What Is C&H?

C&H stands for California and Hawaiian - that's the brand name under which Hawaiian-grown sugar is sold. Our primary market area is actually in the 11 western states, but we are forced - by beet competition - to sell in most of the states west of the Mississippi river. C&H is an agricultural cooperative, owned entirely by Hawaii's 25 sugar companies. Most of our raw sugar is shipped there - at a cost, incidentally, of almost \$6 million a year - just for ocean freight which our beet competitors don't have. Our sugar is refined and packaged there - the refinery is at Crockett, near San Francisco - and then shipped throughout the western part of the country. There are more than 40 sugar beet factories in that area, by the way - just give you an idea of our competition.

1890 ECHOES FROM EWA'S PAST 1965

SEMI-CENTENNIAL-----The following passage is quoted from Manager Bond's report on the observance of Ewa's FIFTIETH YEAR in business.

"Fifty years ago a new sugar enterprise was started--Ewa Plantation Company. We celebrated our semi-centennial at Ewa on January 29, 1940, the anniversary of the chartering of the Company. The day was devoted primarily to employees and their families. A parade of processions started in the morning included an exhibit of old and new implements and various floats depicting the growth of the plantation. The day concluded the celebration."

"Of more significance to all of us than any of the activities of our celebration was the enthusiastic and whole-hearted cooperation in its preparation shown by everyone on the plantation. It is this spirit in our organization on which we can rely to continue our development."

9/10 of A Million

Sugar production in Hawaii for 1965 passed the 900,000-ton mark during the latter part of August.

The output was 884,316 tons, still a bit under the figure for the comparable time last year, which was 900,490 tons, but rapidly catching up.

Total production by the end of the grinding season is expected to surpass last year's record output, which was 1,178,770 tons.
