## Fire Damages Ewa Field

Ewa's third accidental cane fire this year swept through 15 1/2 acres last Friday night in Field 79.1. The stand of cane in this field was slightly over 13 months old, far below the optimum growth stage. Just how this fire started is a deep mystery. But the fact remains that it resulted in a loss to the plantation which need not have been.

The first fire this year was in Field 77 which destroyed 13.35 acres on January 31. Field 1 sustained some damage by fire on March 8. Fortunately the fire was detected early and put out before it did too much damage.

With the advent of hot, dry weather, fire hazard becomes more and more a thing of dread at Ewa. And one way to be prepared against this hazard is knowing what to do.

To report a fire: Ewa Plantation Fire call, dial 681-9247.

When reporting a fire, stay on the line three minutes or more, repeating slowly the location of the fire. Those responding to the alarm will remove the receiver, say nothing, and listen carefully to the location of the fire.

To stop alarm ringing, remove receiver from telephone and replace.

If the alarm should be dialed in error, STAY ON THE LINE and report such to all who answer.

To call Waipahu and Ewa Beach Fire Stations, dial 673-1111.

## Ewa School Registration

Registration for children (born in 1963) to enter Kindergarten and for children (born in 1962) to enter Grade 1 in September, 1968 will be held at April 9-11, 1968 at Ewa School office from 7:30 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. (Children attending Ewa School Kindergarten now do not need to register again for Grade 1).

The number of Kindergarten teachers assigned Ewa for next school year depends on how many children register.

Before the children can enter school for the first time, they must have had immunization against Polio and Measles (unless had measles), a physical examination since September 5, 1967, and immunization since September 5, 1966 against Smallpox, Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (Whooping Cough). The child's records of any previous immunization will be required at the time of the physical examination and immunizations. Parents are asked to have their children examined and immunizations started before coming to school April 9-11 to register and to bring the following: Child's Birth Certificate; Child's Immunization Records; Health Card (Form 14); and the filled-out School Record Data Sheet.

## Traffic Code Highlights "Part 4"

ARTICLE VI. TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES

Sec. 15-6-4. TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS. Whenever traffic controlled by traffic control signals exhibiting the words "Go", "Caution", or "Stop", or exhibiting different colored lights successively, one at a time, or with arrows, the following colors only shall be used and said words and lights shall indicate and apply to drivers of vehicles and pedestrians as follows:

- (1) Green alone or "Go".
- (2) Yellow alone or "Caution" when shown following the Green or "Go" signal.
- (3) Red alone or "Stop".

Sec. 15-6-7. FLASHING SIGNALS.

Whenever flashing red or yellow signals are used, they shall require obedience by vehicular traffic as follows:

- (1) Flashing Red (stop signal). When a red lens is illuminated with rapid intermittent flashes, driver of vehicles shall stop before entering the nearest crosswalk at an intersection or at a stop line when marked, and the right to proceed shall be subject to the rules applicable after making a stop at a stop sign.
- (2) Flashing Yellow (caution signal). When a yellow lens is illuminated with rapid intermittent flashes, drivers of vehicles may proceed through the intersection or past such signal only with caution.

Onofre Bolanos, a Mechanical Engineer with the U.S. Coast Guard in Honolulu, has been assigned to make an inspection tour of all the U.S.C.G. Loran Stations (long range aid to navigation) in the Philippines. He expects to leave shortly and will be gone for about three weeks. On his way back, he plans to visit Hongkong, Formosa and other Asiatic points of interest.
