Limitation Raised On Credit Union Payroll Deduction

Your Credit Union has made arrangements with the Ewa Plantation Company to place no limit on the amount a member may assign from his pay check to the Credit Union after legal deductions, except as follows:

1. No payroll deduction will be made on any payday when the member concerned owes money to the Company.
2. Payroll deduction will be reduced or suspended on any payday whenever a member concerned has less than \$10.00 take home pay.

Due to the impending retirement of William Ornellas, irrigation foreman, Manager Jim Orrick announced three supervisory promotions, one a temporary promotion, in the field department which became effective on August 1st.

Mr. Ornellas, who will have worked 36 years with this company on his retirement date on October 31st, will leave for the Mainland for an extended vacation this month.

Throughout his life on this plantation, Mr. Ornellas has been associated with the field department. He started out at Ewa in 1923 as a field foreman and worked his way up to irrigation foreman in August 1946.

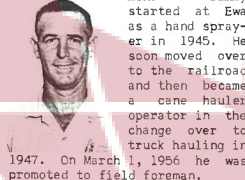
Mr. Ornellas has really looked forward to this well deserved rest after 36 years of work and helping to raise a family of 11 children.

Last Friday, the Irrigation division overseers and foremen gave an Aloha party to Mr. Ornellas at the home of Henry Duncan.

Moving up from relief irrigation to irrigation foreman is Sadao Higashi. Sadao has worked at Ewa since 1944. He was promoted to field foreman in August 1945. Since then he has worked up the ladder to hand weeding foreman, mechanical ratooning foreman, hand spraying foreman, relief irrigation foreman and now to irrigation foreman.

Hisashi Shinogi, who was promoted from hand ratooning foreman last September, moved up to the position vacated by Sadao Higashi. Hisashi started his career at Ewa in 1944. He began as a hand fertilizer and became a field supervisor in February 1953.

James Ornellas, son of William Ornellas, received a temporary promotion to mechanical ratooning from field foreman. Jimmy started at Ewa as a hand sprayer in 1945. He soon moved over to the railroad and then became a cane hauler operator in the change over to truck hauling in 1947. On March 1, 1956 he was promoted to field foreman.

Parson's Corner

Realize the real blessing of your family, cherish it, and love each of the member of it by remembering that they might be lost to you. That is a good way to love your church. Rev. Milo Netzler New Pastor of The Ewa Assembly of God

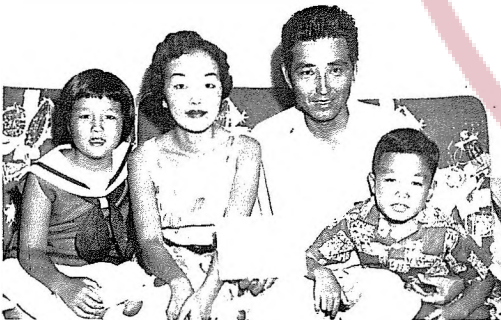

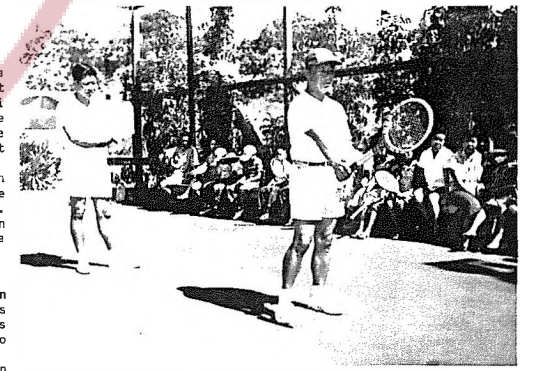
