

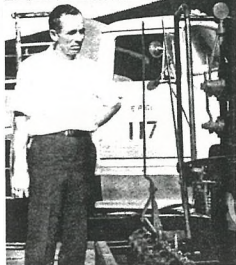

## Water Pollution Program Hawaii Different From Other States

Hawaii is different in many respects from the other 49 states. We do not have river systems or broad areas of shallow coastal waters, but instead steeply sloping islands, surrounded by a vast and deep ocean. Not being connected to any other state, nothing we do can possibly affect any other state. And as big as it is, the ocean would seem to be an ideal means of disposing of agricultural wastes.

In a few areas of the islands, our use of near coastal waters does interfere with better uses; in most areas it does not, and will not do so in the foreseeable future.

Where our use has interfered with a better use, e.g.: bagasse was known to be floating into Hilo Harbor and the nearby shorelines, the practice has been ceased, though at considerable cost. Other solutions are not so simply arrived at and it will take time to provide for further and more comprehensive research and study to solve the problems in a practical and reasonable means. Time and a great deal of money will be required. (To be continued)

## C&C Plantation Profits Increase

Castle and Cooke's three plantations have reported profitable operations for the fiscal year ended April 30, with Ewa Plantation Company and Waialua Agricultural Company showing marked increases in earnings over last year.

Ewa and Kohala showed big increases in net earnings while Waialua showed a slight decline. Ewa's net income of \$761,286 or \$4.91 a share, compares with the previous years \$216,943 and \$1.38 per share. The gain was largely due to a sizable increase in output plus a higher price for sugar.

Production last year was 61,874 tons, compared with 53,250 the year before and \$140.97 a ton returned against \$133.68 the previous year.

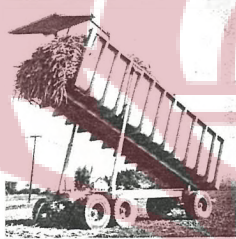
## Valerie Pagdilao Contest Winner

## Kaiser Requests Pensioners Enroll

As announced last month, the Kaiser Foundation Health Plan will provide medical and hospital benefits for Ewa employees and pensioners spelled out in the plantation's Medical Plan Agreement with the I.L.W.U. This becomes effective on July 1, 1967.

Transfer of employee coverage to the Kaiser Plan has been completed. But Kaiser has asked the plantation to have each pensioner covered by the Medical Plan to sign his enrollment card. All Ewa pensioners are therefore asked to come to the Industrial Relations Office to sign the card during the coming week--no later than June 16th. Those covered by Medicare should bring their medicare card with them.

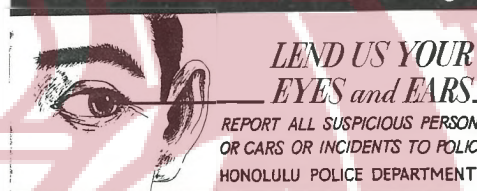

## "Mahalo Nui Loa" "Gakugei-Kai"

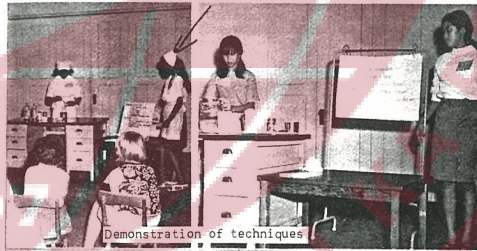
