Civil Defense in Action

"I've got over 14,000 severely injured people and only a 200-bed hospital and a first-aid station in which to treat them." "We've got over 50,000 people in our area, and a lot of our food supply was destroyed in the blast." "Honolulu wants to send 200,000 evacuees into your area. Can you handle them?" These were just some of the many problems faced by Civil Defense volunteers of Rural Area Command III (RAC III-Ewa and Waiānae districts) during a four-hour Civil Defense training exercise held last Thursday morning, October 17.

As part of the 370 people participating in the statewide exercise, the 37 RAC III staff members were faced with the following situation: early in the morning of October 19 a total of five nuclear bombs hit the state of Hawaii. Bombs were dropped on Luāluāie ammunition depot, Pearl Harbor, Honolulu International Airport, Kapaa on Kauai and Hilo Airport. Now, two days later on October 17, Civil Defense was to begin recovery operations.

Because their command was in charge of the Leeward area, the RAC III staff was mainly concerned with the bomb that hit Luāluāie. Headed by Assistant Administrator, Chagi Penhallow of Ewa Sugar Company, the staff began to pick up the bits and pieces. Casualties and damage were assessed. Radioactive fallout was determined. Major fires were spotted, and efforts were made to bring them under control. Engineering teams were dispatched to clear roads. Utilities worked on restoring power and water to the area. Inventories were taken, and supplies were sent. Hospitals were set up. There was a lot of noise and some confusion, but at the end of the exercise, four hours later, the situation was slowly being brought under control.

For many the exercise's end signalled a release of tension, for the situation had been realistic, and the problems many and complex. In assessing the happenings during the four-hour exercise, Assistant Administrator Chad Penhallow summarized: "It was very gratifying to note the serious manner in which the staff sections and supporting services coordinated their efforts to solve the many problems resulting from a major disaster of considerable magnitude.

"The problem solving activities for this exercise required a bold imagination and considerable knowledge of a possible situation that could have happened in order to arrive at a practical solution.

"Many valuable lessons were learned during this exercise, which was designed to focus attention on the recovery period. A number of weaknesses also became apparent which will require corrective action. It is only through these training exercises that a staff can be properly prepared to cope with a major disaster. The purpose of such training is to save lives, salvage equipment and supplies and restore some semblance of order under the conditions that were laid out in this make-believe but very realistic situation."

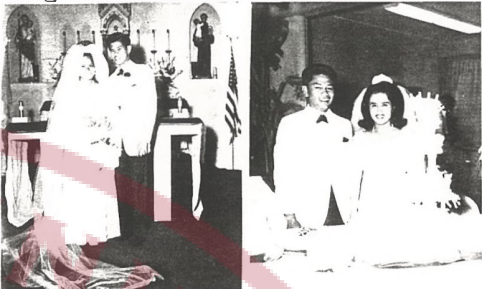
