

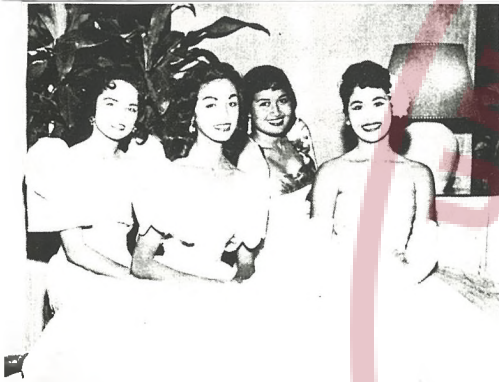

First Fiesta Filipina E.R.A. Summer Fun Program Starts on June 19-21

The first Fiesta Filipina will be held in Honolulu, June 19-21.

The Fiesta includes a convention of delegates from 46 Filipino community councils throughout Hawaii representing some 64,000 persons of Filipino ancestry. Its aim is to contribute to the progress of Hawaii in its new role as a state.

The semi-finals of the Queen contest will be held on June 6 at the Hawaiian Village Hotel (admission free) and the finals on June 13 also at the Hawaiian Village (\$1.00 per person). Miss Letty Quintal of Varona Village is one of 14 candidates entered in the contest.

On June 18, there is a reception for delegates at the Philippine Consulate-General.

From June 19-21, the Fiesta will include exhibits at Ala Moana Park. In the evening of June 19, there will be a banquet and ball in which the Queen will be crowned.

QUEEN OF MAY

Many years ago, there lived in Philadelphia a wealthy banker by the name of Francis Anthony Drexel. He was blessed not only with wealth, but also with a pious wife and three virtuous daughters. The parents instilled in their children a deep love of God and neighbor, encouraging their children to every work of charity.

As a result, one daughter, Elizabeth Drexel, became deeply interested in the poor boys of Philadelphia. Today, St. Francis Industrial School at Edgington, Pennsylvania, is a monument to her zeal and generosity. Another daughter, Louisa Drexel, became interested in the Negro missions. A third daughter, Katherine Drexel, selected as the object of her charity, work among the First American, the Indians.

In his will the father left one-tenth of his entire estate, \$1,500,000 to charity. About that time, Katherine visited the Holy Father. Eloquently she told of her interest in the Indian Missions. The Pope said to her, "Daughter, why not become a missionary yourself become a nun and work among them".

Katherine gave up the luxury of her palatial parental home, consulted her confessor, and shortly thereafter became a novice with the Sisters of Mercy in order to begin a new community that was to labor among the children of the forest and the plains. Later her interest extended to the negroes.

Today her spiritual daughters, the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, are doing heroic work. Their generosity and zeal know no bounds. Mother Katherine not only supports her own schools but many others. This woman born in luxury and wealth, sacrificed everything to work for the salvation of souls. She became the Mother of a group of modern apostles who carry on the work began by Christ chosen apostles and His Mother Mary. Queen of all Mothers and Queen of May--let us as children of Mary try to imitate her sanctity and her virtues and in time of temptations let us ask her intercession as she is our mediatrix, "Ad Jesum per Mariam".

Don't Do It Yourself

Sure, you can save time by doing it yourself. But let's face it---there are some household operations and repairs that are better done by the experts.

We've all heard of homes being burned down due to faulty electrical installation. Let's leave the installation to the experts.

Also, let's keep in mind of our own limitations before "doing it yourself"---limitations involving age and physical condition. Undertake only those activities you can handle without strain.

Remember, "do it yourself" is fun, moneysaving. But only when you can do it safely.

Disabled Workers May Qualify Under New Social Security Law

One of the recent changes in the Social Security law will permit payment of benefits to some disabled persons who had not been covered by Social Security in the period just before they became disabled, according to Edward H. Ichiyama of the Honolulu Social Security office.

The new retains the requirement that the disabled worker must have worked on jobs covered by Social Security for at least five years out of the 10 years just before he became disabled, but drops the former requirement that a year and a half of the covered work must have been during the three-year period just before the disability began.

Disabled persons who had previously been told they could not qualify under the Social Security disability provisions because they lacked enough recent work are advised by Mr. Ichiyama to get in touch with the Social Security office again.

Leaflet 1958-2, outlining the changes, will be set on request by the Honolulu Social Security office.

Starting July 1st of this year, envelopes and cards for mailing must not be smaller than 2 3/4 x 4 inches.

The new mail closing hours which went into effect last month are: First dispatch 7:45 a.m.; second dispatch 2:45 p.m. All mail deposited between 2:45 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. will be post-marked 4:30 p.m. of the same date.

The post office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday and 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon Saturday.

Favorite Recipes

- CHICKEN CHOW MEIN**
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced onions
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 1 cup celery cut in thin strips
 - 1/4 cup sliced mushrooms
 - 2 cups chicken broth
 - 1/2 cup water chestnuts
 - 2 cup bean sprouts
 - 1/3 cup bamboo shoots
 - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 2 tablespoons soy sauce
 - 2 cups cooked chicken, cut in strips
 - 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- ****
- 4 cups Corn Soya (corn soya shreds)
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
 - Cook onions in heated butter until golden brown. Stir in celery, mushrooms and 1/2 cups of chicken broth. Simmer about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
 - Stir in water chestnuts, bean sprouts and bamboo shoots. Combine cornstarch, remaining 1/2 cup chicken broth and soy sauce; stir into vegetables. Add chicken and pepper; simmer about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Combine Corn Soya and melted butter; heat thoroughly in oven. Serve Chicken Chow Mein over mound of buttered Corn Soya.

DEATH BY PLASTIC

A recent issue of Time magazine carries an article describing accidental death to children resulting from using plastic garment bags as playthings.

The American Medical Association and health commissioners of major cities have issued warnings that the filmy bags used to cover newly dry-cleaned garments should be kept away from children.

Recent death cases reveal that the youngsters place the plastic bags over their heads and about their faces. The plastic adheres to the face, mouth and nose and then the child becomes too faint to coordinate his actions and pull away the sticky folds. With the oxygen supply cut off the child soon suffocates to death.

Don't let anyone play with plastics--the odds of losing a life are too great!
