Ewa's '65 Crop

The start of harvest, put off from last week due to wet weather, remained uncertain as this paper went to press. Although the sky above Ewa indicated perfect harvesting weather there can be no guarantee of continued celestial cooperation.

This year's crop will be Ewa's 74th consecutive annual harvest, the first having been taken off in 1891. In this 75th year that Ewa has been in business, the cooperation of every member of the Ewa team is an especial must in order to enable the plantation to cope with the gloomy sugar picture in prospect.

Elsewhere in the Sugar Industry...

Leading off the 1965 crop were 10 Big Island plantations - Hawaiian Agricultural, Hilo, Hutchinson, Pauha, Laupahoehoe, Hamakua Mill, Honokaa, Kohala, Onohea and Pepeekeo, and one on Kauai - Kilauea Sugar. They started their harvesting and milling last week.

***** Ten of Hawaii's 26 sugar companies broke their own individual production records to help set a new high for the industry in 1964 - 1,178,770 tons! This beats the previous record of 1,140,112 tons, established in 1955 by some 38,900 tons.

Plantations which surpassed their previous individual highs were: Kekaha Sugar Co., Kilauea Sugar Co., Gay & Robinson, Waialua Agricultural Co., Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co., Waialua Sugar Co., Hawaiian Agricultural Co., Hutchinson Sugar Co., Onohea Sugar Co., and Laupahoehoe Sugar Co.

ECHOES FROM EWA'S PAST SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO....

"Mr. Castle still retaining faith in his conclusions that a successful plantation could be developed upon the lands, ultimately submitted a proposition to the firm of Castle & Cooke, under the general terms of which a corporation was to be formed for the purpose of establishing and operating a sugar plantation. Castle and Cooke were to act as general and financial agents of the Company. His proposition was accepted and what is now known as the Ewa Plantation Company was formed. The charter was granted on JANUARY 23, 1890, and, at a subsequent meeting of subscribers to the capital stock of the Company, the first officers were elected."

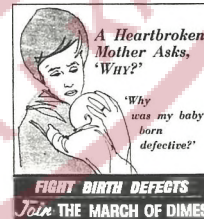
