

## Record Land Area Abe, Andres, Verdadero Retired

In the last few months the area under cultivation at Ewa has finally exceeded the previous record high of 8,861 acres established in 1940, according to Manager Ed Bryan.

The immediate goal is to pass the 9,000 acre mark and to continue upward as water and land can be made available. By increasing acreage under cultivation it is hoped to offset the loss of the Robinson Estate lands near Waipahu which are already sprouting supermarkets and housing, and also to offset land which will be lost to planned highway development in the future.

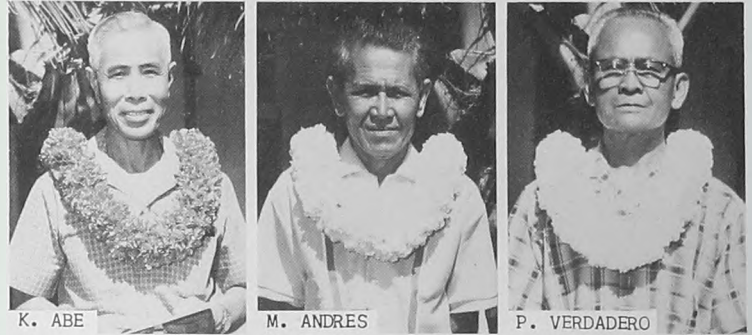

On their last day of work, three employees received Ewa's Aloha last Tuesday morning from Manager Ed Bryan in a brief ceremony held in the Administration Building courtyard.

KAMESHIRO ABE, with a service record of 49 years, has seen much progress made in Ewa since his arrival from Japan in June, 1915.

He first started with the Field Department and transferred to the Factory in 1918 as a Juice-man. Working his way up the line, Kameshiro was promoted to Relief Fireroom Foreman, a position he held when retired.

Mr. Abe was the first President of the Ewa Japanese Club in 1949 and served four consecutive terms in that capacity. He has headed the Ewa Japanese Language School for the past 14 years.

In 1960, a certificate for "Meritorious Service" was presented to him by the Japanese Government. He has also been the coordinator in the Ewa District for the Japanese Consulate.

MARIANO ANDRES came to Ewa in September, 1941 from Makaweli Sugar Plantation on the island of Kauai where he held the position of Store Clerk. Starting in Ewa Store with the same title, Mariano was promoted to Head Sales Clerk in 1946. When the plantation sold the store, he elected to be transferred to the Housing Department. Since then he has held the following jobs: Hand Weeder, Bagasse Man, Irrigator, Roadside Sprayer and Hand Weeder since April, 1957.

Mariano expects to visit his native land, Laoag, Ilocos Norte, P.I. in the near future.

At the present time he will develop a garden at his home in Fernandez Village.

Coming to us from Kekaha Sugar Company, Kauai, PRIMO VERDADERO started working for Ewa on August 1, 1941 as a Sprayer in the Field Department. He has been an Irrigator from February, 1942 to February, 1946. For the past 18 years and 5 months, Primo has been with the Harvesting Division as a Ground Crewman.

### Declaration Had Three Sources



The greater portion of the text of the Declaration of Independence derives from three sources—the Bill of Rights for Virginia, drawn up by George Mason and adopted June 12, 1776; Thomas Jefferson's Preamble to the Virginia Constitution, and Richard Henry Lee's resolution of independence for the United Colonies, which he introduced in the Continental Congress on June 7, 1776, acting upon instructions received from the Virginia Convention.

On June 11, in pursuance of Lee's resolution, a committee of five - Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston was appointed to draft a proposed 'declaration of independence.' As finally adopted, the Declaration of July 4 embodied the committee's draft.

He was born in Dingras, Ilocos Norte, Philippines and came to Hawaii in April, 1922.

His spare time will be devoted to house chores and yard work.
