



# Two new UH West O'ahu degrees take step toward becoming a reality

There's more work and approvals to gain, but proposals to create two new provisional degrees at UH West O'ahu cleared a major hurdle last week. The University of Hawai'i Board of Regents approved proposals to establish a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Creative Media and a Bachelor of Science Degree in Natural Science. Both are still pending WSCUC approval.

UH West O'ahu currently offers six degrees (with concentrations in 35 disciplines): Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration; Bachelor of Arts in Humanities; Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration; Bachelor of Arts in Social Sciences; Bachelor of Education; and Bachelor of Applied Science.



The University will conduct a test of its emergency procedures on Monday, March 18. For internal training purposes, the time will not be announced. There WILL be an evacuation drill as a part of this training. As a reminder, when UH West O'ahu is not in a evacuation training mode, anytime you hear an audible alarm activated in your building, please evacuate to the Great Lawn.

UH West O'ahu's evacuation procedures are as follows:

- Remain calm. Leave your area quickly by walking to the nearest exit.
- Do not use elevators.
- Only take essential personal possessions when leaving the building. Take items such as cell phones, car keys, and handbags in case the building is shut down and you are not able to re-enter the building.
- Close doors behind you when leaving. Check to make sure everyone is out of the room before closing the door.
- Evacuate to the Great Lawn. Be prepared to relocate if instructed to do so by Campus Security or Emergency Responders. If the meeting place is downwind of smoke or fumes, relocate to an upwind location.
- Await further instruction from Campus Security or Campus Administration

Additionally, here are pre-planning tips:

• Know all exit locations in a building. Most people recall the way they entered the building, but if this

entry/exit is blocked or overcrowded, it is important to know an alternate exit location. If you find yourself in a building you're unfamiliar with, follow the overhead exit signs.

- Have a pre-designated meeting place for everyone in your office or classroom.
- Know who is not present for the day so that they can be accounted for at the designated meeting place.
- If an evacuation is necessary, the building can be evacuated either by the fire alarm being sounded or by instruction to leave by Campus Security, Campus Administration through UH Alert, or emergency response personnel.
- Alarm-pull stations, extinguishers, AEDs, and exit locations are identified on the floor plans posted in each building near the elevator.

As a part of the drill, a UH Alert email message will go out to all students, faculty, and staff, and UH Alert text messages will be sent to those who have signed up to receive emergency text messages at <a href="http://www.hawaii.edu/alert">http://www.hawaii.edu/alert</a>. All members of the UH West O'ahu community are urged to sign up to receive these opt-in text messages.

Additionally, the Hawai'i National Guard will be conducting its own exercise on our campus on Tuesday, March 19. Campus operations will not be impacted, but you may see higher levels of activity around E Building, along with noises related to a simulated emergency event (i.e. sirens). Please make all attempts to avoid the area and do not disrupt their exercise.


#### Tell your students: Graduate & Professional Schools Fair is March 13

## Reminder: No private fundraising in state of Hawai'i facilities

Private fundraising in state offices and/or using state email addresses is not allowed. State employees sometimes engage in fundraising activities for private charities and/or nonprofit organizations, such as extra curricular activities for their children (sports teams, music programs, club trips). While these activities may be for worthy causes, the State Ethics Code (Chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes) prohibits State employees from fundraising during work hours, using their state email addresses to fundraise, or soliciting coworkers to donate to a fundraiser while in their state workplace.

The only exceptions are state-sponsored campaigns such as Aloha United Way and the Hawaii Foodbank. The state's official support allows state resources to be used to fundraise for these campaigns. State employees, however, are prohibited from pressuring or coercing others to make donations. # Distance Education Tip of the Week: Accessibility - Headings

The concept of Accessibility involves designing to ensure that all users can access the materials. Creating accessible documents can begin by make a few small changes to your workflow. Headings can communicate organization in a document or web page that can make it easier for someone using a screen reader to understand how material is written. 
