## PREVENTING POISONING

REMEMBER:

Many products not labeled **POISON** may be poisonous, especially if taken by a child. For example, large quantities of aspirin can be fatal to a child.

Many poisonous substances have a delayed reaction and may not produce symptoms for some time after they are swallowed. Don't wait for symptoms to develop.

Eating substances containing lead (such as some paints, putty, etc.) over a period of time may produce an acute or chronic poisoning.

Many substances not normally poisonous may produce poisoning if taken by children, older folks, or someone who is sick.

Be on the safe side--treat as a poison any substance eaten by a child that is not food.

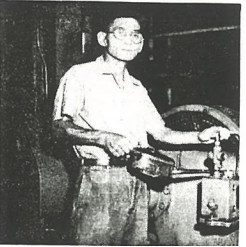

## Imagine a World Without Any Capital



**CAPITALISM**, like many words ending in 'ism,' means different things to different people. Leave off the 'ism' and the word becomes simpler. Capital is anything--a tool, a place, a machine--used to produce other goods.

It is hard to imagine a world without any capital at all. Above is the artist's idea of a scene in this kind of world: a primitive man catching fish with his bare hands. The lake, the fish, the man are all as Nature made them. When the spear and the net were invented, capital began to transform the world.

All of the progress man has ever made in living better is due to capital. And capital has contributed to cultural as well as to material progress--take the printing press, as just one example. Capital itself is due to two things: man's ingenuity in inventing capital, and his willingness to deny himself immediate enjoyment in order to put some of his resources into capital--time, labor, or money.

In America, individuals are free to own and use capital. That is a basic freedom--and all other forms of freedom may well depend upon it.

The people of Ewa extend their deepest sympathy to the family of the late Alejo Alcover.

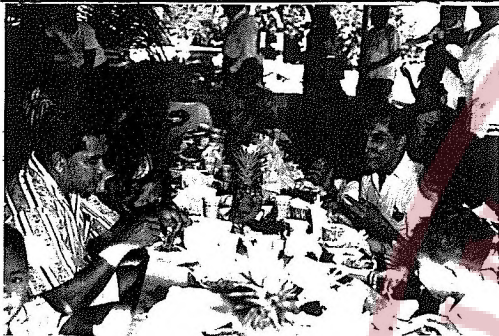
Mr. Alcover, age 65, of 146-A Wilkina Dr., Wahiawa, passed away on Thursday, July 9 at the Ewa hospital.

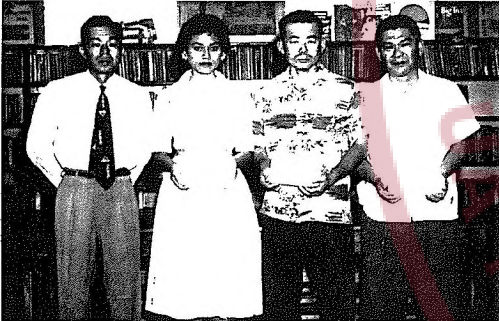
**Through the Town**

**Troop 17 Scouts Attend Camporal at Schofield**

Eight teams are entered in this playoff--three from Hawaii and five from Oahu.

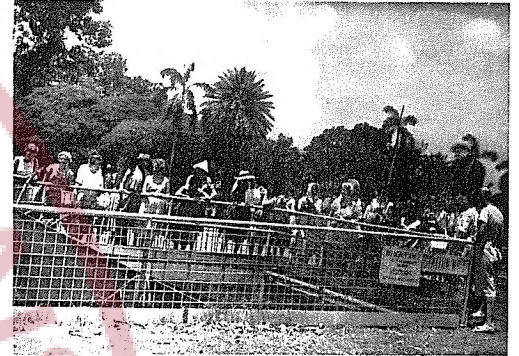

Volunteer workers of the Ewa Japanese Club are busy at work re-roofing the social clubhouse.

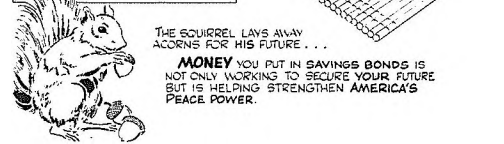
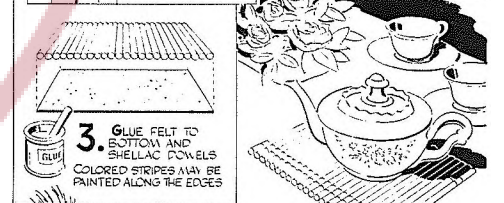
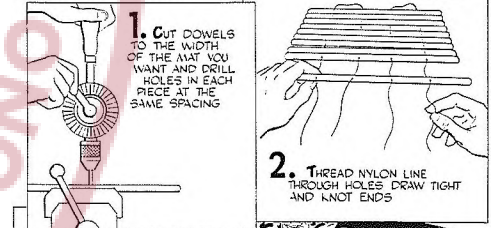
