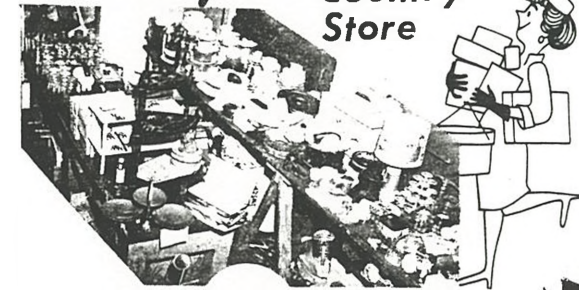

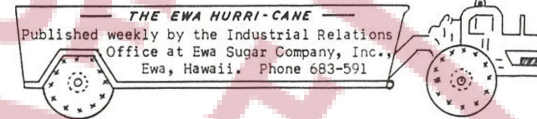

The Safe Way Is the Ewa Way

HOUSEKEEPING ON THE JOB

You can tell pretty well how safe a job is just by looking at it, before you ever start to work on it.

A job that looks clean, with everything in place, is a safe job. That's what we mean when we talk about housekeeping.

Good housekeeping calls for just two things. Try to remember them!

1. Keeping trash and loose objects picked up and disposed of.
2. Pile all materials and park all tools and equipment in the place where they belong.

These are simple rules but they mean a lot to all of us. When you see something lying around where it could trip a man or fall on him, put it in a safe place. Don't wait for someone else to do it.

Inspection of job tools comes under good housekeeping. Use of worn or broken tools is a plain invitation to an accident. It is part of good housekeeping to take a second look at sledges, wrenches, shovels and other hand tools and discard or repair those that are not safe.

When tools are not in use, store them in their proper place.

The Plantation

Sugar produced last week was about 1,900 tons. Grinding rates averaged 3,136 tons of net cane per day. Mill extraction was 96.43. The T.C./T.S. ratio averaged 8.34 as compared to 8.62 for the previous week. Cane supply was adequate. Lost time for the factory was 4.33 hours. The power plant and fireroom operated until 6:00 A.M. Saturday. Hay plant production was 83.27 tons.

Mill speeds were reduced for eight hours on Friday because bagasse storage was full. An estimated 300 tons of bagasse were hauled out to Field 71 over the week end.

Cane variety 59-3775 did not mill as well as 7209 or 3533 varieties. Power demands on the mill turbine increased by about 200 H.P. while grinding the new variety and the amount of excess bagasse increased. The long and slender stalks gave trouble at the unscrambler carding drum but this was a minor problem and can easily be corrected.

Harvesting crews completed 149 acres in Fields 47.2 and 47.1 during the week.

Cultivation crews covered 442 acres; plowing, 66; planting, 49; and replanting, 56. A record 208 acres was mechanically ratooned during the week, leaving this operation only 140 behind harvesting.

Sugar-Heart Disease Link Refuted

A casual relationship between the intake of sugar and the onset of heart disease is soundly refuted by a broad-based scientific research project recently reported in the British Medical Journal.

Conducted by a British research team headed by Drs. R. W. Howell and D. G. Wilson, the investigation shows no real difference in the quantity of sugar intake between a group of 1,158 men believed to be free of ischemic heart disease and 170 men with confirmed or possible ischemic heart disease.

The results also show that there is no significant correlation between sugar intake and serum cholesterol, white blood cell count, hemoglobin, E.S.R., B-lipoprotein, or uric acid. Furthermore, Howell and Wilson report no correlation whatsoever between total sugar intake and weight gain after the age of 25 years.

"Such a study--scientifically substantiated and conducted in the accepted manner of good, hard, public health research--throws a penetrating spotlight of suspicion on the loose and questionably-based, but much-publicized charges which periodically appear concerning some kind of relationship between sugar and heart disease," according to a report of the International Sugar Research Foundation, Inc. --From the Castle & Cooke Report
