(Continued from Page One) Pehi district to Huelo school than it is to Hailu.

This is the second time that the supervisors have overruled their transportation committee. The die was cast when Rodrigues, with the backing of a majority of the board, successfully moved for the granting of a school bus route from Kahakulua to Wailuku for five children, after the TGC had disapproved of its establishment.

Joseph and his delegation first went on a strike and kept their children out of school for over a month when the department of public instruction refused to reopen Halehaka school. Then County Attorney Harold Duponte and Probation Administrator August Markham met with the adamant parents. Duponte told them the children must attend school "or else."

The parents told Duponte and Markham they preferred to send their children to the small two-room Huelo school and that they would be glad to furnish their own transportation.

Two days later the Halehaka delegation appeared at the board of supervisors meeting, demanding free County transportation, as they could not afford to transport the children.

This was followed by an appearance at the board meeting to ask that Halehaka school be kept intact so it could be used as a community clubhouse. This request received a favorable reaction from the County Fathers.

Enlargement Of Facilities At Hale Makua Asked

The old Malolani hospital has more than justified its existence as the new Hale Makua to care for Maui's aged men and women. August Markham, president of the Hale Makua board, revealed last week, in requesting the County to make a first hand study of the work needed to be done to enlarge facilities.

Markham reported the wards now being used by Hale Makua are already filled to capacity and that more space can be used as soon as repairs are made.

The board of supervisors voted to make a first hand inspection of the plant immediately and to have County Engineer Koko, Hama, prepare an estimate of the cost of the repairs necessary to enlarge the facilities, so that action can be taken at the next board meeting.

Action Deferred On Request For Deputy Auditor

Action on a request made by County Auditor Sam Alo, Sr. for approval of his intention to appoint Rogers Akiu as second deputy auditor in his office was deferred for further study when the matter was brought up at the meeting of the board of supervisors last Thursday morning.

Also, whose request for the creation of the post of second deputy auditor was turned down unanimously by the supervisors at the meeting of November 18, stated in his latest communication that he intended to appoint Akiu immediately, on a seniority basis, and added: "I do feel this appointment is warranted and sincerely recommend your approval."

Also claims that Maui is the only County which does not have two deputy auditors.

The motion to defer was made by Francis Kage, after John Hulgo had moved, with Manuel Rodrigues seconding, to deny the request. The vote to defer passed, 4-3, with Foster Robinson, who said the appointment was unnecessary because Alo and First Deputy Frank Towhina left the island together very few times in the year, joining Hulgo and Rodrigues in voting no.

During discussion, Chairman Eddie Tam said that Alo had informed him that the creation of the new title would not call for an increase in pay. According to County Attorney Harold Duponte, the law allows the auditor to appoint another deputy, but technically it is the creation of a new position.

Bulgo Fails To Mention Tam In Letter On Loan

Close cooperation received from Governor Yoshi Anez, whose state party politics to help the County; the office of the County Attorney, the County Auditor, Police Department and my committee member, Supervisor Francis Kage, enabled the County to get its recent loan of \$100,000 from the Territory, according to the letter submitted at the meeting of the supervisors last Thursday by Finance Chairman John Bulgo.

After the reading of the letter, which also mentioned that the loan had been stalled for some time, Supervisor Robert Y. Shimada stalling mentioned to Bulgo that "you forgot to mention Chairman Tam."

Tam, who remarked that "it is disturbing to me that I wasn't even mentioned," said, "there was no need for such a letter to be presented here. The Territory is compelled by law to make such a loan. Sure Anez always helps us out and he sat in on a conference with us down there. As soon as Frank Teshima (deputy County Auditor) and I prepared the figures for the Territory wanted, they were compelled to give it. I don't want any credit for it."

Bulgo answered Tam by stating: "When you saw 'it' last spring? To have a board meeting to push the teachers in to grab over \$100,000, you did a great thing. We wouldn't need the loan if it hadn't been for that. Now you expect credit when we would not have had to borrow the money if it hadn't been for the school grant."

Board Protests Ruling On Feed For Cattlemen

A strongly worded resolution protesting the U. S. department of agriculture's ruling that ranchers must earn 50-percent of their livelihood from cattle raising in order to receive Federal aid in feed, despite the fact that the Kula section has been declared a disaster area, was unanimously passed by the board of supervisors at their meeting on December 2.

The resolution was dispatched to Delegate Joseph R. Farrington and Governor Samuel Underhill King, asking that the Federal ruling be changed. The resolution further points that heretofore the independent Kula ranchers of all sizes were receiving Territorial assistance.

Correa Urges Mauians To Send Cards First Class

Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 1/2 inches by 4 inches or longer than 9 inches by 12 inches require, under existing regulations, a three-cent stamp. Postmaster J. T. Correa of Wailuku announced this week.

Mauians are urged by Correa to check and double-check addresses, both on gift packages and cards. "At this time of year," he said, "we wish to remind every one that all packages should be wrapped and tied securely, and that the stamps you will need for Christmas cards be purchased well in advance. The important thing to remember about Christmas cards is to send them by first-class mail and place your return address on the envelope. With a three-cent stamp, your Christmas cards will be forwarded if the addressee has moved and a new address is on file, or returned if addressee cannot be located."

According to Correa, the last Christmas surface mail, including gift packages to the Mainland, will close at the Wailuku postoffice at 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday, December 9 (today), to connect with the President Cleveland leaving Honolulu for the Mainland on December 10.

The motion passed, 2-2, with John Bulgo and Francis Kage, who favored the granting of the request, voting no."

All Non-Profit Groups Exempted From Garbage Fee

Maui County's controversial garbage collection fee ordinance appeared on the agenda again at last Thursday's board of supervisors meeting.

The matter was brought onto the floor when a communication was presented from Stanley K. Maunio, advisor to the Maui-County Board of Health, informing the board that the council, together with the armed forces committee of the Maui Chamber of Commerce, had approved a resolution asking that the garbage ordinance be amended so that all non-profit organizations and institutions be exempted from garbage collection fees.

Alignments of high protein (41%) cotton seed pods for this purpose will be calculated on the basis of one pound per head per day. Distribution will be effected by the Land Development Commission in accordance with approved requests. Requests for emergency feed should be made on CCC Drought Emergency form 1 (Hawaii) available at Extension County Agent offices or secured from ASC (formerly FMA) farm checkers. Purpose of the National Drought Emergency program for 1953 "is to maintain basic foundation herds of cattle, sheep and goats for bona fide farmers and stockmen who do not have the finances to purchase feed at prevailing market prices."

Board Thanked For Paving Of Road In Olinda

Alfred O. Souza, superintendent of the Olinda Prison Camp, has written the board of supervisors to thank them for furnishing the funds necessary to complete the paving of Olinda Road, thus opening up a portion of Maui's scenic beauty to the public. The paving was done with prison labor.

Supervisor John Bulgo contends that the road has not been completed and that there still remains 1200 feet to go to reach the forest reserve gate. He insists the road will be completed after the first of the year.

Murakami Happy Again; Jacket No Longer Lost

Maui News pressman Keigo Murakami's old, tan suede jacket is back in the hands of its owner thanks to the publication of a 12-line, two-paragraph story on page 3 of the December 22 issue of The Maui News.

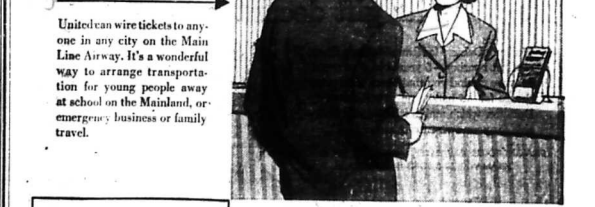

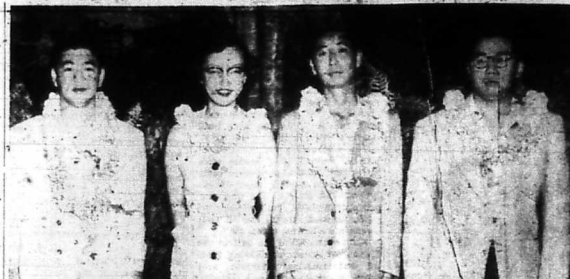

Two New Cane Haulers Added To HC&S Fleet

Purchase of two Euclid cane haulers for Hawaii Commercial & Sugar Co. Ltd., was approved last week by the company's board of directors. Addition of the two new cane haulers, according to Assistant Manager Frank Churchill, is in line with the company's long-range plans for cane hauling operations, and they will increase the cane hauler fleet to 17 units, 14 Toumahaules and three Euclids.

Other plans include refresher training for hauler drivers in December, a stepped-up preventive maintenance program and continuous training for mechanics servicing these giant units.

One of the new Euclids will be a new unit, according to Churchill. It will cost about \$25,000. The other will be the demonstrator unit modified and altered, which HC&S rented for five months last year. To make it equal to a new unit with a new Euclid guarantee, it will cost about \$20,000, including parts. Both new Euclids will carry about 25 tons of cane, slightly less than the Euclid HC&S purchased last year.

"We need more haulers to handle the increased requirements for cane at the Puunene mill, where grinding rates are higher than ever before," Mr. Churchill said. "We feel that we have had enough experience with several types of heavy haulers to judge their various merits. As a result, we have come to a decision to purchase two more to the direction we must follow."

April 15 when Magistrate Wong sentenced Ponce to six months for being a disorderly person, jail sentence being suspended 18 months) be dismissed as the time for filing had lapsed. He said the law provides 30 days for such an appeal.

Yoshinaga opposed the motion on the basis that he did appeal on October 18, which was within 30 days of the execution of the sentence the first case.

Judge Brown ruled that the first case was beyond the jurisdiction of the court and an appeal was improper.

In appealing the second case (the sentence of six months imposed for being a disorderly person at the 31st Maui County Fair in October) Attorney Yoshinaga started to refer to The Maui News, but Judge Brown interrupted counsel to remind him, "The Maui News is not on trial."

Yoshinaga argued that a six months jail sentence was excessive for a young man who had never been in jail before and asked the court to mitigate the sentence for the sake of the youth's father and mother.

In denying mitigation on the second case Judge Brown said that "attacks on police officers, such as took place in this case, cannot be tolerated."

He said he saw no facts in the case that warranted mitigation except in the mitimus. "To run consecutively," which he considered to be an anomaly and that "consecutively" should be stricken out.

Judge Brown suggested to Ponce that he reopen the case to correct the mitimus as "to run consecutively" should be stricken out.

Yoshinaga put Ponce on the witness stand in his appeal of the 30-day sentence for escape. Ponce said he had walked out of jail to go home to Paia to ask his family for money to employ legal aid and that he had stopped at a store to get some lunch when apprehended by a police officer.

Yoshinaga based his appeal on the fact that Ponce did not resist or attempt to flee and that he had in mind at the time of the alleged escape was the simple idea of getting legal aid.

"It seems ridiculous," to ask mitigation on a 30-day sentence on what you show," Judge Brown told Yoshinaga. "Mitigation denied."

The motorist should desire to renew his license, the plates will be returned upon payment of the tax. Motorists who are registered and legal owners, must have in their possession both the registration and ownership (yellow) certificates. If the certificates have been lost, application should be made now for duplicate certificate for which no charge will be made.

In paying the 1954 taxes, the owner will present their 1953 registration certificate only and retain their legal ownership (yellow) certificate as a permanent record of ownership and title. Those who are registered owners only are to present their registration certificate.

"When applying by mail, send only check or money order accompanied by the 1953 registration certificate for the amount of registration fee, plus 20 cents for the tag," Kam advises.

For the convenience of the public, Kam will continue to render prior services by registering motor vehicles, etc., by going to the outside district of Maui, Molokai and Lanai. His schedule will be announced later.

reports loss of growing time which "can never be replaced," calling attention to the fact that the shortage was most severe during the long summer days which are the best growing months.

Cane in a few small scattered areas has died from lack of water, while plants in other fields—irrigated at intervals of as much as 75 days apart—show signs of stunted growth.

According to "Ka Nani O Pioneers," rainfall for the first nine months of this year has been almost negligible at the stations at Lahaina, Fukuohi, and Mahina. Lahaina, where records have been kept for forty years.

Lahaina, which can normally expect about 9 inches of rain during the first nine months, has had only 1.23. Fukuohi and Mahina have averaged 14 1/2 and 26 1/2 inches, respectively, in past years, but received only 2.26 and 9.29 inches, respectively, this year.

The lack of rain has forced the company to run its pumps almost continuously due to the reduction in mountain-water sources, and this has put such a drain on them that the water is becoming "more salty." Salty pump water is mixed with mountain water to "freshen" it, but cane in the field show signs of salt burn, having yellow leaves with ends brown and dead.

DEEP WELL OR THRIFT COOKER MEAL

- SECOND RECIPE—PLUM PUDDING**
- 1/4 cup enriched flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1/2 cup currants
 - 1/2 cup seedless raisins
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped apple

Sift dry ingredients into large bowl. Add fruits and mix well. Add eggs, sugar and milk; mix. Combine crumbs and suet and add to batter. Add brandy and brand. Pour in oiled pudding mold (1 quart) and cover tightly. Place in steamer and steam 2 1/2 hours. 6 servings.

This may be frozen and kept for several weeks. Reheat by returning to mold and steaming 45 minutes.

HARD SAUCE

- 1 teaspoon brandy flavoring or vanilla
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar (about)

Cream butter and brown sugar till light and fluffy and add flavoring. Add powdered sugar using just enough to make desired stiffness. Serve on hot pudding.

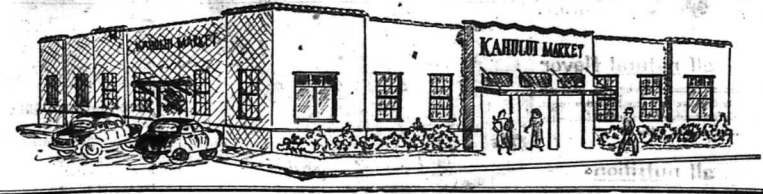

Ernest Greene Speaks To Maui Planters Lunch

The Sugar Act of 1948, as amended, with its quota-tax-compliance payment system of control, is the product of twenty years of experience with the quota system. It is seasoned legislation, non-partisan and in the public interest. It protects the domestic industry, affords an assured share of the United States market to Cuba, the Philippines and other foreign countries, and provides an administrative apparatus for stabilizing prices and distribution at fair and reasonable levels.

It was, therefore, to be expected that the change of administration last January would not change the policies of the Department of Agriculture in carrying out the clear intent of the Congress in enacting sugar legislation, and there has been no change in policy in administrative personnel in the Sugar Branch.

The recent reorganization of the Department of Agriculture, set away with the former Production and Marketing Administration. It has four great divisions of responsibility, with commodity administration, marketing, utilization, research and finance, each headed by an Assistant Secretary. The Sugar Branch has carried research, marketing studies and reports and corollary activities, which will be transferred to the appropriate divisions of other services, but the administrative functions under the Act, with respect to both consumers and producers, remain intact in the Sugar Branch.

The administration of the Act during the first ten months of the year stabilized the price at a fairly reasonable level. Thus it carried out, in principle, the intention to stimulate an adequate price, as expressed in the statement of bases

and considerations which accompanied the determination, in December of the year 1952, of the estimated total requirement of sugar for the year 1953.

Appropriate shares and marketing allotments pursuant to the Sugar Act, are in effect in the mainland cane area (Louisiana and Florida), and in Puerto Rico. Marketing allotments for the year 1954 are to be applied to the best area.

The Cuban Government has successfully limited the production in that country to 5,000,000 tons, and it could do so because of its assured quota share of the United States Market. Sound administration of the Sugar Act has accomplished stable marketing of sugar in adequate supply and at fair and reasonable prices during a time of world wide high production and disorganized and disorderly marketing in the so-called "world market". It proved to be just as effective several years ago in avoiding unduly high prices in the United States during the period of world wide competition to buy sug-

ar, as which persisted for more than a year after the outbreak in Korea. The Sugar Act is term legislation, and the present law expires on December 31, 1958. Some producers in areas which are under proportionate shares and marketing allotments are already thinking about changes which would like to have made in the Act when it is taken up for consideration of amendment and extension. Hawaii, as a part of the domestic industry, is inseparably bound up with the best interests of the domestic industry as a whole. This is the position which we have maintained, at which we must maintain, at all times.

It is mentioned above that the administration of the Sugar Act during the first ten months of the year had supported a fairly reasonable market price for sugar. On November 6, the Department announced the relocation of an additional 80,000 ton best deficiency. This action had not been anticipated in the market at that time, because refiners and others were able to

obtain all the sugar they needed provided they would pay the reasonable price—\$6.22 per 100 lbs. for raws—which prevailed. The unexpected official action, coming in a time when several factories continued to market sensitivity, enabled shrewd buyers to buy at the price. The recent price decline indicated again that quotas need to be controlled with a tight rein at the end of the year.

Spokesmen for some organizations of industrial users have been active in criticizing the administration of the Sugar Act, but with-out any good cause. Sugar has been plentiful and the price has been relatively lower than that of any other important processed food. In fact, by any standard of comparison, the price of sugar should be somewhat higher in order to be in line with the prices of other foods. There are many factors, some of them new, which may complicate the marketing outlook for the coming year. We can be sure, however, that the officials and staff of Candi are alert to these situations, as well as to the many other factors which bear directly and indirectly upon that complex, highly sensitive organism—the sugar market, in which nothing is permanent except constant changes.

In July of this year, the International Sugar Council, composed of official representatives of 22 producing and consuming countries, in its third meeting in London with in two years, produced a new International Sugar Agreement which has now been ratified by a sufficient number of signatory countries so that it will become effective January 1, 1954. The International Agreement, once it is well established, should prevent violent swings in either price or available supplies in the processes of marketing of the 10% of the world production which has no assured share in the sugar orbit of any large consuming country—and this 10% is called by the imprecise name of "world market". The International Agreement is of interest to our domestic industry because it will help Cuba and San

Domingo, our near neighbors in the Caribbean, and will lessen outside pressures on the quota system of the United States.

The Sugar Association, Sugar Research Foundation and Sugar Information are extending their research and educational activities into new fields. We are fortunate in having Dr. Henry B. Foss with us in our meetings. He is President of the Sugar Association and Scientific Director of Sugar Association. Since he has begun to discuss matters with us in person I shall mention only a few high spots in regard to these organizations which our industry in Hawaii has supported actively, since they were organized more than ten years ago. I again have had the privilege of serving Sugar Association as President for the past two years.

Dr. Foss has joined the organizations in 1952, and he has put new life and direction into their work. Important possibilities are opening up for the use of sugar and its by-products in the chemical industry.

Recent discoveries in medicine with respect to the influence of the relative amounts of carbohydrates and fats in the human diet upon susceptibility to the degenerative diseases give promise of establishing more firmly the essential place of sugar in the diet.

A program of publicity will soon be underway to inform people by means of advertising about the rightful place of a proper amount of sugar in the human diet—whether that diet be normal, or for the purpose of reducing or gaining weight. The advertising and publicity will be scientifically accurate, and will be in accord with the high standards which have always been maintained by these organizations.

In concluding this talk, I wish to acknowledge, with deep appreciation, the work of the staff of the Washington Office. That office exists solely for the purpose of serving the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association and its members, and the entire staff is wholeheartedly devoted to that service.

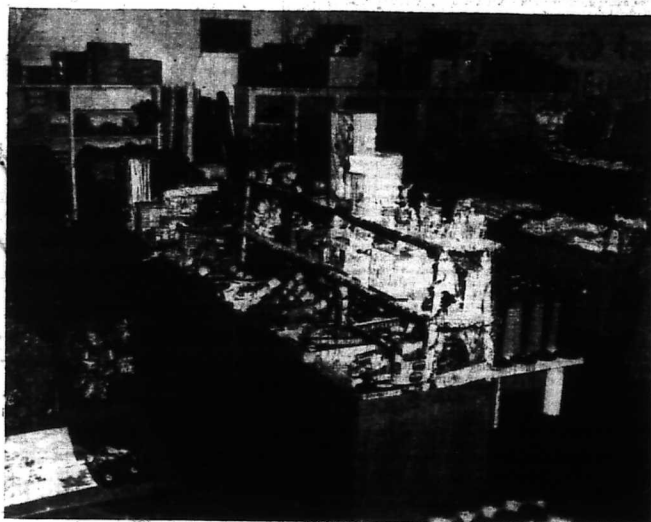

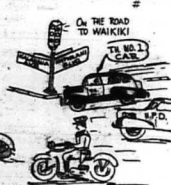

Home loans, totaling \$29,890 were received by three veterans on Maui during the month of November. P. S. Gilbertson, loan guaranty officer of the Veterans Administration regional office in Honolulu, last week.

The loans were obtained for purchases of real property valued at a total of \$23,900, an average of slightly more than \$7,933 each. Government guaranty on the loans totaled \$12,480.

A total of 479 veterans on Maui have been aided to home ownership through guaranteed loans in excess of \$3,750 each, since the beginning of the program in the Territory in 1946.

Truck Crop Harvesting Below Par

Production, Planting, Acreage Affected by Prolonged Drought

Moderate November rains, in the area of the mountain watershed helped replenish the water supply that was critically short the past months, but the prolonged drought had already done considerable damage, and consequently Maui's crop supplies will

remain sorely short for the ensuing 90 days, Francis Takahita, assistant County agent for the University Extension Service, revealed this week. Takahita said, in his monthly Maui Crop Notes report, that "the reasonably generous irrigation allowed in time of water shortages is primarily the biggest factor that enabled some production to continue, particularly in the mauka areas where drought has hit the hardest." He added that immediate rains in the drought-stricken areas of Kula is probably the only answer to returning normal production. The effect of the drought on the truck crop district is brought out by Takahita's statement that last December harvest is forecast at about 175 tons, compared with

216 in November and an estimate of 465 in December, 1952. Truck crop acreage at the end of November was 92, or 146 less than a year ago, while new plantings totaled 2237 acres, compared with 100 in November, 1952. Takahita also revealed that East Maui pastures benefited from recent frequent rains but rangers and pastures in the Kula-Kihoi sections are without grass feed. "Best supply," he said, "is more than sufficient at present since slaughtering has been heavier than normal. Hog supply is nearly normal, the demand running just ahead of supply, while both eggs and meat are sufficient to meet the local requirements but are at seasonal low."

Lintao Re-Elected as TFC Vice-President. Fred Lintao, personnel records clerk at Pioneer Mill Company, has been re-elected Maui division vice president of the Territorial Filipino Council. Lintao, Julius Aracangel, Pioneer Mill field gang foreman, and Sisenando Acosta, informant foreman at Hailpigi Packers, were West Maui delegates to the convention held on Kaula last month. Dr. Compton To Speak In Isles
