Ewa Social Club--Now No More



April 1927

A venerable landmark passed from the Ewa scene this week when the Social Club building was torn down on Tuesday.

Long it stood in the shadow of the mill--unchanging while time wrought many changes in the immediate area. The old plantation store and office building was its close neighbor as were the sprawling mill yard honeycombed by rails and the hundreds of cane cars herded by chuffing locomotives.

It was a brightly lit fairyland with sounds of music and gaiety when the sounds of industry were stilled during weekends and holidays--place of relaxation unto Ewa's many generations.

The ravages of time (and termites) wrought an inglorious end to this grand old building. And on Tuesday as the tractors and crews roared a Wagnerian dirge in crescendo of finality, the walls and rafters were reduced to a pile of kindling.

The club-house extension which housed the dining hall and kitchen still remains. Added to the original structure in 1933, it was found to be in good shape.

As the main structure had served a community need so well and for so long, a part of it will continue to serve yet another need -- as the Union Hall for Ewa's I.L.W.U. Unit 4104.

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HSPA Safety Seminar

About 130 safety officials from all sugar islands and their pineapple associates attended a two-day safety seminar sponsored by the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association Monday and Tuesday (April 22 and 23).

Organized by the HSPA safety subcommittee, the seminar was held at the Princess Kaiulani hotel in Honolulu. Talks and discussions covered the range from hazards of low voltage electricity to Workmen's Compensation awards and detection of drunk drivers. Speakers and panelists included Mits Fukuda, Castle & Cooke vice president and chairman of the HSPA's industrial relations committee; Bruce Keppeler, State of Hawaii deputy attorney general; Edward R. Turner, administrator of the State of Hawaii Industrial Safety Division; Lt. William F. Costa, Honolulu Fire Department; Francis M. McKinney, Honolulu Community College; William H. Fullaway and Dr. Maurice L. Silver, State of Hawaii Workmen's Compensation Division; Dr. Herbert K. N. Luke of Luke and Lam, physicians; Ezra Kenohi, Hawaiian Telephone Company; and Edward T. Harvesting Delayed

Sugar production has been at a standstill since Thursday last week when harvesting was suspended because of heavy showers earlier in the week. Rainfall ranged from 0.07" to 2.55" and to further wet all the wetness came more showers this week that spelled another week of no harvest. The delays which have been all too frequent due to weather since February 6 the original scheduled date of 1968 harvesting season, have thrown the plantation on strike about 30 working days and an estimated 7,700 tons of sugar. Harvesting and milling are expected to be resumed Sunday afternoon weather permitting. But as this paper went to press the weather forecast was not too promising.

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Traffic Code Highlights "Part 7"

- ARTICLE 14. DRIVING ON RIGHT SIDE OF ROADWAY
- Sec. 15-91. DRIVING ON RIGHT SIDE OF ROADWAY; EXEMPTIONS
- (1) Upon all roadways of sufficient width a vehicle shall be driven upon the right half thereof, except as follows:
 - (a) When overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction under the rules governing such movement;
 - (b) When the right half of a roadway is closed to traffic while under construction or repair;
 - (c) Upon a roadway divided into three marked lanes for traffic under the rules applicable thereon;
 - (d) Upon a roadway designated and sign posted for one-way traffic;
 - (e) Vehicles of the United States Postal Service while delivering and/or collecting mail matter.
 - (2) Upon all roadways any vehicle proceeding at less than the normal speed of traffic at the time and place and under the conditions then existing shall be driven in the right-hand lane, or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway, except when overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction or when preparing for a left turn at an intersection or into a private road or driveway.

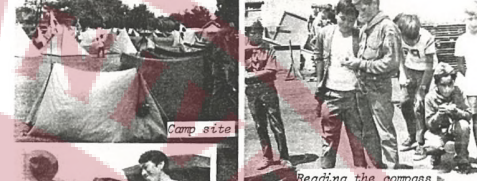

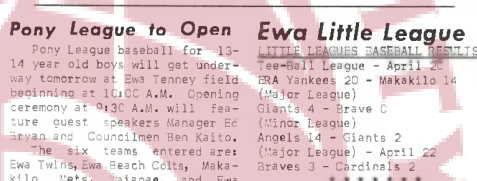

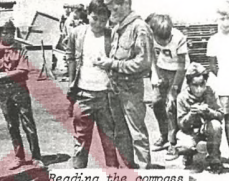
