GSA And County In Land Deal

Portions Of Federal Building Site May Be Transferred

The County of Maui's public works committee will recommend to the Board of Supervisors the approval of proposals made by the General Services Administration of San Francisco in reference to the conveyance to the County of portions of the Federal Building site at High and Wells streets in Wailuku.

Supervisor Henry N. Kobayashi, committee chairman, said that the recommendation will be forwarded to the Supervisors for action at the meeting scheduled for Monday, July 6.

At the last Board meeting, held June 19, the Supervisors received a communication from Oliver Johnson Jr., GSA's supervisory realty officer, which said, in part:

"Conveyance to the County, without cost, of those portions of the site required for street, sidewalk and curb purposes may be made by this Administration pursuant to the provisions of 40 U.S.C. 343b."

The Republican candidate for Governor, Territorial Governor William F. Quinn, has been endorsed by the APL Committee for Political Education.

Hawaii Cancer Society Seeks ACS Affiliation

Hawaii Cancer Society, Inc., has requested affiliation with the American Cancer Society as of September 1st of this year, according to an announcement made by Allan Bush Jr. of Honolulu, president of the society.

The decision to affiliate was motivated by a desire to do a more effective job in its fight against cancer, feeling that this could best be done by belonging to the National Society, Mr. Bush said.

The Hawaii Cancer Society's decision to request affiliation comes at a pertinent time, he added. Now that Hawaii is about to become the 50th State, the local organizations have to join the 49 other states in their combined fight against cancer.

Indorsements Given To Calmes, Milligan And Eight Democrats

Two Republicans and eight Democrats seeking election to the first Hawaii State Legislature from the County of Maui have received the indorsement of the ILWU.

For State Representative from Seventh District (Maui) — Democrats Elmer F. Cravalho, David K. Trask Jr. and Maru Yamaki, and Republican John E. Milligan.

For State Representative from Sixth District (Lanai-Molokai) — Democrat Pedro De La Cruz of Lanai.

The ILWU's slate of indorsees was announced Wednesday night at a public hearing held at the Maui County Police Department.

Deputy Chief of Police Andrew S. Freitas said Thursday morning that "this thing has gone too far" and revealed that police officers have been alerted to be on the lookout for the person or persons responsible for the acts of vandalism.

S. Freitas said that anyone arrested and found guilty of tearing down political banners and posters is subject to these charges:

1 — Malicious injury, one year in jail or \$1,000 fine, or both.

2 — Unlawfully on premises if act occurred at night, one year in jail or \$1,000 fine, or both.

3 — Trespassing, three months in jail or \$250 fine, or both.

Mr. Freitas issued his warning after receiving a personal complaint from Mr. Yoshikawa (Zuke Matsui), local campaign manager for Mr. Burns, Territory of Hawaii Delegate to Congress seeking election as the State of Hawaii's first governor on the Democratic ticket.

Mr. Matsui told The Maui News that Mr. Burns' supporters on Maui were upset by the acts of vandalism. He recalled that several Burns' posters were torn up during the primary election campaign.

The police have "closed" one case involving a torn political poster.

Molokai police apprehended on Tuesday, a 15-year old youth, who was reported to have been responsible for the tearing down of a "William F. Quinn" poster posted at Kalamo on June 28.

The youth was charged as a delinquent juvenile and his case turned over to the juvenile court.

Senator Kennedy and Delegate Tam are scheduled to arrive in Honolulu today from Hilo, Hawaii, at 11:22 a.m. today, via Aloha Airlines.

Local Democratic plan to arrive in New York, and John Harris of the Boston Globe.

Democratic party officials from Honolulu are accompanying the party are: William S. Richardson, Central Committee chairman; Ernest Murai, National Committeeman; Walters O. Martin; and Mitsuyuki Kido, Frank Fast and Daniel K. Inouye, candidates for Hawaii Lieutenant Governor.

Senator Kennedy, 42-year-old son of multimillionaire Joseph P. Kennedy, is regarded as one of the leading prospects for the Democratic Presidential nomination in 1968.

He was 29 years old when, in 1946, he was elected as a Congressman from Massachusetts. He was re-elected in 1948 and 1950.

In 1952 he defeated Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., incumbent Republican, in the race for the U.S. Senate. He was re-elected last year.

Senator Kennedy is a 1940 graduate of Harvard University, bachelor of science, cum laude, and a veteran of World War II, when he served aboard Navy PT boats in the Pacific.

Fires May Be Costly, Noda Says

Valley Island residents are being urged by Captain Thomas Noda, Wailuku station commander of the County Fire Department, to be "on the alert against brush fires."

Calling attention to the fact that the island is now undergoing what could be termed as a dry spell, Captain Noda issued the following list of suggestions designed to provide precautionary measures against the possible spread of fires:

1 — When burning rubbish use a container, properly covered so that the sparks cannot travel.

When cleaning up land or property, set several small fires with proper precautions. Small fires are easier to control than one big fire.

When cleaning up a large area, about one-quarter acre or more, notify the fire or police departments so that property can be checked before fire is set.

Notify fire department before setting fires in residential areas.

\$717,200 Credited To County

Money Available For Wailuku Gym-Hall, Iao Road Work

"All we need to do is to vouch for this money as we spend it," says County Chairman Eddie Tam in reference to \$717,200, which has been appropriated to the County under Act 224 of the 1959 Legislature.

Appropriations warrant No. 12, which authorizes the County to credit the \$717,200 to the general and detailed accounts of appropriations, was received Wednesday by Chairman Tam.

Wahehe Camp House, \$50,000.

Iao Road, \$50,000.

Waikapu Park, \$10,000.

Shimoda On County FHA Committee

Bank Official To Help With Farm Credit Service Program

Robert H. Shimoda, assistant cashier at the Wailuku Branch of Bishop National Bank, has been appointed as a member of the Maui County Farmers Home Administration committee, George C. Raymond, the agency's county supervisor, announced this week.

Mr. Shimoda succeeds Jack E. Vockrodt, manager at the Kahului Branch of Bank of Hawaii. Mr. Vockrodt's three-year term expired this year.

The two other members of the Maui County FHA committee are Paul T. Yamamura, Kala pineapple grower, and Buster Y. Suehisa, Omaopio truck crop farmer.

Each agricultural county in Hawaii has a three-member committee to work with the county supervisor to make the best possible local use of the agency's farm credit service program. The committee determines the eligibility of applicants for all types of Farmers Home Administration loans, and determines the suitability and fair and reasonable values of farms to be taken as security for real estate loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress as they pay off their FHA loans by means of improved farming and turn to banks and other lenders for the credit they need.

The Farmers Home Administration is an agency in the U.S. Department of Agriculture that supplies long-term credit to farmers to buy or improve their farms, establish suitable soil and water conservation measures, and build or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings. It has intermediate or short-term credit for farm operations or to meet emergency needs.

According to Mr. Raymond, the agency does not compete with other lenders in the farm credit field. As a part of its credit service, it supplies farm and home management aids and advice.

Pending construction of the new Federal Building in Wailuku, the Farmers Home Administration office is located in Room 46 of the Maui Grand Hotel. The telephone number is 32-0052.

The "Dream" Game... Hear It Tuesday

For the second time in the history of the 25-year-old All-Star Game, the annual "dream" game will be played at Forbes Field, home of the Pittsburgh Pirates, which hosted the crown of the crop in the major leagues in 1944.

The National League won that one, but as the 25 titans from each circuit get together for the 26th edition of the mid-season extravaganza next Tuesday, the American Leaguers command 15-10 edge in the series which got its beginning in 1933.

Both the television and radio broadcasts will be on the NBC network under the sponsorship of the Gillette Safety Razor Co. KMMI Radio will bring the voices of Jack Brickhouse and Bob Prince right into our living rooms and offering a play-by-play "live" account of the entire game.

The broadcast will start at 6:45 a.m. Hawaii Standard Time. Last year, for the first time in history, neither team connected for an extra-base hit as the Americans out-singled the Nationals to come from behind and win, 4-3. It was the second straight All-Star game in which neither team homered.

The players themselves were given the opportunity to vote for the stars they thought should be in the "dream" game. The result is that the 16 players at each position, excluding pitchers, who received the highest number of votes will be honored on the starting lineups. The pitchers and the remainder of the 25-man squads were named by the respective managers—Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees and Fred Haney of the Milwaukee Braves.

Six Generations Present At Kukahiko Clan Luau

Headed by 83-year-old Mrs. Annie Kukahiko, Poo Sum, some 300 members representing six generations of the Kukahiko clan of Maui gathered at Makena over the weekend for a reunion highlighted by a luau with impromptu entertainment.

It was the second gathering in 12 years for the descendants of John Kukahiko, who in the words of his grandson, 65-year-old Matthew Hanu, was a "chief and lawyer from Kihel to Keonoi" during the whaling ships era.

On hand for the celebration was Mr. Kukahiko's first grandson, the Reverend John Kukahiko, who is 69 years old. Reverend Kukahiko, who presides at church services held once a month at the 115-year

Makena church, received a new gown from the Abner Delima family, who presented the gift in memory of John Kukahiko. The Delima family minister's uncle.

Mr. Delima, a licentiate, conducted the church services held last Sunday.

The story of Makena and the Kukahiko clan, as told by Mr. Hanu, follows: John Kukahiko had no schooling at all. He received most of his education from the English sailors who came into the Makena landing.

He was an extraordinary person. He was chief and lawyer from Kihel to Keonoi. Before the whalers came to use the landing in Makena, the place was known as Kewai-mau (a calm little bay). Today it is known as Makena (many gathered).

If you go to Makena, you will notice the many reefs which point out to the ocean. Each one of these reef-points has a name and each has its own kind of fish, so if the people wanted to eat akule, the chief told them what reef-point they should go to. John Kukahiko had a "Maui" right given to many men when whalers came in, he was the only one to guide them in or out of Makena, no matter how rough the ocean. His gift was that when he stepped into the ocean the water became calm.

The people also believed in taking care of the sharks. They fed them and they in turn saw that none of their kinsmen were attacked by other sharks. Fish was plentiful and until today the Kukahikos have always had no fear of any danger while in the ocean.

Mr. Hanu told of the time when he was asked to accompany "Pukiki", caretaker of the sharks, to the "Ana" cove where this old shark was kept and had to chip barnacles off the shark's back. Today, he says, the opening of the cave is blocked.

Mr. Hanu said that the Makena church is 115 years old. The frame of the building was made of rocks and white coral. The coral was thrown into a pit with wood and melted. This was used to cement the rocks together.

The ceiling and roof were made of the ohia tree. They were cut and thrown into the ocean for about two weeks and then dried.

The church has been touched up twice. All the people that lived in that area at the time were Protestants.

The church has had five ministers. One was Reverend R. Luaka, who was in the second group of people sent to the Gilbert Islands and the only one who escaped from the cannibals there. His grave lies in the Makena churchyard with his name inscribed into the cement.

According to the Reverend Kukahiko, Makena was also known as the "gold mine" John Kawe-Kane, who was the

family carpenter, at that time, saw that each family had a house built.

He estimated the cost of the lumber and then called the family together to go out on a bukiti. Two or three times out to sea was enough to cover expenses.

Lumber was then brought in, thrown into the sea, tied, and then pulled into shore by the family. The lumber was then dried and the whole clan got together and pitched in on the building work.

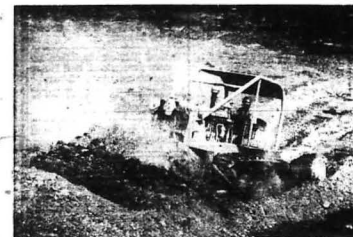

Kitchen Open First Up Dating Project

You don't have to start from scratch with a brand-new house to have an efficient, attractive kitchen. By judicious planning it is often possible to create a modern kitchen in a house that's twenty-five, or even seventy-five years old.

You can take that statement on the authority of Montgomery Ferrar, noted industrial designer, who in cooperation with his partner, Carl Sundberg, has probably had a hand in the development of as many labor-saving appliances for the modern era as any man alive.

Since your kitchen is likely to be the costliest room in your entire house, the task of modernizing it is not one to be undertaken lightly. Furthermore, there is no such thing as "the perfect kitchen. Ferrar points out. Every family's requirements are different, and the kitchen that would be perfect for the Joneses, who live across the street, may prove completely inadequate to your needs.

This being so, the first thing to do, when you start to remodel your kitchen, is to sit down and take an inventory of your requirements.

For example: Do you use mixers and blenders often? Do you do much or very little baking? Are you left, or right handed? Do you prefer your cutting board exposed or hidden? Do you use a lot of small appliances?

After you have considered each of these points, and discussed them with the other members of your family, you'll be in a position to write out the prescription for a useful, livable kitchen expressly suited to your needs.

In modernizing your kitchen, there are three basic floor plans that you can follow. They are: 1) the galley, or back-to-back arrangement; 2) "L" plan; and 3) the "U" plan. Each has points to recommend it.

The "galley," in which the appliances and work spaces range along opposite walls with a corridor between, provides the most complete utilization of space. On the other hand, it tends to become a traffic route.

The "U" shape quite frequently adapts itself most easily to the physical characteristics of the room area available. The appliance arrangement in this shape is generally good, although it does tend to result in more steps and by-passing.

The "U" shape is generally preferred by architects and modernization experts because it reduces steps, eliminates cross traffic, and results in more continuous work surfaces, with work areas

cent to each appliance. One objection to the "U" shape is the lost storage area in the corners; however, "Lazy Susan" revolving shelves successfully overcome this handicap.
