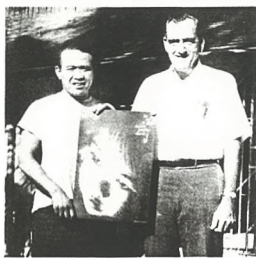

United Effort for United Fund...

The drive is headed this year by Malcolm MacNaughton, President of Castle & Cooke Incorporated. Jack W. Hall, Regional Director of the ILWU is one of the Vice Presidents.

The idea of this one concentrated drive is to show that the above needs can be met and that it isn't necessary for each individual agency to go out on its own for funds, duplicating over and over steps that can be gone over but once at a tremendous savings in time, money and effort on the part of the agency as well as the donor. The United Fund's cost of raising money for 42 separate agencies is 7%, that for individual agencies runs between 15 and 50% of the money raised.

The goal of \$2.89 million will be raised through the suggested "Fair Share" method of giving.

The donation is a percentage of the persons annual income, which for most amounts to One Hour's Pay Per Month or six-tenths of one per cent of gross income.

The amount a person contributes must be determined by each individual, based on his desire to invest in the human assets of his community, the amount he can afford each week or each month during a year, and the degree of spiritual conviction he has toward helping his neighbor.

To facilitate donations, Ewa is incorporating the payroll deduction method which makes contribution automatic, and easier for donors as well as the agencies who require monthly aid to meet its expenses.

A movie distributed by the Aloha United Fund will be shown to Ewa employees on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. The film will help to illustrate the United Fund campaign and answer many of your questions.

When all is said and done however, it's still up to you to make the drive a success.

Competition Grows

Holly Sugar Corporation has announced plans to build a new beet sugar factory at Tracy, California, with a slicing capacity of 8,000 tons of sugarbeets a day. This would make it the largest beet sugar factory in the U.S. Cost is estimated at \$30 million.

Holly's Union City and Hamilton City factories are scheduled to close down operations upon completion of the new mill. Tracy is about 70 miles east of San Francisco.

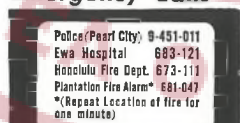
The \$30 million facility will be located near the existing Tracy plant and is to begin operations in 1970. Hamilton City's and Union City's mills will operate, together with the existing Tracy plant, until the new mill is completed.
