and nothing further has developed," Mr. Jackson said.

The initial inquiries were made about two months ago and letters have been exchanged as well as several personal conferences held.

Mr. Kimi told The Maui News this week that the new hotel was already committed to five tours in March.

"We are now about 80 days ahead of schedule, a fact which can be directly attributed to the Maui business firms, who have shown us complete cooperation," he said. "These firms have given us every consideration instead of holding us back."

Mr. Kimi said that he would personally manage the new hotel "until such time as I can get the management of the hotel."

He explained that it was ultimately his intention to employ a resident of Maui in this capacity, but that he was in no hurry because he wanted to have just "the right man" for the job.

According to its manager, more than 20 changes were made in the Hukilau's proposed landscaping and building design, in order to get the warmth of feeling that he felt was necessary for the hotel.

He was particularly pleased with the view overlooking Wailuku Mountains and Kahului Harbor, which he felt should not be obstructed or obliterated. This view may be seen from the front of each of the 44 rooms.

Construction of the new hotel commenced on September 10. During the construction period, Mr. and Mrs. William J. Kimi are living in New Kahului with their son, Richard, in order that both father and son may personally oversee the work.

Reclamation Of Bauxite Lands To Be Discussed

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Outside Hotels And Philmlife May Come Here

Ebbtide Hotels Inc. and Philippine American Life Insurance Company, both of Honolulu, have made preliminary inquiries of Kahului Development Company with plans to expand their hotel-apartment activities to Kahului, The Maui News learned Thursday.

Herbert C. Jackson, manager of KDCO, confirmed that representatives of the two companies had approached him and he had informed them that land was available on either side of the Palms-Hukilau area as well as on Puunene Avenue in the Harold Kushi medical building area which he will abandon when the new clinic is opened.

"They have inquired and I have told them land is available and nothing further has developed," Mr. Jackson said.

The initial inquiries were made about two months ago and letters have been exchanged as well as several personal conferences held.

Richard H. president of Ebbtide, has discussed the matter, in writing as well as personally, with Mr. Jackson and KDCO, representatives in Honolulu, but has made no definite attempt to conclude arrangements for a lease or sale.

Pastor A. Pablo, vice president of Phil American Life, has also conferred with Mr. Jackson and has written him that his company is interested in coming in to Maui with a combination office building for itself as well as rental units and a hotel-apartment.

"I know nothing further, except that they have demonstrated interest and we have told them that land is available," Mr. Jackson said. "We would be happy to do business with both of them."

Cameron Leads Cancer Unit

Director of the Maui Unit, American Cancer Society, has accepted the resignation of President George R. Carter, and elected Charles A. Cameron as his successor, at a special meeting held at noon Thursday at the Wailuku Hotel.

Mr. Carter, who served 12 years as president of the Maui Unit ACS, and its predecessor, Maui Chapter, Hawaii Cancer Society Inc., issued the following resignation statement:

"After careful consideration and in view of my long service to the Cancer Society, I feel that for the benefit of the entire cancer program I should relegate my duties to younger men who will be able to carry out the suggested program of the American Cancer Society in a far more able manner."

Mr. Carter has also submitted, to President Allen Bush of the Hawaii Division, ACS, his resignation as a division vice president and member of the budget and executive committees.

His letter to Mr. Bush emphasized that he was not severing all connections with the Hawaii Division, ACS, but was resigning from the Maui Unit board of directors.

The letter to Mr. Bush said, in part:

"This decision (resignation) is final, but when I say, please believe me that I in no way disapprove of the plans of organization as a Division of the American Cancer Society, but I am not willing to devote enough of my time to see that these plans are carried out. After twelve years of working for 'cancer' I feel I am too set in my ways, and for the good of the whole program it would be better for me to make an immediate break."

"This does not mean I am severing all connections with the Hawaii Division, as I am not resigning from the Maui Unit Board of Directors."

Mr. Carter's successor, Mr. Cameron, formerly served as secretary of the local unit. He was replaced as secretary by Dr. K. C. Leckrich, one of five new members of the board of directors.

After his election, Mr. Cameron appointed Dr. David Leckrich and Dr. Leckrich as chairman of services and by-laws.

Will Leave Hawaiian Groceries For New Enterprises

Lyman Harada, organizer of the Hawaiian Grocery Stores, is resigning December 31, after ten full years as manager of the company.

Mr. Harada's resignation was announced at the company's annual dinner meeting held Tuesday night at the Vimey Hall in Wailuku.

He told The Maui News Thursday that he is planning to take a more active part in two enterprises, the Maui Drilling Company and the Maui Acres.

He is president of the drilling firm, which was organized by Stephen Harada and his sons, Beverly C. Sarasin, vice president and general manager; George Harada, secretary; and Charles Okamoto, treasurer.

Mr. Harada said the drilling firm's rig is now on Maui and the company will be equipped to handle jobs as soon as necessary parts are received from the mainland.

"We have three projects coming up in Lahaina, to install drill project planned for tomorrow," he said.

Stephen Harada is manager by Mr. Harada's son, Stephen, a sophomore at the University of Hawaii.

The two anonymous backers of this enterprise have obtained 25 acres of land in the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company for 250 acres of land to the south of the New Kahului School.

According to Lyman Harada, 120 acres of pascua (liliko) have been planted. Now about two feet high, they are expected to be harvested next June.

Processing is scheduled to start in July.

Wanted: Sprouted Palms

5,000 Trees Sought For CofC Planting Project

Do you happen to have 5,000 sprouted coco palm trees in your back yard?

That's the question being asked these days by officials of the Maui Chamber of Commerce.

The reason? Fairly simple. The Chamber of Commerce wants to be able to direct the planting of at least 5,000 of the tropical trees during 1969 and is anxious to locate the sprouted variety which would insure, to a greater extent, the survival of the shrubs.

In lieu of 5,000 sprouted palms—any variety, common or Samoan—the Chamber of Commerce may embark on a "sprout coconut palm tree" project, offering school pupils and students an opportunity to earn a little extra cash next year.

Fred Ward, president, and Ernest L. Halford, incoming president, have conferred at length on the proposed tree-planting project and have agreed that the trees are needed in several sections of Maui. Mr. Halford said that he will approach the 1960 board of directors on the subject.

Isle Students 'More Reserved'

Indiana Bacteriologist Gives Talks On Biology

"The purpose of these talks is simply to interest students at the high school level in biology by telling them something about modern biology," said Dr. Dean Fraser in an exclusive interview with The Maui News on Wednesday morning.

Dr. Fraser, of the department of bacteriology, University of Indiana, spent last Tuesday and Wednesday on Maui giving a series of talks on the subject of "Bacteria and Viruses" to students of Lahainalua, Kamehameha III, Baldwin High and Maui High schools.

"In most schools, about the only biology the students get is to collect a few leaves and identify a few birds," he said. "Maybe, if they are lucky they may get a look through a microscope and see a few micro-organisms. At least that's the way it is in most Mainland high schools. I don't know about Hawaii's schools."

"Biology has progressed a long way past that stage, and our purpose is to get students interested in it," he added. His trip to Hawaii was financed by the American Institute of Biological Sciences lecture program. Dr. Fraser explained that that a part of the program consisted of a panel of about 30 to 40 speakers, from which the schools were allowed to choose the speaker they wanted to hear.

He said that he did not know how many trips he would make, but that he has been at least two others besides the Hawaii visit. One will be to Altoona, Pennsylvania and one to Muskegon, Indiana.

Commenting on his impres-

Mr. Li said that his service primarily makes such speakers available to the various science clubs, but since Dr. Fraser came from such a distance, his organization thought it would be a good idea if he were given the opportunity to speak to larger groups.

"The HSCS is specifically an aid program for science clubs to improve their activities and stimulate more interest in science generally among students," Mr. Li said (J.B.).

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Generator For Paia Power Plant

First Major Project Set Under MECCO, HC&S Agreement

The first major project under the new HC&S-Maui Electric Company 20-year power exchange agreement will be the installation of a new Westinghouse non-condensing turbo-generator.

The generator, together with associated equipment, will be installed at the Paia Power Plant during the first half of 1960, according to the HC&S Management News Letter.

The approximate \$500,000 cost of the joint project will be shared equally between the two companies. This figure in-cludes erection supervision; however, actual installation

work will be done by HC&S. 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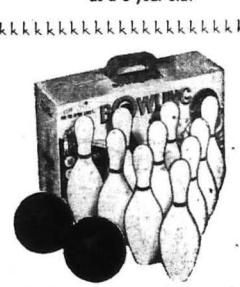

Not too long ago I received a letter from a Mainland friend asking me "When are you coming back?" Well, now this has happened before, but, in the same vein, as a sort of sermon about living out in the wilds of nowhere, the letter said: "I don't see how you can stand to live on an island... I would get claustrophobia!"

Well, it takes all kinds! This particular letter-writer, a woman, and one who has heretofore displayed at least normal intelligence, lives in a tiny apartment at Long Beach, surrounded by countless miles of hot pavement, and the hotter concrete, brick and what-have-you of apartments. She does not drive a car, and her scope of travel is limited. As I understand her location, she does not gaze out through palm trees over a distant horizon where the sunset meets the blue Pacific over a vast panorama of beauty far lovelier than any Hollywood dream of the enchanted islands.

Nor can she jump into a car and drive to a 10,000-foot elevation overlooking a vast panorama of beauty far lovelier than any Hollywood dream of the enchanted islands.

Outside of the few people she meets in her immediate vicinity, when she walks down the street, or rides a bus in metropolitan hustle and bustle, there's nary a friendly face... and no-one stops to chat a while. She's hemmed in on all sides by the crush of hurried, harassed humanity... Now, WHO'S entitled to the claustrophobia?

Speaking of friendly people... one morning this week, coming out of MPC, ran into BUTCH TERAQ, and he asked me what I was smiling about... So I told him I was just plain lazy and it took more muscles to frown than it did to smile... But you know something?... Since I've been in Maui, there's been plenty to smile about... as I keep saying, the ALOHA is great big and endless.

Was a little surprised, at BUTCH, and wondered if I was really smiling, or simply had a stupid grin on my face. Never, in the islands has anyone ever asked me why I was smiling. In fact I sort of got the idea that wearing a smile in Hawaii was about as natural as go-aheads, mu-muus and aloha shirts!

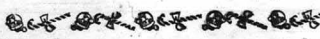

Cook over boiling water until chocolate is melted, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Beat with egg beater until mixture is smooth and blended. Chill until thickened. Fold in whipped evaporated milk and vanilla. Fill into baked pie shell. Chill.
- To Make Christmas: Place 1 cup whipping cream, 2 teaspoons confectioners' sugar, and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla in a chilled bowl. Beat until cream holds its shape. Add a few drops green coloring and blend carefully. Put about one-fourth of whipped cream mixture in cake decorator and, using small round point, draw a spray of

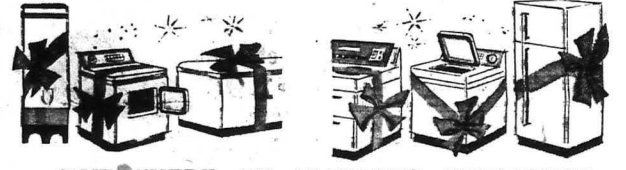

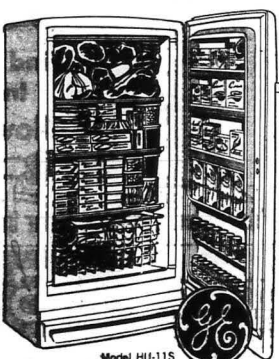
