For Needy Kids

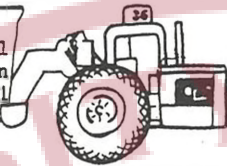

Ewa's Oldtimers

When Manuel Victoria was eight years old, his father came to Ewa on a vacation from Kohala. Manuel's father stayed. Manuel stayed. A few years later, his father died and Manuel went to work to support his family. He did several jobs in the field department and then the lure of the mainland called and Manuel learned railroading with the Southern Pacific in California. In 1916, the lure of Hawaii called and Manuel came back to work on Ewa's railroad until it was replaced in 1948.

With his wife Mary, Manuel has raised a family that is now grown and scattered far from home. Manuel Jr., the oldest son, is living in Philadelphia. A daughter lives in Texas. Other Victorias are in Kaimuki and Kailua. Son James is the only one who works for the plantation. He is a Mill Yard Crane Operator.

In 1948 Manuel went to work

in the steel shop where he has worked on many projects that have changed our plantation operations. But operations aren't the only changes that Manuel has seen.

As a young man, Manuel liked to hunt and fish. He remembers when you could go up "DPD" hill above the cane fields and see as many as 2 or 3 hundred goats at one time. They aren't there any more. He also liked to go torch fishing. In recent years, the more active sports have given way to work in the yard and listening to ball games on radio and TV.

Available Under

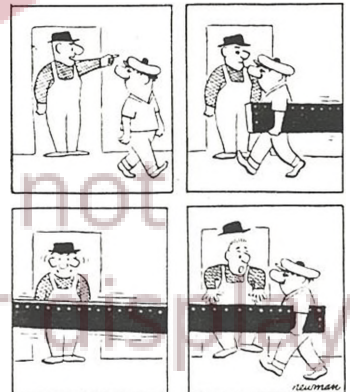
Medical Plan

Garton Wall, physician-surgeon, has announced that Salk Polio Vaccine is available to three groups and will be included under Ewa's Medical Plan coverage.

Those who at this time may receive the vaccine are all children under 16 years, expectant mothers and any one under 20 years who is going to the mainland.

Dr. Wall urges every one to take their shots as soon as possible so that they will build up an immunity before the first of the year. Statistics show that polio is most apt to strike between January and June.

Sugar News

No-Cost Refinancing!

Ewa is getting cooler. Since the first of the year, average temperatures have been lower than usual. The drop was 2 to 4 degrees during the months of July, August and September.

From July 1 to the end of the crop, mechanical ratooning crews kept the interval from end of harvest to end of mechanical ratooning to an average of 1.59 days. During the same period in 1954 the interval was 3.70 days.

Dick Noda, assistant physician-surgeon, attended the 12th annual Territorial Association of Plantation Physicians meet, held on Maui, November 10 thru 13. The association is composed of about 45 sugar and pineapple plantation physicians.

HC&S on Maui is turning to bamboo pipe for irrigation use in cane fields. The bamboo is cut from an 80 acre plot, given a protective coating and prepared for the field. Their objective: Maui-grown products and Maui manpower.

If you've wondered what happened to many of our supervisors this past weekend, here's the answer. They attended the 14th annual meeting of the Hawaiian Sugar Technologists. It was held at the HSPA Experiment Station.

HST is composed of 1,186 technologists in Hawaii's sugar industry or associated with it, of which some 500 attended this last meeting.

Of the 28 sugar plantations in Hawaii, 15 have completed grinding, including all 4 of the Oahu's plantations. Oahu's production for the year is 220,758 tons.

Sixty-eight high school students are getting on-the-spot training on six sugar plantations this year. They are enrolled in the Part-time Cooperative Training Program in Vocational Agriculture given by the department of public instruction and the plantations.

The plantations are: Ewa, Waiialua, Oahu Sugar, Kanuku, Lihue and Kekaha.

Thursday, Nov. 24, Thanksgiving Hawaii's Plantation Population 52,615

Hawaii's sugar plantations family totals 52,615 persons.

The total is made up of sugar plantation employees, members of their families and planters working on plantations.

In a breakdown by islands, Hawaii led with 19,370. Maui was next with 12,328. Kauai had 11,318 and Oahu, 9,599.

By racial groupings, those of Japanese ancestry topped the list with a total of 20,548. Other groups came in this order: Filipino, 19,372; Portuguese, 5,615; Anglo-Saxon, 1,981; Hawaiian, 1,561; Puerto Rican, 1,428; Chinese, 447, and Korean, 136. Others numbered 1,527.

Of the total 52,615, men numbered 18,981; women, 11,062, and children 22,572.

This census is as of June 30, 1955.

Ewa Loses 26-13 to Kaimuki;

Takes on Kailua Next

Ewa Recreation Association Pop Warner football team lost its opening game last Saturday afternoon to the rugged Kaimuki eleven 26 to 13 at the Ewa field before a fairly good crowd.

Kaimuki got off to a fast 6-0 lead in the first quarter on a 45-yard drive following the kickoff. Roy Ige, the standout player of Kaimuki, swept around left end on a reverse play from the three yard line for the touchdown. Try for extra point failed. Ewa made it 6 all on a 30 yards pass and run play from quarterback Richard Itamoto, Jr. to Milton Oshiro, fullback, in the 2nd quarter. The line buck for extra point failed. In the closing seconds of the first half, Kaimuki scored another touchdown to gain a 13-6 edge at half time. It was again Roy Ige who toted the pigskin over the goal line.

In the early minutes of 3rd quarter, Kaimuki marched down the field for its third touchdown. Clifford Young smashed through from the 2-yard line for the TD.

On a handoff from Edwin Oya, Milton Oshiro, sparkplug of Ewa's team, broke loose around right end for 45 yards to score for Ewa. David Lum kicked the extra point to make it 19-13.

Kaimuki's fourth touchdown came in the last quarter on the reverse play which produced two other touchdowns. Roy Ige ram-bled 20 yards for the TD and converted to bring the final score to 26-13.
