## Sugar Beet Crop Due for A Drop

The latest report on the U.S. beet crop now places it at 16,569,000 short tons, 9% less than last year and the lowest figure is 1962.

Planted acreage was down 3% and harvested acreage is expected to be 1% lower than last year. Late plantings and adverse weather conditions this spring greatly hampered the favorable development of the crop.

Assuming 1962-66 average sugar yields, B. W. Dyer estimates production of about 2.6 million short tons of sugar, raw value.

## U.S. Production Up Hawaii, Ewa Down

U.S. sugar cane production is expected to reach a new high of 25,137,000 short tons. This is 3% above last year and slightly above the previous record of 25,053,000 tons established in 1964.

Mainland cane growers expect to harvest about 4,000 acres more, but Hawaii anticipates that 6,000 fewer acres will be cut.

Hawaii's production so far continue to lag about 90,000 tons less than last year's figure at this time.

Ewa trails last year's production rate by about 5,000 tons.



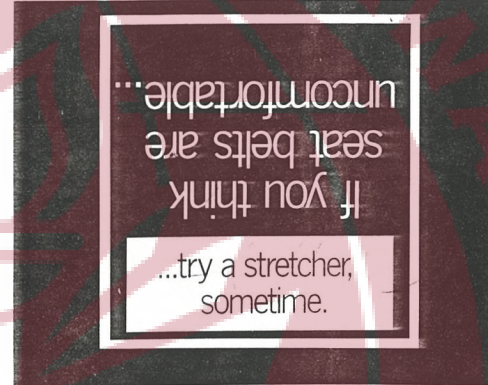

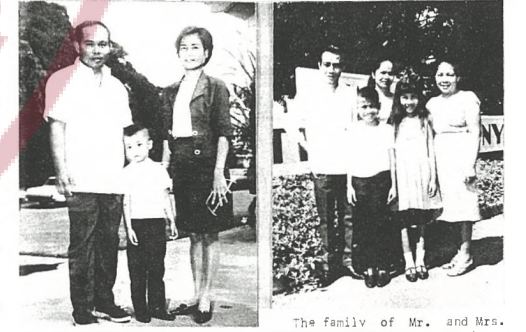
