NOTICE TO ALL WHO ARE ALIENS:

You must fill out an address report. You must do this every year.

Your card must be turned in before January 11, 1952.

You get an address report blank at the post office.

Read the instructions carefully.

Fill in the card carefully—use typewriter or ink.

Turn the card in at the post office.

This report is required by law. The Internal Security Act of 1950 says every alien who is required to register under the Alien Registration Act of 1950 must report his current address within 10 days of January 1 each year.

Failure to report your address will, upon conviction, result in fine or imprisonment or both.

To help aliens fill in the cards correctly, the Japanese Social Club will hold a meeting at the Japanese clubhouse Monday night at 6:30.

The Filipino Village Social Club will give aid at the Clubhouse Monday night at 7:00.

The "B" Village Club will help with the registration from 6:30, Monday night.

If you miss out Sunday, you must get your plates from Honolulu. New licenses must be on your car by March 1.

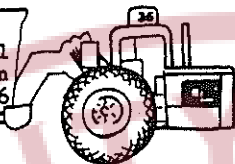

Kitchen Komment

Cookies from the Pupu ao Ewa Club's cooks is this month's treat. (Parenthetical ad libs by a frustrated hubby who tried. He's recuperating). When you're all through, you should end up with delicious macaroons. Temperature: 325° F. (Oven—not husband.) Time: 20 minutes (our clock stopped—started all over) 2 Cups prepared breakfast flakes (Who prepares 'em?)

2 Egg whites (save the yolks for next Xmas)

1 Tsp. Vanilla (drink the rest)

1 Tsp. Salt (try it. Our salt shaker was clogged.)

1 Cup Sugar (easy!)

1 Cup Shredded coconut (I didn't know this came in packages. I swiped 6 nuts, ended up with 4 cuts, shredded nose and knees, 1 cup shredded coconut.)

1. Crush cereal slightly. (Broke two bowls.)
2. Beat egg whites with vanilla and salt until stiff and dry; add sugar gradually. (Wow! It can't be done! I grabbed the vanilla and salt and beat those egg whites until I was stiff but not dry. The sugar would not pour gradually, the rest of the 10-lb. bag overflowed into the sink.)
3. Fold in coconut and toasted flakes. (How? The coconut did not come with sealed flaps and I did not have the flakes toasted.)
4. Drop by teaspoonsful on an oiled paper and bake in a moderate oven. Cookies should be well set and golden brown.

(How high should you drop it from? Mine splattered all over the walls. They're a golden brown and I'm well set—in the doghouse.)

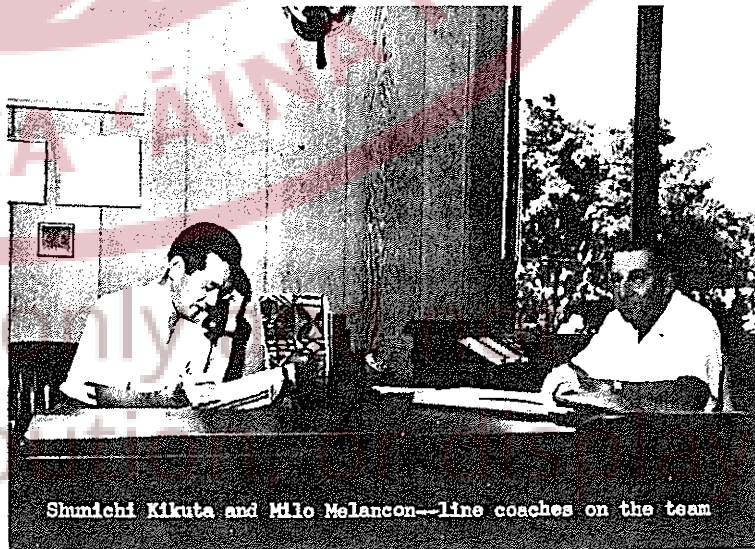

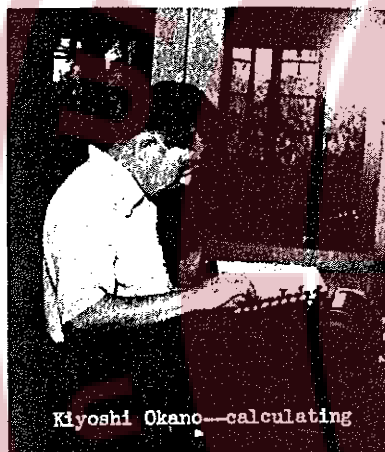

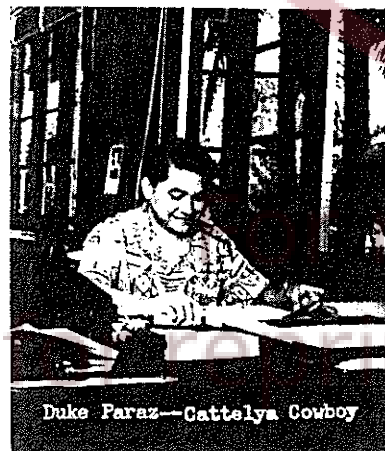

C&C Nut Farm News On Mainland

The August 18 issue of "Business Week" has an article about Castle & Cooke's macadamia nut project on the Big Island. The article, "Macadamia: Castle & Cooke's Hawaiian Experiment" tells how the agency has gone into a risky venture in hopes of adding another crop to Hawaii's economy.

In 1949 when C. & C. decided to try the nuts only 1,100 acres were growing. Their plans include nearly 3,000 acres. Five hundred and fifty acres of jungle land have been cleared and 335 planted with the first harvest scheduled for 1955.

Managing the new outfit is John Cross, former relief division overseer at Ewa. It is quite a change from the green fields of Ewa to growing trees in a bed of rough lava near Hilo.

C&H Lowers Price Of Refined Sugar

With low New York spot raw sugar prices, C. & H. Sugar has dropped their price on granulated sugar 25 cents per 100 pounds.

Last Friday, the New York spot price went up another \$1.40. The third rise recently set the price at \$117.40 a ton. This is only \$4.40 above the year's low and is nearly \$19.00 below the year's high mark.
