Do you know an estimated 1,000 eye accidents occur in American industry in the course of an average working day. More than 6,000,000 office and shop employees in 4,500 industrial, military, municipal and educational organizations are covered by the Wise Owl eye-safety program sponsored by the NSPB across the nation. To date, 35,000 workers have earned membership in the NSPB Wise Owl Club of America by wearing eye-safety protection which saved them from serious eye injuries during on-the-job accidents.

Do you know an estimated 161,500 school-age children suffered eye injuries in the past year because they had not been taught eye safety habits in supervised play, school labs and workshops. Because of the continuing campaign of the NSPB for eye protection among school lab and shop students, teachers and visitors, nineteen states have now passed school eye-safety legislation.

Roast Turkey

This is the method of roasting turkey preferred by home economists with the poultry industry.

Turkeys today are more tender and delicately fleshed than years ago and gentle roasting at low temperature with a foil "tent" placed over the bird during the latter part of the roasting time produces a juicy, tender, picture-perfect bird.

To make "tent," tear off a sheet of heavy duty foil five to ten inches longer than the turkey. Crease lengthwise through center. After the turkey has lightly browned, place over the bird and press the foil gently at drumsticks to anchor it.

The "tent" permits some heat to flow over the bird and brown it, but also keeps it moist and juicy without basting.

HST Elects Wulfekuhler

HSPA Unveils "Wig-Wag"

An important development in the measurement of solar radiation was unveiled on Monday, November 13, at the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association Experiment Station.

The new instrument - familiarly known as the "wig-wag" - was demonstrated for the first time to some 200 delegates to the Hawaiian Sugar Technologists conference.

HSPA scientists have been working on the invention of a dependable, simple instrument for agricultural use for almost 40 years. Patents were recently issued and commercial production of the instrument is now under way.

The HST conferred a distinguished service membership upon Hugh W. Brodie who devoted a substantial part of his career at the HSPA Experiment Station to the invention and development of the wig-wag and other environmental instruments.

The "wig-wag" provides engineers and agriculturists with the data necessary for the study of growth, not only of sugar cane, but of any plant. The wig-wag is accurate, relatively inexpensive, durable, low in maintenance requirements, and the information which it provides is easily read.

Additionally, the wig-wag is a marvel of simplicity. It has few moving parts, being a combination of a pulse-glass made up of two joined spherical glass bulbs, an aluminum housing and a mechanical counter.

The specifications which such an instrument had to meet were: (1) The cost of the instrument and its installation had to be low enough to make it economically feasible so that each plantation could have several in strategic locations.

(2) It had to be accurate.

(3) It needed to be suitable for use in the field with a minimum of maintenance over long periods of time.

(4) It had to be sturdy enough to last for many years, and

(5) The instrument had to measure solar radiation simply so that the information from the instrument could be easily read. Now, the wig-wag has successfully passed the rigid calibration tests at the Station and the instruments are ready to be shipped to plantations for actual field use.

Beware of Gifts ---Bargains

The Better Business Bureau of Hawaii, Inc., issues a warning to shoppers looking for "bargains".

About 15 or 16 companies have gone into operation in Honolulu recently. They have all sorts of gimmicks to make customers pay high prices for cheap merchandise.

The companies operate through different "come-on" methods --- such as offering something "free" or a "package deal" or "big bonus" --- usually some type of household item like cookware or dishes, etc. A new item offered is a camera and "free" film-type gimmick.

For example, a 20-piece cookware set offered by one company for \$495, was found on sale at Ala Moana Center for \$320.00, reports the bureau. Also "choice dishes" being sold for \$370.00 could be bought for under \$70.00.

"Come-ons" such as --- "we have a gift for you ---, "you have won a prize" --- or you have been selected --- are common.

Of course you have to go and pick up your gift or prize and are then given the sales pitch or more expensive items. A free camera offered recently was a cheap plastic outfit worth less than \$1.00.

Another gimmick widely used is the offer of free books, chinaware, cookware, and even a free automatic fire extinguisher system for your home --- the catch is --- you pay a large sum of money, but get a rebate or credit on each friend referred who also bought the "deal", of course if you sold enough friends on the product you would eventually get yours "free". The same offer is made to each person contacted (sounds like the old chain-letter gimmick doesn't it).

So --- if you are "offered a deal" get all the information you can, including the firm's name and contact the Better Business Bureau for advice (995)123.
