Social Security

Social Security beneficiaries who have been limiting their earnings to \$1200 a year or less may now feel free to earn more, under recent changes in the law, without suffering any loss of income for the year. Although earnings of more than \$1200 in a year will still cause some reduction in the amount of Social Security benefits which a person can receive, the new method of figuring the reduction will assure that he will always receive more in combined earnings and benefits than he would have had if he had not worked beyond the \$1200 limit. To find out how this new rule works, a worker should consult his Social Security office.

The Rodrigues' are residing at 2620 California Avenue, Wahiawa.

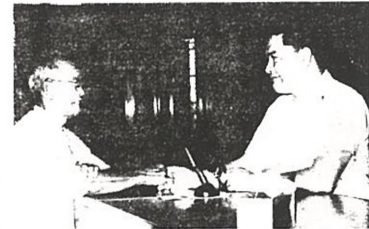


Troop 17 News
