Corn For Ewa Carnival



Corn on the cob will again be one of the many "goodies" at our E.R.A. Carnival and Fair this year. Last Friday the Scouts of Ewa's Troop 17 cycled $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to plant a corn patch in the coral pit near the papaya orchard. Under the direction of Assistant Scoutmaster James Omoto, the $\frac{1}{3}$ acre was planted and irrigated (bucket brigade style) within 3 hours---a job well done.

An estimated harvest of 6,000 ears of corn, a variety known as "Hawaiian Sugar", should be available for the Carnival crowd come September.

Also in connection with this project, ten scouts will endeavor to earn the Corn Farming merit badge. They are Gordon Inouye, Delwyn Jo, Leighton Ogawa, Stanford Ornellas, Clifford Yamaoka, Alan Matsushima, Clyde Yamauchi, Oren Murakami, Edwin Tanaka and Darwin Matsushima.

The area was made available to the scouts by the plantation through the kokua of the Superintendent of Diversified Agriculture, H. C. Penhallow.

Tax Hints

WORKERS SHOULD ACT NOW TO AVOID 1964 INCOME TAX PROBLEMS, advises the Internal Revenue Service. A 4-page "guide" being mailed to four-and-a-half million employers foresees collection difficulties because, under the 1964 tax cut, withholding rates on individuals' pay dropped more sharply than the tax rates themselves. Consequently, many persons who have become accustomed to refunds may be surprised next spring to find they owe a sizable lump sum on this year's income. The IRS suggestion is that employers ask their workers either: (1) decrease the number of their exemptions, or (2) arrange for greater holdbacks. Every exemption dropped increases the amount withheld by about \$1.80 a week, the Service notes.

Ewa employees wishing to follow the above suggestions may ask for changes to be made accordingly at the plantation's Industrial Relations office.

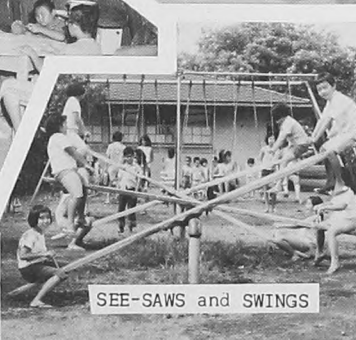
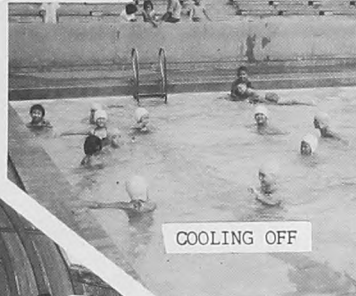

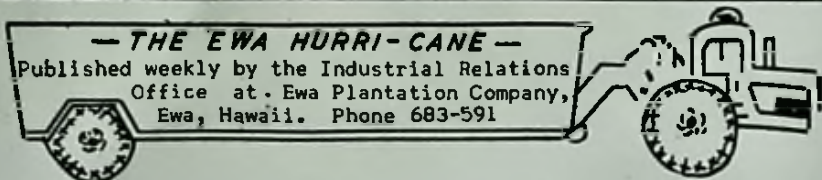
Summer Fun!
