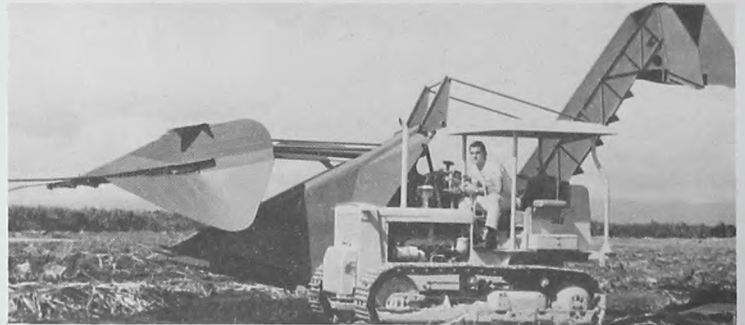

## New Experimental Seed Cane Harvester



A new Massey Ferguson 515 cane harvester was tried at Ewa this week. The 515 was designed and built in Australia and is normally used on crop cane. We want to find out if it can be used to cut seed. Alan Randall is up from down under to show us how to operate the new cutter. It is mounted on our International TD-6 tractor. The machine tops the stalk, cuts it at the base and then chops it into short seed pieces. The machine will be tried here at Ewa for about 2 months then it will go to the outer islands.

## To Bishop Museum

Malcolm MacNaughton, HSPA president, recently announced that a \$250,000 collection of insects is being donated by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association to the Bishop Museum.

The valuable collection gathered by HSPA entomologists from all over the world over a period of some 60 years, consists of three major groups and other items.

They are known as "Fauna Hawaiiensis," the "Type collection" and the "Hadden Philippine collection".

The specimens being donated to the museum are those not directly connected with sugar cane. Those dealing with sugar are being kept at the station under the supervision of F. A. Bianchi, HSPA's principal entomologist.

MacNaughton said the HSPA believes that by transferring the collections to the museum "the broad, long-range good of entomological research in the Pacific will be served."
