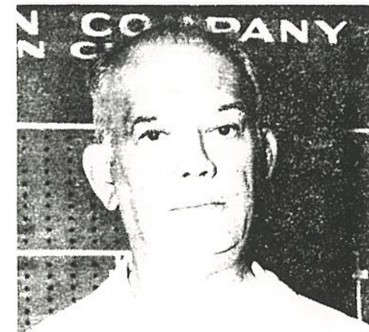

Dr. Mossman Joins Hospital Staff

Dr. Thomas M. Mossman temporarily joined the Ewa hospital staff this week.

Dr. Mossman, born in Honolulu, graduated from McKinley high school in 1922. He attended the University of Hawaii for two years, then transferred to the University of North Dakota where he received his MS in 1926. In 1928, he received his MD from the University of Nebraska.

He returned to Hawaii in 1929 and entered private practice. In 1931 he joined the City and County medical staff as assistant physician. In 1941 he moved up to the position of City and County physician and in 1955 he returned to private practice.

Dr. Mossman and his wife, Marian, have six children--Francis (30), Thomas, Jr. (25), Michael (17), Carolyn (13), Kathryn (11) and Paul (9). The family resides in Honolulu.

Drought Still Serious

A simple phone call to your local Social Security office may prevent your losing money.

If you believe you might be eligible for disability benefits, contact your Social Security office as soon as possible.
