H-Cane Interviews Acting Manager



The Hurri-Cane interviewed Mr. E. C. Bryan upon his appointment to Acting Manager.

Asked how he felt about being acting manager, Mr. Bryan said, "First it is a great privilege and honor to be placed in such a position of trust, particularly at a plantation like Ewa, which has such a fine reputation. It is an additional honor and privilege to be placed in such a position of trust when it means working with the fine group of people that make up Ewa Plantation".

Ewa a good place to work and a fine place to live. Naturally, it is his desire to see this company prosper and keep the community prosperous.

Mr. Bryan said he was mindful that he must depend upon everyone at Ewa to cooperate in raising our production and keeping our operations efficient. Progress requires change, but it is his belief that changes will mean better jobs and better working conditions for everyone, as well as greater production at lower cost.

A Waialua boy, he graduated from Waialua Elementary School and Leilehua High School. He obtained a degree in geological engineering from the Colorado School of Mines in 1942.

During World War II, he served with the Army Signal Corps for four years, and was an assistant departmental engineer with Morrison-Knudsen Company before coming to Ewa.

Mr. Bryan, assistant manager since 1957, joined the plantation as housing director in 1947, and was appointed assistant to manager in 1949.

Ewa's Oldtimers

February 2, 1962

Meet CARMELO AGUSTIN, the oldtimer, in this issue. Thirtyfour years ago, Mr. Agustin came to Hawaii to work at Ewa. He was hired as a laborer on October 29, 1927.

Carmelo came from Dingras, Ilocos Norte, P.I., a young man of 23, eager to gain a place on a sugar plantation and earn money for his widowed mother, whom he left in the old country.

The jobs he held before becoming an irrigator were cane cutter and cane loader.

Since his arrival here in 1927, Mr. Agustin has visited the Philippines three times. Carmelo is married and hopes to join his wife in the near future. He resides at Fernandez Village with two other employees.

Plantation Notes...

Four new photochemical sunlight-recorder stations were installed on Thursday, January 4, by the Waipio Substation staff. They are located on Reservoirs 6, 9, and 10, and at Field 79.1. The analytical work for these stations will be done at Waipio. We will continue to operate the station which has been located near the mill since 1943. All these stations will give us representative sunlight data for all parts of the plantation.

Because of rain, all of the pumps were shut down at noon Tuesday, January 16 except for 2 and 15 where water was used to continue ripening rounds in Fields 20.2, 23.1, 32 and 41. No irrigation, except for the above, was done for the rest of the week.

Now that we are back to harvesting, tours through the plant have been resumed.

Daily tours are 10:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.

The I.R.D. records show that 2,288 tourists, students and others toured our plant last year. There were others handled by other department which were not recorded.

If you wish to tour the plant, please call the IRD office.

About 90 employees of Ewa who are either full time truck drivers or who on occasions drive trucks have completed their required Public Utilities Commission physical examination. Others who are required by the PUC to have the examination will be scheduled in due course.

As for the trucks and cane hauling units, the garage personnel have made good progress in equipping them with the required safety features.

Ted Sparrow, formerly our assistant agriculturist and now Kohala Sugar Company's agriculturist, dropped in last week Wednesday at our Ag. office to pay his old friends a visit. It was nice of him to remember his old gang.

During Ted's few days on Oahu, he attended a conference for agriculturists of Castle & Cooke's plantations at Waialua Agricultural Company.


Richard, who holds the job of field hand, is at present on a temporary transfer to the job of portable pump sprayer.
