Traffic Safety Quiz No. 2



Can you find 10 traffic hazards in this picture?

- Look sharp! This quiz checks more than the "beacons" of your vision. It's for those, your judgment of what's right and wrong on the road. Look again—then rate yourself against the list. But keep in mind that preventing a traffic hazard is not enough. A good driver is always prepared to take instant action to avoid trouble.
- *We urge you to be alert, drive carefully, know the rules—and obey them. Remember: about 75% of all accidents are caused by the driver—not the car.
1. Hazard a vehicle in the left and right lanes. All vehicles are required to be in the left lane unless passing or overtaking.
 2. Hazard a vehicle in the right lane. All vehicles are required to be in the right lane unless passing or overtaking.
 3. Hazard a vehicle in the center lane. All vehicles are required to be in the center lane unless passing or overtaking.
 4. Hazard a vehicle in the left lane. All vehicles are required to be in the left lane unless passing or overtaking.
 5. Hazard a vehicle in the right lane. All vehicles are required to be in the right lane unless passing or overtaking.
 6. Hazard a vehicle in the center lane. All vehicles are required to be in the center lane unless passing or overtaking.
 7. Hazard a vehicle in the left lane. All vehicles are required to be in the left lane unless passing or overtaking.

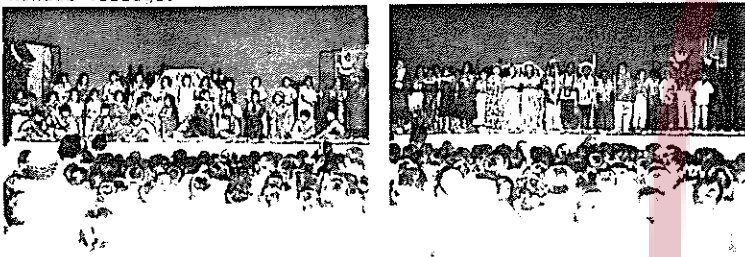

FOR WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 22

WEATHER:

The weather was very warm and humid, with light variable winds, considerable cloudiness, and frequent light to moderate showers. The heaviest rainfall, amounting to about 3/4", occurred Thursday evening. Maximum temperatures of 90° was recorded on Monday and Tuesday, October 17 and 18, respectively.

IRRIGATION:

The rain that fell on Thursday, October 20, ranging from 0.58" at D.P.D. to 0.71" at Field 43 was quite uniform over the plantation.

Plans were made to assign 10 irrigators in Division II to weed out big rice grass in scattered areas in Field 29 ahead of the spray gang to protect the replant.

CULTIVATION:

On Thursday the ground crews assigned to pineapple work at C.P.C. hoed in Field 79.3. The heavy rains at Wahiawa stopped the pineapple work. This crew worked its last day at C.P.C. on Friday, October 21, and were assigned to hoeing in Field 62 on Monday, October 24.

PREPARATION:



Clearing, grading and plowing of the former Mill Village site designated Field 49.3 was completed. Area plowed was 2.80 acres.

FACTORY:

Factory men returned to their regular jobs on Monday after an absence of five weeks working in the pineapple fields. Off-season repair work was started immediately.

Mr. Dupin, Scale Inspector for the H.S.P.A., started on Monday checking all scales.

The contractor on number five boiler completed the removing of all tubes, cleaned all drum heads, leveled and aligned drums and started retubing.

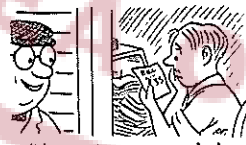

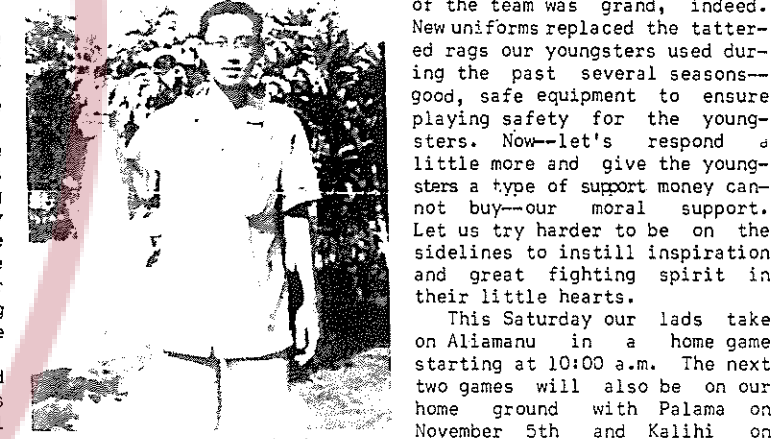
Now a little something about our own Ewa Hurricanes. Flashy in blue, white and red jerseys with white helmets, our youngsters top the league in fighting spirit.
