## General Plantation Health Good

Dr. Nils P. Larsen, Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association medical advisor, has reported general health on Hawaii's sugar plantations is as good as ever. His report covers a 25-year-period, comparing averages for three five-year periods: 1935-39, 1951-55 and 1956-60.

Health standards on Hawaii's sugar plantations have consistently been better than those for the state as a whole.

In circulatory diseases, the rates per 100,000 are 3,037 for 1956-60; 1,393 for 1951-55; and 923 for 1935-39. Dr. Larsen believes that circulatory heart disease and strokes are up markedly probably because of changes in the diet.

As income increases, people eat the more expensive foods which are also the more fatty and more savory foods.

Cancer rates for the same comparable periods are 244, 230 and 77, respectively. Reason is thought to be possibly due to the increasing age of the plantation population.

## A Wonderful Gesture

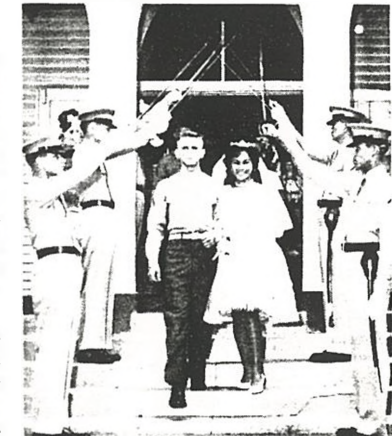
