ALOHA, NOT GOODBYE

Friday last week marked the last day of active service for four veteran Ewa employees. Nicolas Cajulao, Augustin Inalari, Roque Agambot and Santiago Saludares were bid Aloha on Friday morning by Assistant Manager Bob Cushnie and their supervisors.

Nicolas Cajulao, a native of Badoc, Ilocos Norte, arrived at Ewa on August 15, 1922, to seek his fortune on the plantation. Then a youth of 19, he worked as an irrigator during his first ten years here. He transferred to the Harvesting division in 1932 working as a Cane Cutter, Portable Trackman and since 1948 as a Ground Crewman.

Mr. Cajulao has a wife and daughter who reside in the Philippines. He is planning to join them in the near future. Augustin Inalari, Fireroom Foreman at time of retirement, came to Ewa direct from Sinala, Ilocos Sur in 1930 and began his career with the company on January 17 of that year. Working as an Irrigator until 1940 he transferred to the Factory Fireroom. He saw assignment in every job in the fireroom since then, moving from bassesse room to ash pit to fireman until September, 1953 when he was promoted to Water Tender.

In June, 1966 he was promoted to Supervisor-in-training and became Fireroom Foreman on September last year.

Mr. and Mrs. Inalari are both naturalized citizens of this country. Augustin is looking forward to long, pleasant years of retired life right here in Ewa.

Roque Agambot, a native of Dingrao, Ilocos Norte, first

came to Hawaii in 1928 assigned to Makaweli on Kauai. After nine years there, he moved to Ewa where his employment date is shown as April 20, 1937.

After five years as an Irrigator, Mr. Agambot transferred to Knapsack Spraying and in January 1946 was assigned to the Harvesting Division as a Portable Trackman. He returned to irrigation once again in 1961 and remained an Irrigator until February, 1964 when he was reassigned to Yard and Parks Maintenance for reason of health. Mr. Agambot, a bachelor, is planning to return to his land of birth in the near future.

Santiago Saludares was already an old timer in Hawaii when he came to Ewa on December 1, 1946. A native of Dinoraa, Ilocos Norte, he was first assigned to Waihua from where he moved to Wahiawa to work for the California Packing Corporation. He then came to Ewa in 1935 and worked until 1942 when he left to work on a defense project.

Mr. Saludares' continuous service spans a period of 21 years and a month of which 16 years were with the Preparation Division on various jobs mostly now with planting. He had been an Irrigator since February, 1964.

Mr. and Mrs. Saludares and their three sons will continue to make their home in Fernandez Willace.

Banner Crowd Attends Ewa Fair

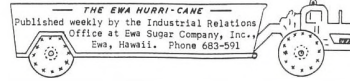
