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Cane to Displace Forage

Manager Ed Bryan told supervisors on Thursday that the sugar yields from newly planted areas of poor soil had been so favorable that it had been decided to plant cane as soon as possible in the area now being used for diversified agriculture. It is expected that planting will start in a small unused portion of this area in the next few weeks.

The land to be used is below the mill, known as Fields 87 and 88. It has been cleared and graded in the past few years in such a way as to be available for cane eventually if yields elsewhere justified it. The good yields in other poor lands have now resulted in a speeding up of the schedule.

Manager Bryan warmly complimented Messrs. Penhallow and Yawata and the whole Diversified Agriculture crew on the excellent job they have done. The project was designed to make temporary use of land which did not appear too promising for cane at the time. The Diversified Agriculture crew not only did this but have been showing a profit as well. However our main business is sugar, Mr. Bryan said, and we expect to realize greater income from the land when it is planted to cane. In addition to harvesting bananas in Honolulu, Diversified Agriculture crews will be harvesting presently growing crops in the forage area for about four months to come, making room for cane.

Vote and the Choice Is Yours!

Tuesday, November 8 is Election Day for Hawaii and many Mainland States.

A record number of voters will cast ballots, both statewide and in Ewa's precinct. A large number of ballots, in spite of written and posted instructions, will be spoiled. Too many voters are in such a hurry that they rush into the booth and start marking up the ballots without reading the instructions.

You will be given four (4) ballots: A State ballot (pink) listing candidates for U.S. Congress, Governor-Lt. Governor, Hawaii State Senate, and State House of Representatives. You may vote for both Democrat or Republican candidates, however the Governor and Lt. Governor are voted for by party Democrat or Republican, so you cannot elect a Democrat Governor and Republican Lt. Governor or vice versa.

You'll receive a yellow ballot on which you vote Yes or No to the holding of a Constitutional Convention.

Your School Board ballot is white and the candidates listed alphabetically. You may vote for both Democrat or Non-Partisan candidates.

Three proposals are listed on the green ballot regarding the make-up of the City Council; the first proposes a Council consisting of nine (9) members elected at-large; the second proposes an 11 member council with six (6) at-large members and five (5) district members; and third proposal is a rejection of the above two which would retain the present make-up of 9 members with 6 at-large and 3 district councilmen.

Read the papers, watch TV, attend rallies, talk to friends (and others too), and decide when you want to be your representative and lawmaker. Agree vote to them. But remember--VOTE! and the choice is yours. If you don't vote, then the choice is theirs.

Education Week

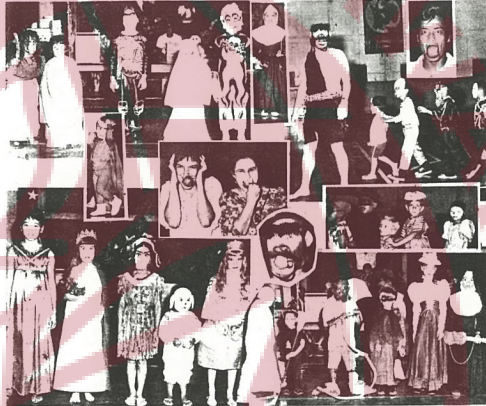
The week of November 6-12 has been proclaimed American Education Week.

Some members may be "captured" now and then by the slick ads and smooth talk.

Here's how to avoid the traps and save some of your hard-earned money:
1. Try to resist spur-of-the-moment buying. Plan for Major purchases.
2. Avoid the "super, gigantic, fabulous deals" that sound as though they're practically giving the merchandise away. The goods may not be as advertised, or you may wind up buying a higher priced item that isn't on sale - credit cost may be higher during such sales, too.
3. If at all possible, pay cash for smaller purchases. Save your credit for the big things.
4. Don't sign up for anyone's credit deal or borrowing plan until you've compared total actual costs at the Credit Union.
