



Changing Patterns

Back in 1957, Cuba supplied roughly three-fourths of foreign sugar coming into the U.S., with the Philippines accounting for a major part of the rest.

In 1963, Cuba supplied none and the Philippines led the list of foreign suppliers, although the amount of its increase was relatively small.

Why Sugar Price Going Down?

Several basic factors seem to be working against high U.S. raw sugar prices. It is timely to explain them. The basic reasons relate to U.S. demand (or lack of it) for refined sugar, and the world sugar price. These two conditions have produced various side effects.

Per capita sucrose usage in the U.S. has been declining since 1962. This has resulted largely from high sucrose prices which encouraged a substantial jump in the use of corn sweeteners as well as forming the needed excuse for large scale experimentation with artificial sweeteners and subsequent increased use by the soft drink industry of the latter.

1963 was a very abnormal year in several ways. As a result, refiners' stocks at the start of 1964 were 500,000 tons higher than those at the start of 1963, which had been the highest on record.

Quota allocation needs for 1964 are estimated at 9,050,000 to 9,100,000 tons. But 9,300,000 tons have been allocated in the form of definite quota assignments for the year 1964, and the needs appear to be less.

The total foreign sugar coming into the U.S. Market in 1957 was 4,255,958 short tons, raw value, according to the Lamborn list. In 1963, the total was 4,555,215 tons -- remaining relatively unchanged.

(The rest, or the major portion, of U.S. requirements comes from domestic suppliers, including Hawaii. Although the amount of foreign sugar supplied the U.S. has remained relatively even, its proportion has declined because of the increase in U.S. consumption and the giant increase in the amount supplied by the beet sugar makers. Total U.S. needs over a year have ranged from some 9,000,000 tons to 10,000,000 tons.)

In 1957, Cuba accounted for 3,131,596 tons and the Philippines, 906,252 tons. All other countries supplied only 218,110 tons.

FOREIGN SUGAR - Cuban imports to the U.S. were cut off to zero in 1961 after Fidel Castro came to power. In 1963, the Philippines accounted for 1,194,833 tons, and other countries 3,360,382 tons.
