Credit Union Announces Dividend, Directors

The Ewa Federal Credit Union announced a dividend of 4.75 percent, amounting to \$40,115.70 to be paid to its shareholders for 1968, at its annual meeting last Friday, January 31. Assets as of December 31, 1968, totalled \$1,065,989.57, a 4.6% increase over last year's \$1,019,324.85, when total assets first reached and passed the million dollar level.

Among other figures contained in the statistical report to members: Seven hundred and sixteen loans amounting to \$874,912 were granted during 1968. During the past year 32 new members were added while 38 left, to give a total active membership of 719 as of December 31, 1968.

Besides presentation of the statistical report, the board of directors and the credit committee for 1969 were announced. Newly-elected directors are John Abe, Rex Elliott and Jose Narciso. They join present board members, Tony Rise, Felix Clemente, Mariano Taloma, Toshio Murakami, and Tokiyoshi Kawakami. One seat on the board, that of treasurer, is still vacant and will be filled by board appointment. Newly-elected credit committee members are Reolonda Diaz and Judy Nagatani (alternate). They join present committee members, Jane Kunishige and Chiyo Kidani.

Harvest Date Changed

The start of '69 harvesting, originally scheduled for February 10, has been changed to Tuesday, February 18, reports Assistant Manager Robert Cushnie.

The '69 harvest is expected to cover 4,617 acres with an estimated yield of 57,000 tons.

Ewa Men Hurt in Auto Accident

Four Ewa men were injured in an automobile accident on Fort Weaver Road near the plantation stables last Friday night, January 31. Their car, headed toward Waipahu on Fort Weaver, went off the road, jumped an irrigation ditch and struck a utility pole head on.

Most seriously injured in the late evening crash was Stanley Perry, whose condition is listed as "serious" at the Kaiser Hospital, where he is confined. Also injured were: Victor Pan-tohan, Sr., who sustained forehead lacerations and broken ribs and was released from Kaiser yesterday, February 6; Virgilio Domingo, who suffered facial lacerations, cuts on both legs and waist and was also released from Kaiser yesterday, February 6; and Abraham Cuyno who is listed in "good" condition at Leeward Hospital.

Families of the four men have asked the Hurri-Cane to extend their sincere gratitude to their many friends and well-wishers for their prayers and support during this most trying period.

With the church just moved into its new Ewa surroundings a few weeks, St. Barnabas' Episcopal Church is making another change. The Reverend Charles Smith, vicar of St. Barnabas' since March of last year, is now vicar of St. Phillip's Church in Maile. Father Smith, however, will not be severing his ties with St. Barnabas' completely, as he will still be assisting with the setting up of the church's new community-center-oriented program.

Taking Father Smith's place as vicar of St. Barnabas' is the Reverend Albert Collins, present vicar of the Church of the Holy Spirit in Waipahu. Father Collins will be maintaining both Ewa and Waipahu vicarages, a feat not impossible for him, as in the past he has had up to four churches under his jurisdiction at the same time.

Father Collins is a former plantation man, having retired from Pioneer Mill as a chief chemist in 1961 before entering the priesthood. As an old hand at the plantation game, he is anxious to get to know the people of Ewa's plantation community.
