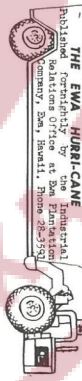
Two Plantations

SUGAR TIDBITS

We see O.T.C. tank trucks taking our molasses to town just before they empty. But some plantations can't ship theirs out that easy.

At Honokaa on the Big Island (opposite it is the U.S.D.A. Island?) molasses is pumped to a tank ship that sits off shore. A coastline of sheer cliffs makes this method necessary. Over there molasses is loaded only twice a year, not every Monday.

Maryland trader took on about 100 tons of sugar through a pipeline about 160 to 180 tons an hour.

R. H. Hughes, mill department head at H&S, visited the Valenzuela Pulp and Paper Company in Lockport, Louisiana. This is the first plant in the United States producing paper from bagasse.

Mr. Hughes reported that the tablet paper may seem and be as soft and hard wood paper products.

Remember H-109? How you thought it was good chewing? A Hawaii scientist, Dr. A. J. Manalo, brought back 20 lots of wild Thai sugar cane, including chewing varieties. He and other H&S scientists are testing them to determine the resistance of Hawaiian grown cane to Fiji disease and mildew. About 200 sugar cane varieties are in the test.

Born on September 10, 1891, in Fukushima, Japan, TORAZO MURA of Tenney Village will end his career as a plantation worker this coming August.

Mr. Mura first worked at Ewa Plantation Company for a period of 8 years, from 1909 to 1917. He left this company in 1917 to work elsewhere, but returned to Ewa in 1921.

Since 1921, Mr. Mura has 36 years of continuous service with Ewa Plantation Company. His first three years, on his second employment at Ewa, were with the harvesting division as a Field Handman. Then from 1921 to 1928 he was an Irrigator and from 1928 to 1946 a reservoir attendant.

Since then, Mr. Mura has held the job of an irrigation assistant.

Mr. Mura's family have three daughters—Tomiko, Shigeo and Kazuko. They are all married and have their own families. Tomiko and Shigeo live in Honolulu and Kazuko lives in Wahiawa. A son, Larry, was killed in action in France on November 30, 1944.

Many workers do not have a complete understanding of the deduction from their pay checks shown as "F.I.C.A." This deduction is actually your contribution to the Social Security Trust Fund to build up an insurance fund to pay for you in your old age.

Unlike premium due is sent. The F.I.C.A. tax is automatically deducted by the plantation with the same amount, and paid to the government with a report of the amount of wages paid to each individual employee.

The Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance keeps a record of your contributions. When you reach the age of 62, your account may be figured in with your other investments. Insurance benefits payable to you and his dependents in case of his death.

Anyone who has a social security account may ask for a statement of earnings credited to the account. It is possible to have any other questions essentially answered by the Industrial Relations Office.

JOHN GIBSON, JR., born April 30. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. John Balligout of Fernandez Village and is their first child.

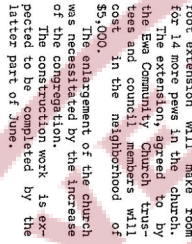

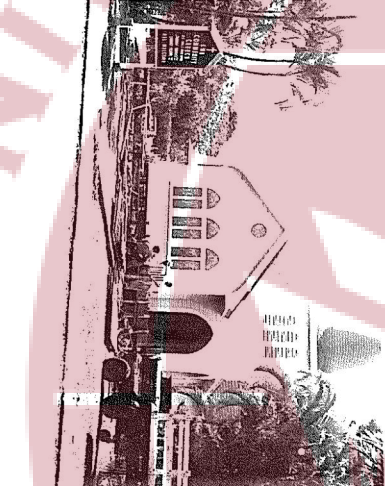
Drs. Itokazu, Fujimoto To Open Dental Office at Ewa
