This annual observance of Lincoln's birthday has been held on the campus ever since the arrival of the statue to the school in 1944.

It's worth saying again that the statue was a gift of the late Katherine McIntosh Burke, one time principal of Ewa school, and it is considered as one of the finest Lincoln statues in the world today.

Highlighting the program were skits, speeches, singing and the traditional draping of leis on the statue. The music was provided by the Royal Hawaiian Band.
