At present, Domingo is on a temporary transfer to the mill.

While visiting the Philippines in the fall of 1962, Domingo married the former Miss Teodora Mangubat of Cebu City. Since her arrival in Hawaii, Mrs. Paraz has been associated with the University of Hawaii, Hilo branch, teaching the Visayan dialect to the Peace Corps students.

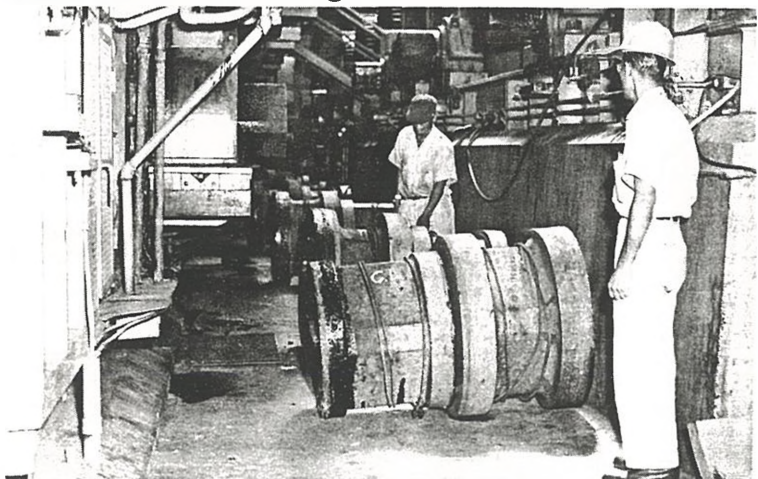
The mill finished grinding at 7:10 a.m. Tuesday.

From the Manager's Desk

Although the grinding season is over with a gratifying production attained, the plantation cannot afford to sit back and relax. It took hard work and good team play by each one of the 695 of us here at Ewa to see the season through. I appreciate the wonderful spirit that has prevailed.

Faced with an early start next year, we have a busy schedule ahead of us. Our factory has to be readied in the short time allotted, the field equipment must be put in top operating condition, over 500 acres remain to be planted before the year is out, and a hundred and one other jobs are to be done.

Yes, there is work ahead, but it should not in anyway dull the satisfaction of the good job just completed.

Production Box Score

Sugar manufactured and shipped to date totalled 55,619 tons. Sugar held in storage, awaiting shipment, was estimated at 1,040 tons, bringing the total to an estimated 56,659 tons for the calendar year 1963.

The 4,251 acres harvested this year required 172 operating days.
