

## E.R.A. Carnival A Tremendous Success; Gross Over \$20,000 for Three Nights

My heartfelt "well-done" to all of you.

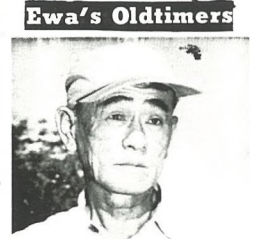

Next in line of our long list of oldtimers is HARUKICHI WATANABE of Tenney Village. Mr. Watanabe, who will have worked 36 years at Ewa on the 21st of this month, is presently on temporary transfer to the Yards and Parks Division.

Born in Honolulu on January 3, 1925, he attended grammar school in Kaneohe. After completing the sixth grade, he got a job with the Libby, McNeil and Libby Company as a field laborer. ### Registration Dates Set for Adult Evening Classes

Also, the Waipahu high school adult evening classes will have its registration on September 9 and 11 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Similar no-tuition classes are being offered plus classes in high school subjects and hobby courses if enough people register for a class.

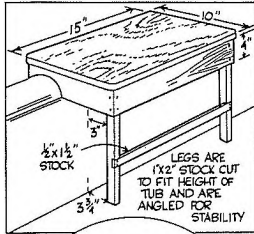

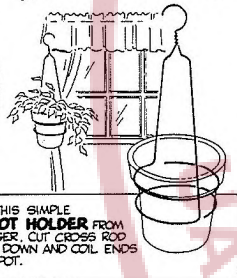
# How to Do It

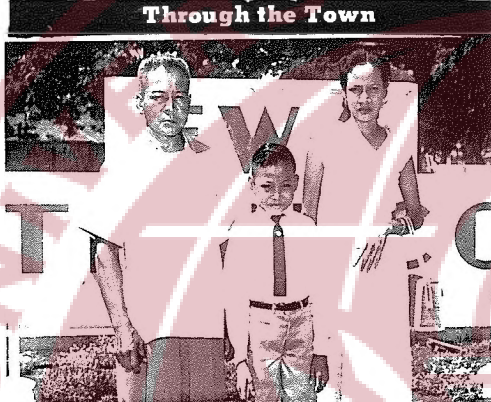

## The Current Situation It's Shocking!

Do you shock easily? We'll bet you do.

We'll also bet that the next big shock you get may kill you. That is, if you happen to get it this way:

--By sticking your fork inside the toaster next time the bread sticks in the "down" position.

--Turning on the electric light switch while wet-mopping the floor in your bare feet.

--Turning on the radio while you are taking a bath.

--Poking around inside your TV while the plug is still in the wall socket.

More than 1,000 people die needlessly from electric shocks each year, says the National Safety Council. Many of these accidents happen in the home.

But you can avoid a lot of risks by keeping these simple rules always in mind:

1. Don't touch appliances or radios while you are in the bathtub or when your hands are wet.
2. Unplug appliances or TVs if you must poke into them. In TV sets, be wary of heavy condensers.
3. Ground appliances in damp locations, such as washers and dryers. Always ground portable electric tools, especially when used outside.
4. Replace worn appliance cords.

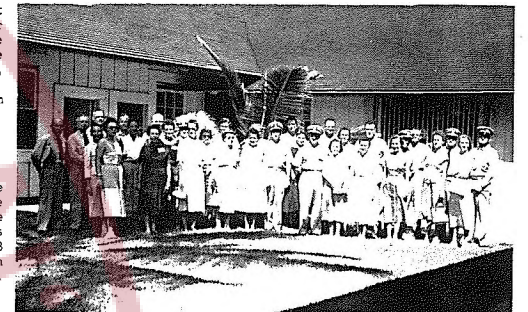

## A New Road to Barber's Point

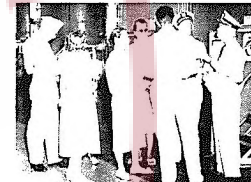


A new road leading off from Farrington Highway, just above Ft. Barrette, and going through our cane fields to Barber's Point is now under construction.

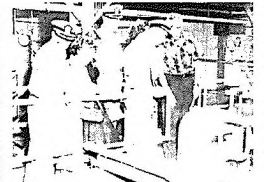
