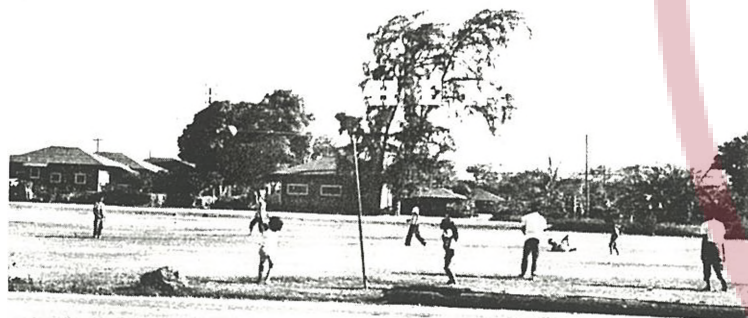
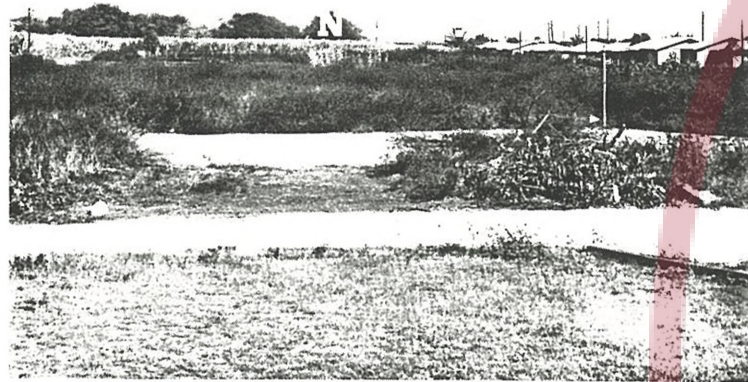

Attempts have been made before to make this empty lot (picture on the above, top) in our Fernandez Village into a park like the one shown in the picture on the above, bottom.

A group of community-minded men met at the site last Friday evening to discuss giving this project another whirl, on this time with a "do or die" determination. To kick off this project, the weed growth will be cleared off beginning tomorrow morning with equipment furnished by the plantation and manned by volunteer operators. Then follows work such as digging out roots, leveling the ground, planting grass, etc.

Charles R. Ygloria

The community was shocked and saddened on Wednesday by the sudden death of Charles Ygloria.

Born in Ewa, Charles spent some years on Kauai and Maui and then came to work for Ewa in the warehouse in 1937, transferring to the main office in 1939. After army service in World War II in the Pacific Theatre, he rejoined the main office and transferred to Industrial Relations as first editor of the Hurricane in 1949. He was promoted to Personnel Assistant in 1954.

He was extremely active in all sorts of community and civic affairs including politics and was the rare type of individual to whom people naturally seemed to come when they had some sort of problem. They were never turned away and there was no limit to the time and effort Charlie would put in on their behalf. He leaves a gap in this community which will be very difficult to fill.

On behalf of the people of Ewa, the Hurricane wishes to extend to his wife, Bea, his sister Mrs. Jean Paraz, and his mother, Mrs. Guadalupe Madayag, the most sincere condolences.



Two More Pau Grinding

Two more sugar plantation companies have finished their 1962 crop and total production in Hawaii at the end of this week should be about 1,080,000 tons.

Total production to the end of last week was 1,060,436 tons. The two plantations which have now finished--bringing the total which have completed grinding to five--are Kahuku Plantation Co. on Oahu and Kilauea Sugar Co. on Kauai.

Unofficial production figures are 20,435 tons for Kahuku, best since 1941 (21,587 tons), and 16,192 tons for Kilauea, a shade under last year's 16,342 tons, which was Kilauea's second largest crop.

Honokaa Sugar Co. on the Big Island, Wailuku Sugar Co. on Maui and Ewa Plantation Co. on Oahu finished earlier.

50 Supervisors to Attend HST Meeting

About 50 supervisors of Ewa Plantation Company are planning to attend whole or part of the 21st annual meeting of the Hawaiian Sugar Technologists, November 12-15.

About 500 delegates from all islands are expected to attend the four-day conference which will be held at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel.

Two prominent Mainland scientists will be among the featured speakers at the opening session. They are Dr. Hans Jenney, Professor of Soil Science of the University of California, Berkeley, and Dr. L. Martin of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Louisiana.

Dr. Jenney is one of the most noted soil scientists in the world. Dr. Martin is a great authority on the clarification of cane juice in the making of sugar.

The president of the HST is Frank Wiley, factory superintendent at Ewa.

The meal ticket will cost 50¢ each for adults and children.
