ISAMU NEYA, our next oldtimer came to the Islands at the age of 19 in June, 1924 on the Kosa-to Maru to join his father who at that time was employed at this Company.

He began his employment at Ewa Plantation Company on July 3, 1924 as an irrigator. He then was transferred to the factory as a Juice pan watchman. After a month on that job, he was promoted to mill oiler (3 years), crusher feeder (14 years), engine tender mechanic (10 years), mill maintenance mechanic (5 years), then worked his way up to his present job, cleaning plant mechanic.

Isamu was born in Okayama-ken, Japan on April 26, 1905. In November, 1939, he was granted a 3-month leave of absence to Japan. He became a naturalized citizen on April 18, 1957.

Isamu is a widower and he resides at Fernandez Village with his three children; Francis with the Air Force is, now stationed on the Mainland, and is on military leave from the plantation; Eloise, employed with the Mutual Express Service, Ltd. as a clerk; and Geraldine, a student at Honolulu Business College.

"PARKING ON SOMEBODY ELSE'S NICKEL"

Life in America is just like parking on somebody else's nickel. Every one of us has had the frequent experience of starting to put a coin in a parking meter, only to find that there is time still left, from the former occupant of that parking space. And we accept this bonus without thinking. In doing this, we are like a lot of Americans who take the great privileges of our freeway of life without thinking.

When someone knocks on our front door, our hearts don't stop beating from fear that it's the gepapo, or state police, come to grill us on our political views. No one stops us as we cross state lines, and demands to see if our "papers" are in order. And in Hawaii, thank God, no one insults and segregates you, regardless of the color of your skin, in any restaurant or hotel in our entire State. But each of these significant privileges is not of our own personal doing. We're parking on someone else's nickel! Or as the Bible puts it, we are "reaping where another sowed".

Our Christian faith comes to us as the gift of others. Every cross on every altar or church steeple proclaims the sacrifice of Jesus Christ - and the free gift of his love to each one of us. We are also debtors for our faith to Peter and Paul, and Barnabas, to Martin Luther and John Calvin and - here in Hawaii - Hiram Bingham. And hosts of other Christians gave their labors, their talents, and even their lives, that we might have the Holy Bible in our own language, and be free to read it in our own homes.

Your church is in existence because of someone else's nickel! Others poured their love and devotion into the building of this House of God. Others provided its pews, its organ, its lovely altar. And we just accept it without thinking, most of the time.

HAU BUSH RECREATION AREA

DO YOU WANT THIS TO CONTINUE



Hau bush exists for only one reason -- to provide recreation and enjoyment for employees of Ewa Plantation Company and their families. If there's room, we can also entertain some guests. It's a privilege for all of us to share. So we should also share the responsibility of seeing that no one destroys and denies us that privilege by thoughtless, destructive acts. All of us also realize that some of the abuses have been by persons who have no right to be in the area.

Because of continued misuse of the Hau Bush Recreation area and the acts of vandalism which have occurred on this piece of property, it has now become necessary to put into operation a set of rules governing its use. They will provide necessary control measures and will require everyone's cooperation.

The new rules are printed below for your information and guidance. Let us all realize that these rules are not designed to discourage us from using the Hau Bush area but to preserve it for our enjoyment for a long time to come.

PLEASE READ AND HEED!

All persons planning to make use of the Hau Bush Recreation Area must register with the Industrial Relations Department where they will be issued a pass. This pass is not transferable and will only be good for the days and dates specified.

An exception may be made to the above regulation when a family group includes an adult, or when any other group includes an adult who is willing to assume the responsibility for the group. Under these circumstances a dated group pass will be issued to the responsible adult stating the number of people participating in the group activity.

Any person found within the area without permission will be requested to leave the premises and may be charged with trespassing.

Each employee may take to Hau Bush as his guests up to five persons excluding members of his family provided he himself is present while they are in the area.

Any employee wishing to take more than five guests may do so by making special arrangements with the Industrial Relations Department, providing the number of guests will not jeopardize the use of the area by other employees.

The holder of a pass will be held responsible for the conduct of the members of his family and guests as well as his own personal conduct while in the Hau Bush area. Any violation of these regulations will be considered sufficient cause for refusing to issue further passes to the violator.

The Ewa Plantation Company will not be responsible for personal injuries received, damage to and theft or loss of personal property while in the area.

Keys to the gate and other facilities will be issued on request to employees and adult members of their families by the Industrial Relations Department.

Persons drawing keys will be issued instructions relative to the security of the area. The gate must be closed and locked or entering and departing. Cars are not allowed to park on the Athletic Field.

Your Social Security

One of the goals of the Social Security Administration is to pay benefits as promptly as possible to those persons entitled to payments. Kenichi Sushiro, Field Representative of the Honolulu Social Security office stated today.

To do this, Mr. Sushiro said, it is necessary for the person claiming benefits to make inquiry for payments at his local Social Security office. A worker should inquire before he retires if he knows he will be retiring on a certain date. This will give the Social Security Administration and the person claiming benefits time to get the information and evidence together to establish his rights to the payment before his first check is due.

Generally, evidence will be required to prove the age of the retired person and the age of his wife. This may be a birth certificate or other record of age that is old and reliable. Also, evidence of the worker's earnings in the year that ended before he plans to retire is necessary. This may be a copy of the Federal income tax return for self-employed persons or the W-2 forms for wage earners.

Mr. Sushiro again stressed that for prompt payment of your first Social Security check "inquire before you retire" at your Honolulu Social Security office.

Keys will be returned to the Industrial Relations Department at the earliest convenient moment after the termination of the dated pass. A verbal report will be made at that time on the condition of the area found on arrival and departure. Any irregularities observed while in the recreation area should also be reported.

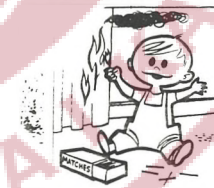
Diabetes Survey Starts Next Week

Your supervisor will inform you of the day, time and place of your scheduled test.

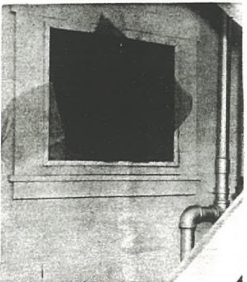
Necessary form for the test will be handed to you by your supervisor in advance so that you will have sufficient time to fill it out. If you have any difficulty with the form, please ask your supervisor or bring it to the Industrial Relations Office.

Here's a reminder...It is important that the last meal before the test contains plenty of sugar and starch. Be sure to eat at least 1 1/2 cups of rice or 3 slices of bread or 3 doughnuts or pancakes. In addition include one of the following: 3 teaspoons of sugar, jam, jelly or syrup, or 1 candy bar, or 1 piece of cake with frosting, or pie. In addition to the food suggested, you may eat anything else you wish. **AND THIS IS IMPORTANT--Do not eat or drink anything other than water between the time you finish your meal and the test.**

Tomas Baguion, a former employee at Ewa Plantation, will leave on Wednesday, October 28 on the President Cleveland to take permanent residence in the Philippines.

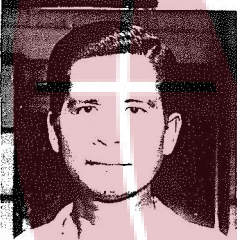
Mr. Baguion was pensioned on May of this year.

Dr. Kiyoshi Ikeda Asst. Professor at Univ. of Wisconsin

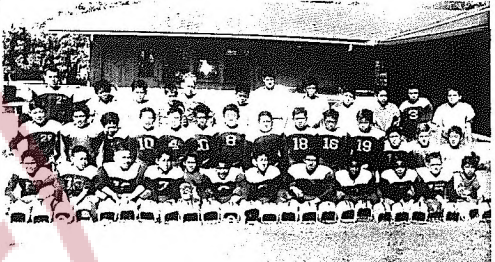
