Free space has been offered to the churches by the commanding officer of the U.S.S. Maury to take the clothing to Hong Kong. This drive is being conducted by the Mission Committee of the church. Needed: Sweaters, blankets, clothing (not heavy winter), shoes for children up to 15 or 15 years of age. School supplies like notebooks, pens, pencils, things usually in school kits. **Not needed:** Nylon stockings, large men's shoes, high-heeled shoes, fancy blouses or dresses, conspicuously old-fashioned clothing, bathing suits, magazines, records, Dick and Jane readers.

Promotions of Okano, Paraz and Nakamura Announced by Manager

Manager Ed Bryan announced three supervisory promotions this week to take effect October 1st: Kiyoshi Okano, Cost Accountant, to Chief Clerk, Agricultural Control Division in the Field Department office; Duke Paraz, Timekeeping Clerk to Cost Accountant; and Kojiro Nakamura, Timekeeping Clerk, to Payroll Supervisor.

Kiyoshi Okano who was born in Ewa, attended Ewa School and graduated from McKinley High School in 1936. He started with Ewa Plantation Company on August 28, 1936 as a sample carrier in the laboratory. A year later he transferred to the sheetmetal shop. In 1938, he moved to the accounting department as a timekeeper and held this job until his promotion to Cost Accountant on September 1, 1957. Kiyoshi is married to the former Elsie Utsugi of Honolulu. They have a daughter, Lois, age 12.

Kiyoshi devotes a great deal of his off hours to scouting as the Scoutmaster of Troop 17. Duke Paraz came to Ewa from Carcar, Cebu, Philippine Islands in 1923 at the age of 9 to join his parents. He attended Ewa School and graduated from the St. Louis College in June, 1934.

Starting his career at Ewa Plantation Company on July 6, 1934, Duke worked one year in the machine shop, 1934-'35, two years in the laboratory and boiling house, 1935-'37, and has been with the accounting department since 1937. During the period with the Accounting Department, he has held the jobs of Records Clerk, Shift Operator-IBM, and Timekeeping Clerk since 1945.

Duke is married to the former Jean Ygloria. Jean is also employed here as the Manager's Secretary.

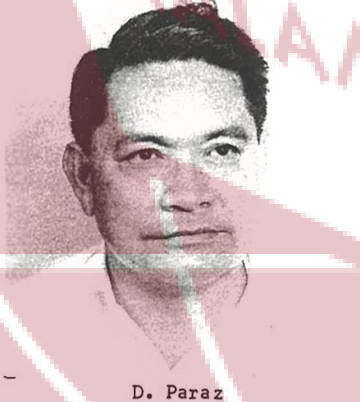
Duke who is an orchid enthusiast founded the Ewa Orchid Society in 1950. He served as president of this organization in 1950, 1951, 1961 and 1962.

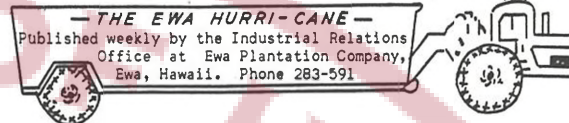

Fire Prevention Week



Fire Prevention Week, designed to help keep our fire toll down, will be observed throughout the United States October 6-12. The main purpose of Fire Prevention Week is to provide a yearly reminder for everyone of the year-round need for fire prevention and care with fire.

Despite fire safety reminders, 11,800 persons died in fires last year in the United States, and thousands more were injured. Property dollar losses from fire rose to \$1,265,002,000, a new high and an increase of 4.6 per cent over 1961.

This is the forty-first anniversary of Presidentially-proclaimed Fire Prevention Week, which always falls in the week containing October 9, the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire in 1871. Were it not for fire prevention efforts, fire losses might be three times the current figure, the National Board of Fire Underwriters estimates.

Fires can be controlled, but it is up to the individual to do his part. It is not something we can leave to others to do for us because each of us could be the next victim unless we take steps to prevent fire.
