## Manager Reports on '65-'66 Fiscal Year

Ewa produced 53,250 tons of sugar and 16,165 tons of molasses from 3,919 acres. The sugar tonnage compares with 57,338 tons produced from 4,550 acres in 1964-'65. The decrease in production was due mainly to the limitations placed on harvesting and milling operations by the year's unusually wet weather conditions.

Cane tonnage of 114.13 tons per acre was the highest for any similar period in Ewa's history. This compares with 101.71 tons of cane per acre last year and 111.14 tons the year before.

The factory handled field cane at an average rate of 187 tons an hour, a record for Ewa.

Ewa's mill extraction of 96.61 per cent is the highest in the industry, and the highest at Ewa since the advent of mechanical harvesting in 1937.

Ewa produced an average of 13.67 tons of sugar per acre. This bettered last year's average of 12.63 tons per acre and the previous year's 13.63 tons.

Net earnings amounted to \$216,044, compared with earnings of \$400,151, the year before.

The weather at Ewa during the year was marked by the heaviest rainfall in the plantation's 76-year history which hampered all phases of the plantation's operations. Adding further to the problems of the year was the loss of 84 acres of prime cane land to the State highway program. More land is expected to be lost as construction continues.

On the brighter side, a new system using cane haulers for daily "live" storage and an electric side-unloader was put into effect reducing cane damage from extra handling and deterioration in the mill yard pile. Also, a new pumping station and pipeline was installed with an 8,000,000 gallons a day capacity delivering surface or "caprock" water for irrigation.

Vice President and Manager Ed Bryan concluded that although the past year was a difficult one, the help and understanding of officers and Ewa directors, along with the cooperation of all employees, have helped set the stage for a better year ahead.

## Westchester Lariats Coming to Ewa

The Westchester Lariats, a nationally known song and dance group, are coming to Ewa on Friday, August 17 for a 7:00 P.M. performance.

The Lariats are one of the best known song and dance troupes in the U.S., having appeared many times on radio and television. They've been on shows with Lawrence Welk, Art Linkletter, Elenor Hemple, Al Jarvis and others.

One of the TV appearances was viewed by an estimated 44 million people. They've packed the 22,000 seat Hollywood Bowl three times and was featured at the World's Fair.

The Lariats range in age from ten to twenty-five years. They have spent about five hours per week for the past eight years learning the prettiest of the world's songs and dances. Their authentic costumes, sparkling personalities, and showmanship will make any audience appreciate the opportunity to see them in action.

The group will be guests of the community and will tour the mill and plantation before having dinner and performing.

The E.R.A. is sponsoring the free program which will be held in the Ewa gym.

## Lock All Doors!

## Sight Savers

Do not look directly at the sun while wearing sunglasses, says the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, Inc., warning all that the infrared rays which give a tan damage the retina of the eye.

The sight-saving organization urges sunbathers to protect their eyes from bright sunlight and reflected glare by using sunglasses. These should be chosen with as much care as regular glasses, checking for proper light transmission, tinting and comfortable fit.

The wise motorist will use sunglasses with correct lens density for the proper purpose to cut down glare when the sun is bright and still permit the wearer to see clearly. Sunglasses should never be worn while driving at dusk or dark. Drivers are reminded that tinted lenses reduce visibility, obscure road and traffic signs.

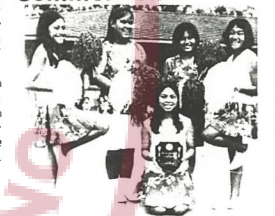
In 1962, Mits was promoted to Machine Shop Foreman and in 1965 to Special Projects Supervisor of the Industrial Engineering and Maintenance Department.
