

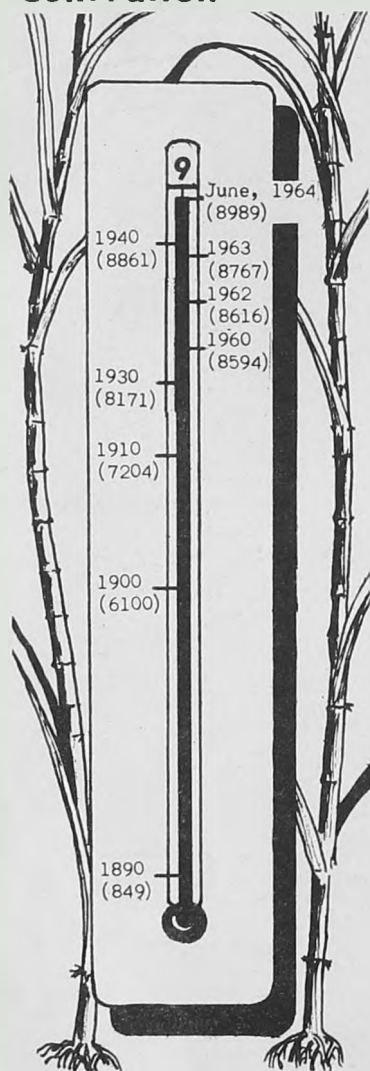
260 Enroll in ERA Summer Fun Program

Annual Report Highlights

Ewa's annual report for the fiscal year which ended on April 30th has just been released to stockholders. Here are some of the highlights:

Production was 61,632 tons of raw sugar, the third highest in our history, due partly to an increase in yield from 12.33 to 13.63 tons per acre, and partly to the carry over from the previous year of several hundred acres of cane, because of wet weather.

Profit rose to \$953,313 because of the abnormally high price of sugar. We received about \$155 per ton for our sugar. This was the highest for more than forty years and is not expected to recur in the foreseeable future. In fact, quoted prices in June, 1964 were around \$123 per ton.

Progress was made in developing additional water to irrigate present and future acres.

Land under cultivation was increased by 285 acres to offset future losses to highways.

Diversified agriculture got under way on swamps and waste lands to the extent of 4,000 banana plants and 35,000 papaya seedlings.

An unusually large number of promotional opportunities was offered both to bargaining unit employees and to supervisors in the trades, mechanical jobs and new supervisory positions.

All employees also benefited from increases in wages and fringe benefits such as the dental plan, additional vacations, and improvement to the pension plans and medical services.

In concluding his report Manager Bryan states "with personal gratitude" that the cooperation of employees has been excellent and that the help and assistance from Castle and Cooke has been most beneficial and constructive.

Copies of the report will be made available to employees in the near future.

Frank Wiley, Executive Assistant, commenting on the report for Bryan noted that the high profit figure produced by the unusual conditions of the past year may not be repeated for many years, but indicate a healthy and efficient company, which we hope will be able to meet the challenge of the low sugar price years which may be ahead.

A New Record

Several new milling records were established during the week. On Wednesday, 3,770.28 tons of net cane were milled for an hourly average of 159.29. The previous records were 3,667.24 tons of net cane processed, May 5, 1957, and the high hourly average, 156.45 tons of net cane per hour, occurred on June 9, 1953. On Friday these records were eclipsed when 3,829.66 tons of net cane were ground at an hourly average of 166.51. Cane varieties processed during the week were 50-7209 and 49-3533.

total to date to 33,238.26 tons. Sugar production resulted from processing 17,338 tons of field cane and 14,213 tons of net cane for hourly grinding rates of 190 and 156 tons respectively. The T.C./T.S. ratio was 8.29 compared to 6.91.
